#### Cotton Quotas Received for County

State Committee has made allotments for cotton on 1,114 farms in Mills County for 1938. State allotments for cotton acreage for the entire county had previously been announced for Mills County for 16,548 acres. This amount of acreage divided on the 1,114 farms permits a percentage of approximately 19 per cent of tilled acreage. A late amendment provides that no farm can receive an allotment of less than 50 per cent of the acreage planted and diverted to cotton in 1937.

Farmers will be notified at once of the acreage allotted to cotton for 1938. Allotments for General Soil-Depleting Crops will be worked out by the State Committee and will be received within the next ten days.

It was believed first that faulty wiring caused the blaze, which originated in Mrs. Ruby Mauldin's news stand, but investigation failed to confirm the opinion. Fire Marshal Rich Fagan, reported the cause unknown. The walls, badly damaged, remained standing.—Empire Tribune.

CHAPTER No. 80

AN ORDINANCE TO BE A PART OF THE CODE OF ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF GOLDTHWAITE, TEXAS, PROHIBITING THE DIGGING, BUILDING AND ERECTING OVERGROUND TOILETS, PIT TOILETS, SEPTIC TANKS AND WATER CLOSETS WITHIN 100 FEET OF THE SEWER LINE IN SAID CITY OF GOLDTHWAITE, PROHIBITING MOVING SAME ABOUT AND ADDING THERE-TO, AND PROVIDING A PENALTY FOR THE VIOLATION THEREOF.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF GOLDTHWAITE, TEXAS:

Article I.  
Sec. No. 1. That hereafter, it shall be unlawful for any person or persons, firm or corporation to build, dig, erect or place any above ground toilets, water closet, pit toilet, septic tank or commode attached thereto, on any premises in said City of Gold-

thwaite, Texas, located within one hundred feet of the sewer line in said City.

Sec. No. 2. That hereafter it shall be unlawful for any person or persons, firm or corporation to repair any septic tank, or water closet discharging above ground, or to make any additional connections with or into any septic tank or remove from place to place any above ground toilet or pit toilet, on premises located within one hundred feet of the sewer line in said City of Goldthwaite, Texas.

Sec. No. 3. That any person or persons, firm or corporation, desiring to hereafter have or place on their premises which are located within one hundred feet of the City sewer line, in the City of Goldthwaite, Texas, any toilet water closet or commode, or who shall desire to repair the same on his premises shall connect the same with the said sewer line in the manner and form as provided by city ordinance, and pay the fees and monthly dues therefor

as provided by ordinance of the City of Goldthwaite, Texas.

Article II.  
Sec. No. 1. Any person or persons, firm or corporation, who shall fail to comply with and who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction therefor, shall be fined in any sum not exceeding One Hundred Dollars, for such offense and each day this ordinance is violated, shall be deemed a separate offense.

This ordinance presented at a regular monthly meeting of the City Council of the City of Goldthwaite, Texas, held on the 12th day of February, A. D. 1938. It appearing to the Council that an emergency and imperative public necessity exists, requiring that this ordinance be passed at once a motion was made, seconded and carried that the usual time be waived and that the ordinance be passed to its third and last reading at once. The said ordinance was thereupon read the third time, and on motion and second, unanimously passed by the council, all members present and voting for its passage. On motion and second it was ordered that Mayor sign the same, and that it be attested by the Secretary under the City seal, and that thereafter, it be published in the Goldthwaite Eagle, and recorded in the Ordinance record of the city of Goldthwaite, Texas.

### Homecoming Day For McCraw

ARLINGTON, April 22.—Arlington was ready today to receive the greatest crowd in its history when Attorney General William McCraw opens his campaign for governor of Texas here Saturday, April 23.

Mayor W. F. Altman, chairman of the McCraw Homecoming Day program, has proclaimed a holiday in honor of Arlington's most famous native son. Invitations to citizens of every Texas city and town have gone out.

Scheduled to begin at 4 p. m., the celebration will include parades of people and bands, presentation of a giant bouquet to McCraw's mother, and will wind up with McCraw's speech at 6:30 p. m., with a state-wide radio broadcast. Mayor Altman reported he has received notice that nearly every town within 100 miles of Arlington is sending a motorcade for the big day. "If you ever saw a whole town turned over to a native son, you will see it on McCraw Homecoming Day," Mayor Altman declared. "We are working day and night now to show him how proud we are of him."

Arlington organizations of all kinds are joining with Mayor Altman's committee in arranging programs for the celebration. Mayor Altman said everyone in Arlington will be on hand to greet the crowd and its honor guest.

To every Texan, Mayor Altman sends this invitation: "Come to Arlington April 23. Try and get here not later than 4 p. m. in the afternoon. It's going to be an historic occasion. I want you to be here!"

### Diabetes Took Toll Of 600 Lives in Texas

Diabetes, the price moderns pay for soft, luxurious living, took a toll of 600 lives in Texas last year, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, state health officer.

"While the controllable disease such as typhoid fever, malaria, diphtheria and smallpox, are causing a smaller number of deaths each year in this country diabetes, which was notably absent in the early pioneer days, is now taking a staggering number of lives," doctor Cox states.

"Up until the highly mechanized age diabetes was not a health problem, but the disease became noticeable in direct ratio to the development of luxury living, soft eating, soft habits, and general disregard for basic hygienic laws evinced itself among the population. Diabetes is nature's back-slap at coddling and pampering the body" he said.

"Diabetes is a class disease, it appears. Certainly it seems to attack the indoor desk man more often than the out door person, whose work is more vigorous or who takes more exercise. Whatever the actual cause of the development of the disease may be, vocation or economic conditions are factors, for those who can not indulge in luxurious living

"There would be fewer victims of ravishing diabetes," doctor Cox added, "if those who are indulging in soft, anti-natural living would realize the folly of their ways. Especially middle-aged persons and those beyond it

should exercise regularly, an annual physical examination, and, if the results of the examination indicate a vice of the family could drastically reduce the power of this disease threat to an extent that would save the lives of adult Americans.

**SOUND REASONING BY CONGRESSMAN SOUTH**

In commenting on a recent Eagle editorial, Judge Chas. L. South, Representative in Congress from this district, writes sensibly and soundly about the current war scares. The Editor wishes to share his letter with his other constituents in this section.

Congressman South writes: "As you well know, every few years a wave of war hysteria sweeps the country. Inspired to a large extent by selfishness, ambition and greed. During such times, the average citizen, including most public officials, is supposed to ask no questions and support whatever legislation may be suggested by our leaders. In a matter of so grave importance to the welfare of our people, I am unwilling to pursue a course of this kind. Instead of extreme preparedness preventing war, as claimed by many, I am of the opinion that it is conducive to war. I feel that America can do much at this time toward quieting the fears of other nations, and thereby preventing conflicts by exercising cool judgment, and refusing to be drawn into an armament race. I am of the further opinion that if we spend additional money over and above our regular Army and Navy appropriations, which incidentally total about one billion dollars, it could better be spent in increasing and strengthening our air forces."

**Texas Comes Second In Truck Acreage**

Significant evidence of growing diversification in farm crops, highly desirable in the South to ease the shock of dwindling cotton markets, is seen by the All-South Development Council in the rise of Texas to second place, next to California, in acreage devoted to commercial vegetable crops.

The 271,550 acres of Texas land producing truck crops in 1937 was nearly eight times the 35,000 acres so utilized in the state in 1919, bringing the state from 12 to second place. The \$19,255,000 in cash income from such crops put the state in fourth place nationally in that table, and was a large gain from the \$14,700,000 valuation in 1936.

California, which has been the leading state in both acreage and income for many years, was far out in front in value, with \$92,735,000. Florida and New York were second and third, with valuations of \$26,745,000 and \$25,180,000, respectively.
