#### MORAL REARMAMENT

Significant of the crisis through which the world is passing has been the general feeling of helplessness that seems to have gripped governments and their people alike. It is almost as if civilization were being swept through the rapids to the brink of Niagara. Most of the few who, like Neville Chamberlain, prime minister of England, have attempted to do something, have, against their better judgments, resorted to compromise and concessions

Like a cool breath of air on a sultry day comes the ringing declaration of principle and a call to spiritual action by a distinguished group of Englishmen in a letter to the semi-official London Times. The sixteen men who signed this remarkable document are not clergymen or even laymen closely identified with church work. They are representatives of England's ruling class including two field marshals of the army, the admiral of the fleet at Portsmouth, a Royal Air Force marshal, a former Viceroy of India, a Bank of England director, provost of Oriel College Oxford, Lord Baldwin, former prime minister, and several others almost as prominent.

Their statement supplements that of thirty-three members of Parliament who on September 1, called attention to the "crusade for moral rearmament which appears to be spreading rapidly and to be providing a common meeting ground in many of the chief storm-centers of the world," and added that the Oxford Group which is sponsoring this movement "deserves attention from rulers and people in every nation whose vital interest is peace.

Lord Baldwin's statement is as follows:

"Today all are anxiously asking to what is the world heading? What is the future of civilization?


