# Even Simple Home Life Is Dangerous

# Expert Tells How to Avoid **House Hazards**

Ignorance of Danger and Careless Use of Modern **Equipment Is Cited** 

By WALTER JAMES STUBBS Safety Engineer

The American home should be the safest place on earth—but it isn't.
On the contrary, life in the Ameri can home is perilous. Fire and acci-dent make it so. And instead of decreasing, the nation's peace-time casualty list is increasing rapidly.

Adventurers go to Africa to shoot big game; to the Alps to scale dizzy mountain heights; to the polar re-gions for exploration. But statistics indicate that they may be safer that if they had remained in their home in America. In 1935, according to the National Safety Council, 31,500 persons died as a result of accidents in American homes. In 1936, the total grew to 39,000 deaths. That is more than double the number of fatalities that occurred in private industry and almost twice the number of deaths resulting from motor accidents during the same period.

The worker in his factory or en route to and from home by motor is safer than he is at home. He is careless at home. He is more careful at ork or on the road.
Fire is a tremendous hazard in the

American home. According to the National Fire Protection Association, a home is attacked by fire every two minutes throughout the year in this country. In 1935, there were 260,000 home fires and the loss totalled be-tween \$85,000,000 and \$100,000,000. Eight thousand deaths were caused burns, fires and conflagrations Eighty per cent of those deaths came from fire in the home.

The use of combustible roofs, in-stead of fire-retardant roofs such as asphalt shingles and tiles; careless habits in smoking and the use of matches; defective chimneys and flues and defective wiring are among the major factors in the tremendous annual fire loss.

Fire and accident can be virtually

eliminated in the home through care.

Make a survey of your home today.

Note the unsafe conditions in cellar on roof, wherever they exist. Inform other members of your family of these dangers immediately. Then set about the task of making them safe. Failure to recognize unsafe condi-tions and failure to correct them after they have been noted are the fundamental reasons for Ameri appalling peace-time loss of life

Planting Time for Vegetable Gardens

College Station .- "One half cre garden, properly cared for, will produce an average of \$100 worth of food for the family." This statement was made by J. F. Rosborough, extension horticulturist, who pointed out that year in and year out, the garden should be the most profitable area on the average farm.

For each member of the famlly, 600 feet of row space should be allowed, Rosborough said. To supply a balanced vegetable diet going this 600 feet of space should be divided into 200 feet devoted to potatoes; 100 feet to yellow and leafy vegetables, such as mustard, cabbage and carrots; 100 feet to tomatoes; and 200 feet day at ITE Di to such miscellaneous vegetables as onions, beets and turnips.

Over a large portion of the state, the time is at hand to plant Irish potatoes, according to Rosborough, who recommends the Triumph and Irish Cobbler varieties. Cabbage and onion plants should be set out, and tomato plants started now. English peas should be planted in rows that have been laid off 12 inches apart with 24 to 30 inches between rows. By this method the peas will tend to upport each other in their upward growth, Rosborough pointed out.



### KEEPING TAX MONEY AT HOME

The Mairitz tax remission measure which was recently discussed on this page has passed the House in the Texas legislature and is ready for action by the Senate. It has shown surprising strength. That it will throw a very large and solid monkeywrench into the state's finances is admitted. But it will equalize the unequal and unjust situation that has previously existed whereby 33 Texas counties have had all their general purpose ad valorem state taxes remitted and eight others have had a portion remitted, while the remaining 212 Texas counties, including Mills, have had to pay over all they collected into the state trea-

If this bill becomes a law, Mills county will have an average of \$9,000 a year to spend on its lateral roads and local improvements. This is not a tremendous sum, but in the course of a few years, if judiciously administered, can do a tremendous amount of good.

# BUILDING IS ACTIVE

Last week the Eagle published a resume of building activity in and near Goldthwaite. It was surprising to note how much it amounted to when added together. That the same conition is prevailing over the country generally is shown by statistics compiled by the Alexander Hamilton Institute of New York.

For the rull year of 1936, both residential and non-resident. bilding showed sharp gains over 1935. The increase for the two classes of building combined amounted to 61.3 per cent. Last year represented the third consecutive year of expansion. As compared with the low for the depression in 1933, the volume of building in 1936 was 176.1 per cent larger and it exceeded the volume in any year since 1930. At the same time, building activity in 1936 represented the recovery of only part of the ground lost in the slump after 1928. The amount of building last year was equal to only 42.1 per cent of the record high total in 1928.

## CONNALLY SCORES AGAIN

Senator Tom Connally of Texas has introduced another bill in Congress which is likely to make history. While everyone has been talking about the necessity of taking the profits out of war, Senator Connally, himself a veteran of the World War, has drawn up a carefully considered bill which would strictly limit the profits to be made by industrial concerns during hos-

The measure would serve two purposes. 




