Declaring Acts Unconstitutional

CONSTITUTIONAL

Supreme Court pass upon the con-stitutionality of legislation? The Legislative Reference Service of the Library of Congress in a bulletin of September 12, 1936, states: "While the Supreme Court is the highest judicial interpreter of the Constitution, it is worth noting that the validity of Federal legislation is frequently passed upon by other agencies, with practical results."

The bulletin then lists six other agencies as follows: "A. Lower Federal court adjudi-cations are frequently persuasive as to validity," such as cases not carried to the Supreme Court by motion

of the government itself concerning laws which subsequently were reenacted. "B. Independent agencies, with quasi-judicial powers, may sometimes consider the question," such as the Board of Tax Appeals which held that it could not collect a tax on an invalid statute. The Congress
