

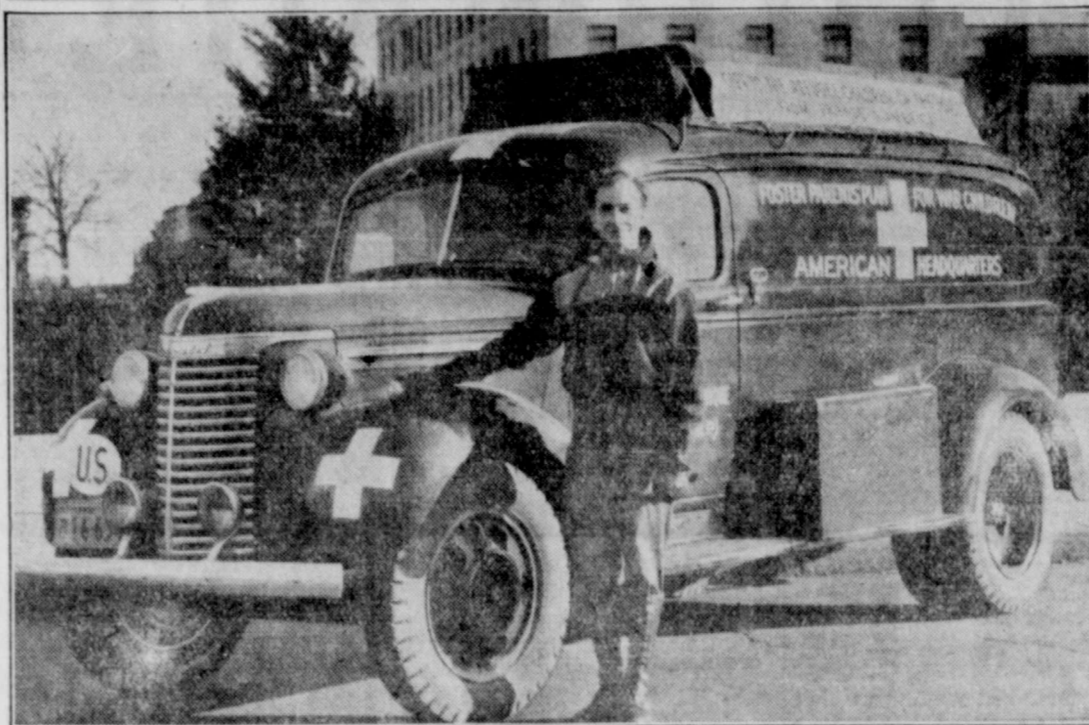

Hamilton

A vote of full confidence was given the school board of the Hamilton Independent School District last Monday, January 29, in the matter of making a great saving of interest on the sum of \$11,000 outstanding indebtedness on two bond issues for school purposes, one in 1909 and the other in 1917.

For the reason that the territory in the Pottsville section of Hamilton county is a proven gas field of pay production, and also because a fair showing of oil was made in the Lund No. 1 oil test, more than the ordinary interest is created throughout this part of the country by the preparations to spud in Lund No. 2 within the next two or three days.

The Hamilton County Commissioners' Court last Friday received formal notice that an allotment had been made by the State Highway Department to construct a bridge and approaches over Bear Creek on Highway 36, some eight miles west of Hamilton.

what we have done.
 "But you say, 'It is slow.' Of course, it is slow. Let me say to my Democratic colleagues one of the mistakes we have made in this Congress during recent years is that we have tried to move too rapidly. We have not been satisfied with a proposition that is fundamentally and basically sound if it requires a little time

to do the job. We have tried to reach up into thin air and snatch some panacea, some cure-all, that will do the job next week.

"I grew up, in a measure, with the farm tenancy proposition. I think I know something about it. I advocated a farm-purchase program before I came to Congress and before this law was ever passed. I have hoped and prayed that some program would

prove to be a sound solution of the farm problem.

"The President of the United States is for this program. The Budget is for it. The subcommittee which heard the testimony is for it. The Department of Agriculture wants it. The farmers of this country need it. Now, who is opposed to it?"

"I do not understand how you can cry out about an unbalanced budget when you are dealing

with a \$25,000,000 loan. You same men are going to vote over \$2,000,000,000 appropriation for armaments. Perhaps we need it, but that is what puts the Budget out of balance. It is not the \$25,000,000 that you are lending the little farmer.

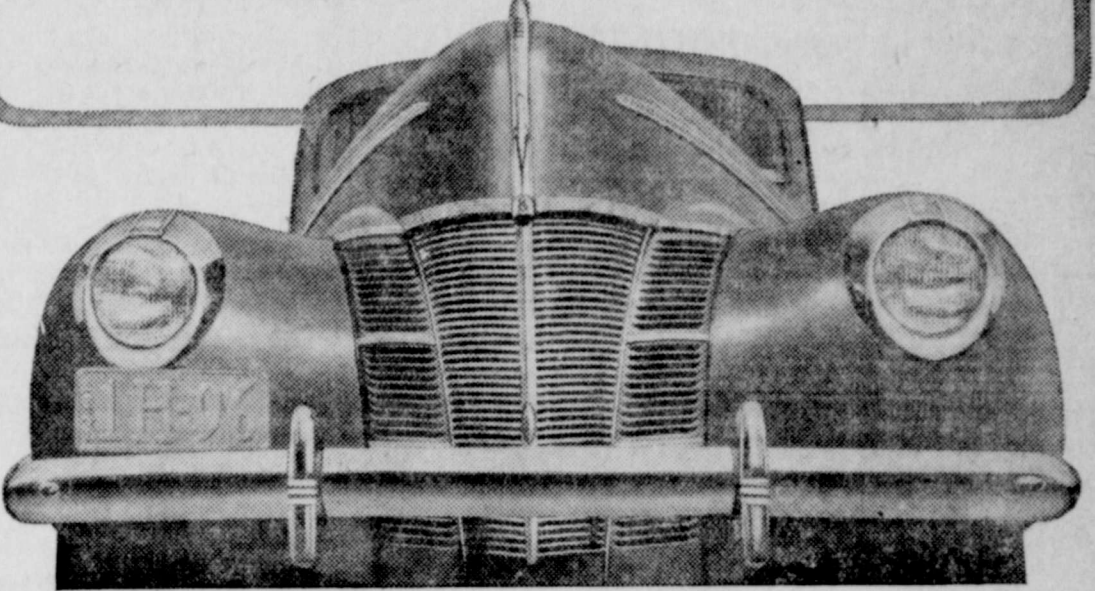

**New Drug Benefits
Pneumonia Victim**

Dallas.—Sulphapyridine bagged a goal this week to bring victory to Fred Soules in his battle with pneumonia in a Dallas hospital.

Soules was brought to the hospital in a critical condition. Sulphapyridine, which was administered to him, is a new drug, which has proved successful in over 75 per cent of its cases thru out the nation.

The remarkable new drug, which, during the past year, has reduced the number of deaths caused primarily by pneumonia from 90 to 10 per cent, started Soules on the road to recovery a few hours after being administered.

Soules' father, Luther Soules of Goldthwaite, feels that his life was saved last year by a kindred drug, sulphanilamide.

soil and water resources unless the people living on the watershed are benefitted. Damage to the watershed is important only because it damages the lives of people and threatens the general welfare, it was pointed out.

The Colorado survey, when completed, will make direct recommendations for a watershed control program. This constitutes the third step in bringing a control program into operation. The detailed survey will form the basis of definite recommendations to Congress. If and when Congress approves the recommendations and makes funds available for the work, a control program can be launched.

Based on favorable results obtained at erosion control experiment stations and in soil conservation demonstration projects, camps and state soil conservation districts, it is believed that the application of conservation practices to the agricultural lands of the watersheds of rivers and streams will have a definite place in the national flood control program in that it will:

1. Save the soil for productive use—a major objective of conservation, even aside from flood control aspects.
2. Eliminate what would otherwise be recurring minor floods.
3. Decrease the volume and velocity of surface run-off water and thus reduce the hazards of major floods.
4. Reduce the sedimentation of reservoirs constructed for flood control and other purposes, and
5. Minimize the silting of the stream channels and deposition on valley farm lands.

The desired control of erosion and the conservation of moisture on watersheds is obtained by the retirement of steep and severely eroded land from cultivation and the conversion of this land to grass and trees; the practical use of various adaptations of thick growing vegetation in pastures, meadows, woodlands, strip crops, cover crops, crop rotations and vegetated waterways; the use of engineering structures and mechanical devices such as contour furrows and ridges, terraces, temporary and permanent structures in small waterways, small reservoirs, small detention, retention and diversion dams, water spreaders and other devices for recharging underground water supplies.

The objective is to keep more of the water on the land where it falls and to insure the orderly drainage from the land of excess rainfall. This will aid materially in flood control in that it reduces the volume of water entering streams and rivers and keeps out soil washed into streams by uncontrolled rainfall run-off. The retention of soil and water on the land aids the farmer who must depend on these resources to make crops and at the same time contributes to the control of floods.
