To Drill Oil Well In Big Valley

J. V. Cockrum has practically completed assembling a block of 3500 acres in Big Valley on which a test for oil will be drilled by Clyde Lane as soon as he is thru on the Spinks well.

Several thousand acres on the same structure across the Colorado river in San Saba are included in the block.

This location has interested geologists for 40 years, and the well will be watched with considerable interest.

Bro. Morris Speck of San Antonio will preach for us Saturday night and Sunday, Sept. 2 and 3.

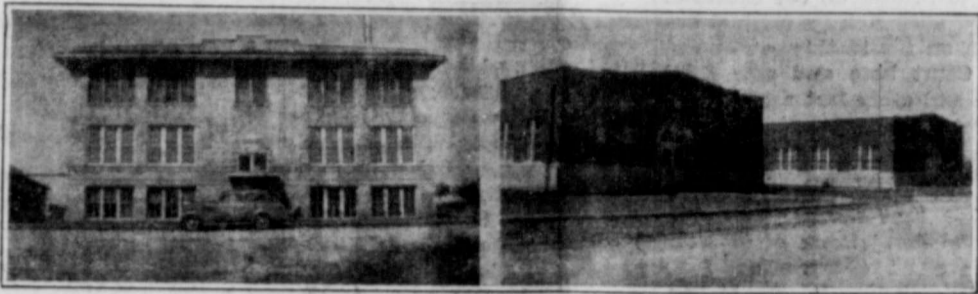
Bro. Speck formerly lived here and worked with the congregation at this place.

Nineteen NYA Jobs Open In County

J. C. Kellam, State Administrator, this week advised R. J. Gerald, Ex-Officio County School Superintendent, that Mills County's quota of NYA school aid jobs for the 1939-40 school year had been set at 19. The State Administrator said this quota was based on the county's relative youth population and its particular need for NYA school aid jobs.

Mr. Kellam asked Judge Gerald to call a meeting of the local NYA County Placement Committee for the purpose of distributing NYA jobs to the schools within the county. As soon as the committee report is received, forms will be mailed to schools recommended by the committee and approved for participation in the program. The school aid program will operate throughout the next school year in much the same manner as it did last year, with only a few minor changes in administration and regulations.

The quota of NYA school aid jobs for the entire state was placed at 12,546, an increase of approximately one-third over last year's quota.

New Dormitories Open at A. & M.

College Station, Tex. (A&M)—Final touches are being given the 12 new dormitories and dining hall at Texas A&M College and all of the buildings will be completed in time for the opening of school on Sept. 22.

The new dormitories will have 1310 rooms and house 2620 of the students expected to attend the college this year. For the first time in several years there will be space enough to care for the entire student body in the halls or in the several project houses on the campus.

Football Dream Game To Be In Dallas

The Southwest's fourth "dream" football game will play in the State Fair's Cotton Bowl Labor Day evening to a capacity crowd, advance tickets sales indicate.

School Statistics

The following items of interest were gleaned from annual reports on file in the office of Superintendent Smith:

Total pupil enrollment for the past five years: 1934-35, 514; 1935-36, 671; 1936-37, 695; 1937-38, 705; 1938-39, 711.

Average daily attendance the past five years: 1934-35, 404; 1935-36, 503; 1936-37, 533; 1937-38, 551; 1938-39, 592.

Tax roll for the past five years: 1934-35, \$953,052; 1935-36, \$931,827; 1936-37, \$929,046; 1937-38, \$954,201; 1938-39, \$924,116.

The foregoing tables show that while the school from a point of enrollment and attendance has been on a constant increase for the past five year period yet the rendition of property for purposes of school taxation has been on a constant decline, with the exception of one year.

Pupil Transportation

The local schools have been operating a transportation system for the past four years. A total of seven buses are operated. These buses travel approximately three hundred and fifty miles daily. Last year pupils from 18 school districts were served by these buses. Pupils were transported to three other schools besides the Goldthwaite schools. A total of four hundred and twenty pupils were transported daily.

The buses owned and operated by the Goldthwaite schools are all standard equipment of the very best quality. The buses are all steel bodies mounted on standard and reputable chassis.

Harris, Mrs. Oma George, Alvin George, T. C. Head and E. R. Mohon, although having been duly served with citation in the manner and for the length of time required by law to appear and answer plaintiff's petition on file herein, came not but wholly made default; and the defendants, The Federal Farm Mortgage Corporation and Star National Farm Loan Association having executed waivers of service of process, waiving citation on the filing of this suit, filed no further pleadings herein and came not at the trial of this cause; and the defendants, Service Bureau, Incorporated, having executed wavers

of service of process, and having further executed disclaimers, disclaiming any right, title or interest in or to the land and property described in plaintiff's petition on file herein; and the plaintiff having moved the court to dismiss the defendant, N. S. Woods, as a party defendant to this cause, and no jury having been demanded, and all matters of fact and well as law, having been submitted to the court and the court having heard the pleadings, evidence and argument of counsel, is of the opinion and finds that the plaintiff is entitled to recover on the causes of action alleged in its original petition on file in this cause; and the Court here and now finds each and every fact necessary to support this judgment.

Electric Finder Locates Gravel

Austin, Texas, August 31st. — Recently an electrical instrument for determining natural formations of the earth to depths of 100 feet or more below the ground surface has been developed by the Public Roads Administration. The Texas Highway Department has been experimenting with the use of this instrument in Texas for locating hidden deposits of caliche, gravel and rock, suitable for pavement base courses, and is effecting economies through the use of it. Hidden deposits of suitable materials have been found adjacent to construction projects, and where they were not previously known to exist. This instrument, with its accessories, is as easily transported as an engineer's transit or level, and with practice can be operated rapidly.

In one District a search by digging test holes had uncovered no suitable material in the vicinity of the project and it appeared that base material would have to be hauled quite a long distance. A search then was started with the electrical resistivity instrument and a large deposit of suitable material was located only one-half mile from the highway project. It is estimated that \$5, 150.00 in haul was saved by the finding of this local deposit with the electrical instrument.

Adolf Hitler has distinguished himself by following to the letter the course of action laid down in his book "Mein Kampf" (My Battle), which was written while he was in prison. He has also distinguished himself by promising three separate times that he wanted no more territory for Germany and three separate times breaking that promise.

Now in his amazing non-aggression pact with Russia he has at last double-crossed himself. For this is what he wrote about Russia in his book:

"The fact of the conclusion of a treaty with Russia embodies the declaration of the next war. Its outcome would be the end of Germany

"The present rulers of Russia do not at all think of entering an alliance sincerely or of keeping one.

"We must never forget that the regents of present-day Russia are common blood-stained criminals; that here is the scum of humanity, which, favored by conditions in a tragic hour, overran a great State, butchered and rooted out millions of its leading intellects with savage bloodthirstiness, and for nearly ten years has exercised the most frightful regime of tyranny of all time. Nor must we forget that these rulers belong to a nation which combines a rare mixture of bestial horror with an inconceivable gift of lying, and today more than ever before believes itself called upon to impose its bloody oppression on the whole world One does not conclude a treaty with someone whose sole interest is the destruction of his partner. Above all, one does not make them with parties to whom no treaty would be sacred, since they inhabit this world, not as the advocates of honor and truthfulness, but as the advocates of lying, deceit, theft, rapine, and plundering

"Germany is today the next great battle aim of bolshevism

"The struggle against Jewish bolshevization of the world requires a clear attitude towards Soviet Russia. You cannot drive out the Devil with Beelzebub

"But despite all that there had also been an alternative before the War; one could have relied on Russia in order to turn against England.

"Today relations are different. If, before the War, one could have gone with Russia at the cost of throttling every last feeling, this is today no longer possible."

And Stalin massacred all of Russia's best generals because he suspected them of being friendly to Germany. Now Russia and Germany have shaken hands and decided to be friends. What friends!

CONGRATULATIONS, BRADY

The city council of our sister city, Brady, has passed an ordinance which prohibits the use of any kind of public address system within the city limits.

Under penalty of a \$100 fine loud-speakers are forbidden to be operated "for the purpose of advertising or for the purpose of attracting attention when such device, machine, apparatus or instrument is so placed or operated that the sounds emanating therefrom may be heard by travelers upon any street or highway or by persons on nearby property or premises to their annoyance, inconvenience and discomfort"
