### W. C. Dew Is Laid to Rest

Funeral services for Mr. W. C. Dew were held last Friday afternoon at 5 o'clock in the beautiful Methodist church which was completed last year largely as a result of the generosity of Mr. and Mrs. Dew. The music, under the direction of Mrs. John G. Berry, was by the vested choir accompanied by the organ which had been his special gift to the church, and a special duet, "Good Night and Good Morning," was sung.

Rev. John B. Horton of Llano, presiding elder of this district, offered the prayer. Rev. John K. Beery, former pastor here, read 1 Cor. 15:20-58 and then told of his association with Mr. Dew and of the latter's unselfish interest in the church. He appealed for others to take up the work that Mr. Dew had so ably carried on from year to year.

Rev. Fred J. Brucks, the present pastor, spoke of Mr. Dew's versatile character as business man, citizen, civic leader, friend and as churchman and Christian. He said: "Mr. Dew loved his church. He took an interest in it like he did in his own home and business. He was never too busy to attend every meeting that required his presence. He was a steward and a trustee for many years. He served as Sunday School Superintendent for years and occupied this position at the time of his death. Always he was enthusiastic and forward looking in his attitude, and he gave unstintingly to the support of the church."

"His life can be explained best by the Scripture, 'This is the victory that overcometh the world, even our faith.' It was his faith that made him the business man, the citizen, the civic leader, and the friend that he was. It was his faith that made him love the church and sacrifice for the church as he did. It was his faith that made his life victorious."

Following the services at the church, the remains were taken to the Odd Fellows Cemetery and laid to rest after a brief service at the grave.

### Fine Rain Breaks Long Drouth

Rainfall totalling 1.66 inches has fallen this week to put a definite end to the disastrous drouth that has held this section since last July. Beginning at 10 p.m. Tuesday, the rain fell slowly all that night to a total of an inch and a half. The remaining .16 inches have been marked up since then.

The rainfall was widespread, and as far as can be learned, every section of Mills county received its share. Previous rains had been spotted, and several sections of the county had received practically no moisture for over three months. While more rain will be needed to replenish tanks and streams and to aid the winter grain and grass, enough has fallen to definitely turn the tide and to bring optimism back to the country.

Road work on highway 7 towards Star was necessarily stopped by the rain and mud. All roads were soft, and rural carriers found the going slow on many sections of their routes. Cotton picking and pecan gathering have been suspended until the ground dries.

Fifty-two ranchmen, four extension specialists from A and M College, and three county agents attended a field meeting and picnic on the Day ranch of Ebony last Wednesday.

After introductory talks at the ranch home, the riders on a 25-acre Bermuda pasture was inspected.

At the noon hour a picnic dinner was served out in the pasture under the shade trees. After lunch M. R. Bentley, extension engineer, discussed electric fences and specifications for building tanks, ridges, spreader terraces and spreader doons, R. R. Lancaster, pasture specialist, urged pasture conservation and rotation grazing. A. S. Smith, livestock specialist, stressed feeding and pasture improvement. W. R. Nesbet, livestock specialist, emphasized the use of round vats pen arrangement and dipping goats with sulphur for the eradication of lice.

**LIFE OF W. C. DEW**

William Charles Dew was born in Wanamie, Pennsylvania, on July 26, 1873, and was brought to Texas by his parents at the age of 4. After living at Palestine for several years, the family moved to Williams Ranch near what is now Mullin when he was in his early teens. Thirty years ago Mr. Dew was called to Goldthwaite to take active management of the newly organized Trent State Bank, and it was not long until he was known throughout Texas as one of the most successful small town bankers in the state.

Despite the fact that both of his parents were English, and he had been born in the North, Will Dew in appearance and activity was a typical West Texan. He combined to an admirable degree the perseverance and courage of the pioneer with unselfish thrift. One of his earliest memories was of his father lending money to the foreman of the railroad shop in Palestine, where the elder Dew was employed at a munificent salary of \$1 a day. After borrowing the money, the foreman expressed amazement that Mr. Dew on an income of \$1 a day could raise a family and still have money to

lend. His answer—which the son was never to forget—was "Because I never buy anything I haven't the money to pay for, and still have some cash left on hand."

Through the drouths and depressions of the late eighties and early nineties Will Dew took a man's share in carving out a home in the wilderness. The severe lessons he learned then gave him the courage to face and conquer other depressions later on.

When the banks of Texas were ordered closed during the dark days of 1932, the Trent State Bank was in such a strong condition that it did not close until directly and specially ordered to do so by the Governor of Texas. The bank not only had ample cash resources, but, more than that, its president had the confidence of its depositors to such an extent that a run on this bank was unthinkable.

The Trent bank not only came out of the depression in good shape, but was able to extend aid to other institutions. Two smaller banks were merged with it, but in the process Will Dew saw to it that not a single dollar of deposits was lost by the depositors of these banks.

Insistent calls came to him to head much larger banks elsewhere, but he consistently refused to consider moving away from Goldthwaite.

In 1932 Mr. Dew and Mrs. Jennie Trent were united in a marriage that proved ideal for both. With interests and tastes almost identical, each found a new zest in life. Their many philanthropies were crowned with the erection of the new Methodist church to which Mr. and Mrs. Dew not only contributed outright more than one-half of the building cost and then equipped and furnished it handsomely, but in addition they assumed the responsibility for the deferred subscriptions of the other church members so that Bishop Boaz was able to dedicate the church upon its completion last year as wholly free from debt.

Will Dew was a forceful and entertaining public speaker. Although his schooling had been frequently interrupted and early brought to a close, he was one of the best educated men in Texas. Of late years he had traveled widely and never failed to bring back with him a large fund of useful knowledge as well as many delightful anecdotes. He was tremendously interested in the welfare of the producers of Mills county and

never advised any man to do anything but what he himself, under the same circumstances, would have undertaken.

Although he frequently assumed a brusqueness of manner and speech, his sympathies were both wide and deep. To him right was right and wrong was wrong and there could be no compromise between them. For a friend in need, no sacrifice was too great, no endeavor too arduous, no task too difficult. His attitude towards his aged mother, who has survived him, was an accurate index of his fine character. Not a day passed when he was in town but that he opened his heart to her and at the same time brought encouragement and joy to her.

The following beautiful verses, which were read at his funeral by his friend and former pastor, Rev. John K. Beery of San Antonio, fittingly describe the man whose untimely end is mourned by all who know him:

**NEAREST HOME**  
By James Montgomery  
Servant of God, well done;  
Rest from thy loved employ;  
The battle fought, the victory won;  
Enter thy Master's Joy,  
The voice at midnight came;  
He started up to hear;  
A mortal arrow pierced his frame  
He fell, but felt no fear.

The pains of death are past,  
Labor and Sorrow cease;  
And, life's long warfare closed at last,  
His soul is found in peace.  
Soldier of Christ, well done!  
Praise be thy new employ;  
And while eternal ages run  
Rest in thy Savior's Joy.

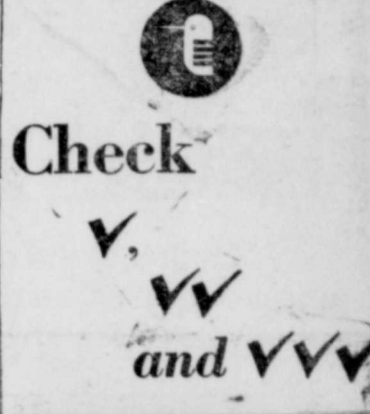
