## MONEY ISN'T EVERYTHING

Amidst the universal grief for the helpless children and teachers who perished in the New London school explosion, an ugly rumor has raised its head. This was purported to be the richest country school in the world. It had several producing oil wells on its own campus besides its revenue from the other wells in the school district. Yet the testimony introduced at the court of inquiry indicates that the school authorities were stealing the gas that was used in the school.

This marks, if true, a new low in human depravity. It is difficult to see why so many innocent children should have lost their lives in the tragedy, but the good book says that the sins of the fathers shall be visited on the children. Money without honesty is more dangerous than explosive gas.

# FARMERS NEED INFLATION

The quantity of farm products marketed in January was 5.2 per cent smaller than in the same month last year, reflecting the effect of the 1936 drought, according to the Alexander Ham-Ilton Institute. The price level of farm products, responding not only to the curtailment in the supply but also to a greater amount of inflation, rose to a new high for the current upward movement. The increase in prices over the level of a year ago was 20.1 per cent. With the rise in prices more than offsetting the drop in the quantity marketed, farm cash income from the sale of agricultural products amounted to \$626,000,000 in January this year as against \$550,000,000 in the corresponding month last year, an increase of 13.8 per cent.

While the current year started off with farm income supported by greater inflation than a year ago, more inflation than that prevailing in January will be necessary to raise the farmers' annual income in 1937 to an appreciably higher level than in 1936. On the basis of the price level of farm products in January and Orange, Texas City, Freeport, on the basis of the prospective supply of farm products available for shipment this year, an annual income of \$7,702,000,000 from marketing in 1937 is indicated, or only 1.6 per cent more than in 1936. Prices of farm products for the full year would ville need to average 12.0 per cent above the January level to prowide an increase in th annual income from marketings as large as the increase over a year ago which occurred in January.

The report on farm income for January consequently does not afford an indication of any particular expansion of farm income for the year as a whole. Such an expansion will depend upon an extension of the inflationary movement and the consequent raising of prices well above the January level. More inflation this year is questionable since the current movement seems now to have been extended to a point where it could be easily inter-






