

Few people know the difference in a new house between a wellbuilt and a shoddy one; the evaluation of the character of a neighborhood is a technical problem; and every type of mortgage has particular advantages gage has particular advantages and disadvantages, none of which is evident to the layman.

"Now, under the FHA's insured mortgage system, the average of family obtains the advice of technically trained valuators, appraisers, and architectural inspectors. When a mortgage for FHA insurance, the staff of the Administration's local office examines the property, the neighborhood, and the mortgage transaction. Many of the common mistakes in previous mortgage ons are thus avoi

"Furthermore, when operative | War builders wish to obtain commitments to insure mortgages on houses to be located in new developments, they are required to submit subdivision proposals for approval. This permits review of the arrangement of streets. lots, and blocks, of provision for playgrounds and other public areas, and of plans for building and financing the utilities and

street improvements. "More and more builders are submitting their plans to the FHA in order to obtain its approval, because more and more home buyers demand the protection and safeguards which the FHA offers. Builders wish to be certain of meeting the necessary requirements.'

The FHA also undertakes a comprehensive review of each mortgage transaction to assure its soundness from various angles and attempts to place a fair valuation upon the home proper-

These valuations tend to restrain sellers from asking prices too high or above the level at which the buyer may obtain the maximum financing terms under FHA, and to prevent undue or



PICTURING CHRISTMAS

full picture record. At this season of happiness and cheer, everyone feels the need of snapshots which will preserve the occasion and keep its memory fresh.

Most Christmas activities center about the tree, bright with lights, ornaments, and tinsel. Naturally you want the tree to show up well in your pictures. But it's a rather dark subject, and unless you take a few special precautions in lighting, it

may come out too black in the prints. To picture the tree most effectively, use three photo lights instead of two. Concentrate the light from two bulbs on the front of the tree. Then place the third bulb behind the tree, with the reflector turned so that all the light shines on the wall. This back light outlines the tree clearly, while the front lights help show detail and decorations.

Sometimes a silhouette of the tree is interesting. To obtain this, place reflector to direct it on the wall. The picture above was taken with a short "time" exposure, the camera being placed on a firm support, with an ordinary 100-watt bulb concealed be-

CHRISTMAS always calls for a hind the tree. If a large photo bulb is used, snapshot exposures can be made, even with an inexpensive

Small Christmas tree lights may be left on when the picture is taken, to add to the effect. But never allow brilliant, "raw" light from a photo bulb to shine into the lens, Turn the photo light or move the camera so that the lens is properly shaded.

Of course, your Christmas pictures should include more than just the tree. Show the folks wrapping gifts, decorating the doorway, putting ornaments on the tree. Picture the children hanging their stock ings, writing letters to Santa Claus, and peering out the window on Christmas Eve to see if he is coming. Make sure, too, that you get pictures as they find the gifts Christmas morning . . . and picture older members of the family as gifts are unwrapped.

Take your Christmas pictures as if you were filming a movie-try to all the light behind the tree, with a make them tell the complete story of Christmas. A full record of this sort is far more satisfying, and adds greatly to the family album or "picture history book.'

There is tragic irony in the coming of Christmas, 1939. Instead of the traditional "peace on earth, good will toward men," of which the angels sang more than nineteen centuries ago, war with all of its attendant evils stalks abroad throughout the earth. Never before in the history of mankind have so many men been under arms, and never before have so many dread engines of destruction threatened civilization itself with annihilation.

Already the skeptics are pointing the finger of scorn at Christianity and blaming it with the madness of the world.

Actually, however, while the prophets giving to Him a human mother in and the angels envisioned a peaceful world. Christ Himself forecast the opposite, although his life on earth coincided with the Pax Romanorum, or Roman peace, when outward peace prevailed because all peoples had been brought under the Roman yoke. Yet His parents had to flee with Him to Egypt to escape the bloody sword of Herod. and it was a Roman soldier's spear that pierced His side when life had ebbed away. His entire ministry was carried on in the shadow of threatened violence.

A Christmas Message to Youth By ARTHUR H. COMPTON

Nobel Prize Winner for Physics (Reprinted from the December Good Housekeeping)

CHRISTMAS comes again, with its age-old story of shepherds watching their flocks by night, of herald angels singing, and of Wise Men following a star to the birthplace of a King.

As these words are written, there seems little hope of peace on earth for many months to come. Yet, despite the rumble of guns abroad, I have a Christmas message to offer to my own countrymen. And I wish Christmas is the symbol of human progress, the keenest desire for which is manifest in youth. It stresses charity to the poor, care of the underprivileged, a chance for all. The Yule season is electric with the spirit of good will. It sometimes conquers even the hate of war. There are instances on record in the Civil War and in the First World War of enemy soldiers fraternizing on Christmas Eve.

It is this spirit of good will, of to offer it primarily to the twenty-

five million young Americans between fifteen and twenty-five years To you young people what Christmas symbolizes is of the greatest importance. You are on the threshold of opportunity. By your own leadership and by the ideals you in-

still in your children, you will determine what our country, and, indeed, the world, will be half a century from now. Six million of you are in high school; more than one million in college; twelve million are employed; six million are jobless. The same in the fortunate group still pursuing your education, or have found your place in industry, commerce, or a profession, or are unfortunate in a profession, or are unfortunate in ignorance, superstition, disease, not yet having found your place, the poverty, and underprivilege. It is in these practical human effects that modern science is most clearly distance.

Thank God this Christmas for freedom that is yours and that the spirit of Christmas gives you—the freedom to think as you please, to do as you will; to get an education, to plan a career; to marry and build a family; to share in government, to criticize public servants, to run for milee; to seek your fortune in the go forward. In spite of the turbulence in the world today, a tremendous program of advancement is way, born primarily of mis way. family; to share in government, to criticize public servants, to run for any office; to seek your fortune in high or low places; to have a home that is your castle; to worship or not as you desire; to rise or fall by your own efforts; to speak unhesitatingly what you think, without fear of reprisal; to have complete liberty of conscience, to be the ruler of your own destiny, the sovereign of your own personality.

These are some of the liberties in

These are some of the liberties in our land, the oldest of the world's great democracies — paradoxically, and significantly, located in the "new world." We have taken our liberties for granted like the six we breather. for granted, like the air we breathe, the telephone we use, the radio to which we listen. They seem automatic, as matter-of-fact as if they had always been ours. Yet these very liberties have been acquired, and can be taken away.

Because Christianity has emphasized the importance of the human spirit, it is the basis of the modern democratic idea of the rights of man, democratic idea of the rights of man, out of which in turn has come the best in modern science and social have the mistaken idea that science and religion. 


