## Landscaping Suggestions

I. Lawns.

Lawns are judged for their smoothness, turf, care in mowing and edging. They should have only one or two specimen plants.

Foundation planting is necessary to tie the building to the landscape. Such shrubs must be for the most evergreen to give all-year beauty. Shrubs must be suitable for the place to be decorated. The dark green, broad-leafed shrubs are planted in the background, while the low, lighter green plants are in front. There must be variety in height and foliage to prevent monotony. 

Flower beds are located preferably

on the side or at the rear of the yard. Continuity of bloom, color scheme, and care are judging points.

The care given the spaces between the yard and the street, side yard and alley, will be judged. These spaces should be free from trash, weeds, and mowed where possible. VI Walks and Drives.

Useful trees (fruit and nut) are reserved for the back yard. But pecan trees for their shade and Japanese persimmons for their decorative fruit are allowed in front yard.

Stepping stones and gravel are more to be desired than expensive materials of brick and cement.
