



In his inaugural address in 1861, Lincoln said: "By the frame of the government under which we live our Constitution, this same people have wisely given their public servants but little power for mischief; and have, with equal wisdom, provided for the return of that little to their own hands at very short in-

Our Constitution divides our government into three independent branches, limits the power of each branch and provides that this power be "returned to the hands of the people" by periodic elections of Congressmen, Senators and the Executive. These stipulations cannot be altered by Congress or the Executive or the Courts, as our Con-


