Mrs. Dan Bush of Goldthwaite and Mrs. Gray of Lometa are two of four surviving sisters who are real pioneers of this section. The following interesting article about their family appeared in the Fort Worth Star-Telegram:

"A grandfather who fought for Texas Independence in 1836, a father who joined the Texas Rangers at the age of 17, and their own childhood in a country where Indian raids were common are the qualifications four sisters present for membership in the West Texas Pioneer Association.

They are Mrs. L. R. Gray, Lometa; Mrs. Nannie Bush, Goldthwaite; Mrs. Elizabeth Keeler, Liberty Hill, and Mrs. Della Miller, Austin.

Their grandfather who was William McFarlin, who died soon after he had left the Texas Army in 1836 because of illness. His son, John McFarlin, father of the four sisters, was 12 years old in 1836. John McFarlin joined the Texas Rangers when he was 17 years old. In 1855 he married Nancy Frances Jones, and went to Llano county to establish his home.

Mrs. Gray who sent in the four sisters' memberships, writes of an Indian raid she witnessed. "One fine Autumn morning Father took us four children for a joyride on the ox wagon, after a load of firewood. We went about 550 yards down the valley into a little draw, where he left us to play in a cow lick, telling us to go home after playing a

### ALL CARS ON THE ROAD NEED MOTOR OIL CHANGE

Every motor vehicle that has been in operation during the winter months should have its engine oil drained, the crankcase should be flushed and refilled with new oil of the proper grade for spring season. O. H. Carlile, division manager for the Gulf Oil Corporation, has advised motorists.

Engine oil in cars that have been running during the cold months is certain to be diluted and contaminated to the extent that its lubricating value is badly impaired, and in a good many engines this contamination has reached the point where damage to bearings, cylinders and pistons is likely to result if the oil is not changed," the Gulf official continued.

"During winter months considerable water gets into engine oil and contaminates it. Over a gal-

lon of water is produced in an auto engine with the burning of a gallon of gasoline, and during warm weather most of this water is dissipated through the exhaust in the form of a vapor or steam. Moisture in the crankcase is condensed to water much more rapidly in cold weather.

"Motor oil is further diluted by the action of automatic chokes. With cold engines, automatic chokes may remain in operation throughout the period of a short run and permit too rich a mixture, or raw gasoline, to get into the cylinders and thereby cause dilution of the motor oil."

### CHILDBIRTH MORTALITY IN TEXAS HIGH IN 1936

Austin.—In Texas during 1936, 700 mothers lost their lives through childbirth and associated conditions. Fatality struck 8,000 babies under one year of age with 4,000 more stillborn. On a national basis the figures had reached the tragic total of nearly 85,000. These facts become particularly distressing when it is realized that at least two-thirds of this motherhood penalty could have been avoided, states Dr. Geo. W. Cox, state health officer.

Never before in the history of obstetrics have scientific precautions against complications been so advanced and so available as they are today. However, in spite of the improvement in the techniques involved and the further development of antiseptic control, the maternal mortality figures pathetically indicate that medical knowledge alone cannot solve the problem."

The federal government recently purchased 226,121 acres in Wisconsin for new forests, wildlife preserves, public parks and Indian reservations.

It may be said of Dr. Hans Luther, the former Chancellor who retires at his own request after four years as German ambassador to the United States, that he has represented his country with dignity under very difficult circumstances. His efforts to better relations and negotiate a reciprocal trade agreement between the two countries, unsuccessful through no fault of his, have won him sympathy and respect in Washington.

His successor, Dr. Han Dieckhoff, is already well known in the national capital, where he made many friends as counselor of the German embassy from 1922 to 1927. He occupied no such eminence as Dr. Luther's in the old Germany, but he is a trained diplomat who comes directly from the Foreign Office and has had the advantage of watching the evolution of the new Germany. The Hitler regime has changed nearly everything in the Reich except the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, and Dr. Dieckhoff, besides enjoying the confidence of the present government, is one of the ablest officials of the permanent diplomatic service. He is a man of engaging personality distinguished in Berlin by his capacity to see other points of view, particularly the view of the English-speaking peoples. He has made no secret of his desire to return to America, and his experience in London and Washington equips him to render invaluable service to his country and the cause of peace by interpreting to the Wilhelmstrasse the true mind of the United States and the obstacles that stand in the way of German-American understanding.—New York Times.
