| The action of the Texas Senate in voting 20 to 8 to prohibit betting on horse races in Texas is a gratifying sign. All of the fervid eloquence in behalf of the sport of kings is left suspended in mid-air, hot aiz of course. The Senate measure does not abolish racing, it simply makes illegal the betting feature. Those who desire to continue to improve horseflesh, those who are interested merely in seeing the ponies run, may still do so legally <br> But the tight lirped gentry who follow the races from coast to coast, who do the fixing of jockeys and trainers and helpless horses, the scurvy tribe who live by their wits on other people's money, will have to go to work if they come to Texas after this bill becomes a law.
