#### RURAL POPULATION **ON NEW FRONTIER**

Denton, Texas, Aug. 3 .- Principal speaker at the annual meeting of the Denton County Rural Electrification Cooperative at the main auditorium of the North Texas State Teachers College Thursday afternoon was Mrs. Dora B. Haines of the national REA office in Washington who declared that REA is the real frontier of America and that cur rural population standing on that frontier.

One of the earliest advocates of Muscle Shoals, Mrs. Haines has been an important figure in rural electrification since December of 1935.

If rural electrification is to be a success, Mrs. Haines stated, 15 must have the women of the nation-instrumental in all forms of progress-behind it. "Rural people cannot continue to live as Plans for giving more effective they have in the past," she said, "and they must change and move forward or go down in slavery as rural peoples of other countries have done.

#### J. W. Sheppard Dies Improved Mr. J. W. Sheppard, a well Uniform known citizen of Mills County, International SCHOOL

died at his home Friday even-\*LESSON \* ing, July 21, at 7:25 o'clock. By HAROLD L. LUNDQUIST. D. D. Dean of The Moody Bible Institute of Chicago. (Released by Western Newspaper Union. Mr. Sheppard was thought to

be in good health when he suffered a stroke of paralysis in his left side early Tuesday morning and was followed by a second stroke Thursday night.

Mr. Sheppard was born in Burleson County on March 7. 1870, having reached the age of ELIJAH: A LIFE OF COURAGE 69 years, 5 months and 14 days when he died.

Mr. Sheppard will be sadly missed and the memory of him will be affectionately held by those who were nearest and dearest to him and also by those who knew him as a friend and citizen

In 1890 he was united in marriage to Miss Mattie Holland, who passed to her reward in 1900. The survivors of this union are Amos I. Sheppard, Goldthwaite; L. N. Sheppard, Coleman, and Mrs. R. O. Patterson, Goldthwaite. In 1905 he was united in marriage to Mrs. Mary Emma Wheeler, who passed to her reward October 6, 1936. Survivors of this union are Mrs. J. B. Johnson, Hobbs, N. M., Mrs. Hobson Miller, San Saba, Mrs. C. E. Letbetter, Houston, Mrs. R. H.

Sheppard, Coleman, Mrs. Hardy McClary and O. B. Sheppard, of Goldthwaite. Besides these children, he is survived by one step daughter, Mrs. J. B. Johnson, of Fort Worth.

Courage holds a deeper and nobler meaning than the other words, carrying with it the idea of moral strength and, in the case of the Christian, faith in God

as one devoted to His cause. Elijah was courageous, and he stands before our Christian youth today as an example of that godly courage which

I. Works in the Open (v. 30). Men whose deeds are evil love the darkness rather than the light. God does not work in the dark. All of His workings are in the open sunlight. Every one is welcome to come near" and see what is done. Elijah knew God and he acted like God's man. What a tragedy it is followed his example. If we had the open and above-board dealings

of Elijah in the affairs of our churches, we might see more of the fire and power of his ministry. Certain it is that the administration of church affairs which has to be carried out in hidden corners

by whispered conversations and by secret manipulations behind the scenes, is not God's work at all, it is the work of man.

II. Asks No Favors (vv. 33-35). Elijah rebuilt the altar himself. He asked no help of the unbelieving rael. 



#### JUST COMMON SENSE

When the State Board of Education met in Austin last week to set the per capita school apportionment for next year, the school lobby brought all the pressure it could muster in favor of increasing the rate to the maximum now allowed by law, namely \$22.50.

But a majority of the Board membersvoted to keep it at \$22. Homer C. DeWolfe, a new member of the Board and the one in whom Mills County is most interested, clinched the matter with the remark that since it was not possible to raise \$22.50, he did not believe in apportioning it.

That is sound common sense, and if De-Wolfe can get the Board back with their feet on the ground in other matters, he will have made a greater contribution to good government in Texas than he did as an able assistant attorney general under James V. Allred.

The present school administration has exhibited too much of the fanciful impracticality with which all school men used to be charged. For several years now they have forced schools seeking state aid to adopt budgets that required the collection of every penny of local taxes and every cent of state aid for their carrying out. When, as even a fourth-grader would know, some of the taxes were not paid and less than threefourths of the promised state aid was forthcoming, the teachers and businessmen who had sold the schools supplies were left holding vouchers that could be cashed only at a sizable discount, if at all.


Although the schools have now been closed for several months, last year's per capita of \$22 still lacks \$5 of being paid in full. Still the state superintendent pleaded that a bigger deficit be added next year. For several years the schoolmen of Texas have been riding high, wide and handsome on the shoulders of the Texas taxpayer. It is time for some curtailment before a revulsion of sentiment occurs which may bring about a lasting injury to the state's educational system.

#### MORE USES FOR COTTON

A plea was made in these columns recently for an increased use of spraying for the control of insects preying on cotton lest that once important crop be eliminated entirely in Mills County.

Only those directly concerned with the growing of cotton can participate in such a movement which would indirectly benefit Government, "An illiterate is a the entire county. Already the mails are carrying entries in the contest sponsored by the recent legislature in which \$5,000 to \$10,000 is offered residents of Texas for new processes that would increase the consumption of cotton.

But no startling new process would be equired if enough Texas women would subtitute hose made of Texas cotton for those made from Japanese silk. If cotton could be Mexico with 13.3 per cent, and used instead of jute and sisal, the surplus Mississippi with 13.1 per cent. would disappear over night.

Some of these proposed substitutions are patently uneconomical and impractical. but if every loyal Texan would consciously and conscientiously give cotton the break, when a choice were involved, a big step forward would be taken.


