## MILLS COUNTY GOES OVER THE TOP AGAIN

### FOR \$500 IN THIS IS GRAND SUCCESS

#### GOLDTHWAITE LIONS CLUB TO CONVENTION

CORPUS CHRISTI, July 17.—Members of the Goldthwaite Lions Club have been invited to accompany other Lions of Texas District 2-A in an automobile caravan to the International Lions Convention to be held in New Orleans July 22 to 25.

More than 500 automobiles from over South Texas will be in the caravan, which will assemble at Beaumont, Sunday, July 20, according to C. H. Grett of Corpus Christi, district International Convention chairman for the State Lions Organization, who is in charge of assembling delegates from District 2-A, in which Goldthwaite is located.

Texas is making an effort to have the largest delegation present at the convention, since Lion George Jordan of Dallas, present first vice-president of Lions International, will be elevated to the presidency.

District 2-A and District 2-S, the Houston district, will form the auto caravan, making the New Orleans trip together. Three other Texas districts, in the northern part of the state, will form a special train for the convention.

The caravan will assemble at Beaumont Sunday, July 20, and will make its headquarters for the night at Hotel Beaumont. Special entertainment will be offered visiting delegates Sunday night. The group will leave Beaumont at 8:15 o'clock Monday morning, July 21, with a State Highway Patrol escort, for New Orleans.

The caravan will make a rest stop at Lake Charles, La., and will have lunch at Lafayette, La., arriving in New Orleans late in the afternoon. Texas headquarters in New Orleans will be the Jung Hotel.

#### MILLS COUNTY MEN ENLIST IN AIR CORPS

### GATHERING OF ALUMINUM TO START IN COUNTY NEXT WEEK

#### EVERY HOME IN COUNTY ASKED TO GIVE METAL

A meeting of the Mills County Aluminum Collection Committee was held in the Commissioners' Court room at 3 p. m. Tuesday afternoon for the purpose of studying regulations for the aluminum drive.

Some of the local chairmen were not present. A list of local chairmen was published in the Eagle last week. Due to oversight, which was no fault of the Eagle, three local chairmen's names were left off the list. Chairmen have been appointed for each voting precinct in the county as follows:

Each local chairman will appoint a local committee to assist him in making the drive for scrap aluminum.

The following dates are suggested as a schedule to be followed all over the United States:

July 14 to 21—Local chairmen organize their committees and publicize the drive.

July 21 to 24—Get word around to people to have aluminum ready.

July 25, 26, 27—Gather aluminum from house to house and bring to central storage designated by local chairman.

July 29—Local chairman notify his County Commissioner where to pick up aluminum.

July 30—All aluminum brought to storage in Goldthwaite by county and city trucks.

It is very important that every household and business in the county be given an opportunity to contribute whatever scrap aluminum they have to spare.

All persons are requested to offer their services to their local chairman in making the drive. This may seem unimportant to some people, but remember there is a national emergency and there is a serious shortage of aluminum. Your scrap is needed, however small it might be.

It is hoped next week, all over the nation, to collect enough scrap aluminum to build 2,000 airplanes for Uncle Sam's defense effort.

#### BRADY SHEEP AND GOAT SALE HELD SOON

Sixteen breeders from this section of Texas have entered registered sheep and goats in the annual Brady Sheep and Goat Sale, which will be conducted at Brady, Texas, July 25 and 26 by the Brady Chamber of Commerce. P. E. Guiley, veteran breeder of Uvalde, has been engaged as auctioneer for the sale.

The above breeders thus far have entered 132 billies and nannies and 81 rams and ewes. This number will continue to increase, with no deadline on entries, according to Dick Moseley, chairman of the livestock committee of the Chamber of Commerce.

The two-day sale will be held at Richards Park grandstand, where pens will be arranged for the sheep and goats, and where the auction will be held.

### GOVERNOR O'DANIEL APPOINTS CO. CIVILIAN DEFENSE HEADS

#### COUNTY JUDGE TO HEAD THREE DEFENSE GROUPS

The Mills County Commissioners' Court in regular monthly meeting Monday discussed in detail their new duties as heads of the Mills County Civilian Defense organization. The County Judge was this week officially appointed chairman and the County Commissioners were appointed a committee to head the Mills County Civilian Defense movement by Governor W. Lee O'Daniel, head of the state Office of Civilian Defense, acting through Mayor LaGuardia, United States director.

The county judge and commissioners are to oversee the appointment of committees over the county at this time for three specific purposes: (1)—Organization of machinery for participation in the nation-wide movement to collect scrap aluminum for national defense purposes, which movement starts all over the United States next week; (2)—organization of aircraft warning service for Mills

### County Teachers Adopt 12-Year Plan For Schools

On Saturday, July 13, a meeting of teachers and trustees of Mills County met in the Commissioners' Court room for the purpose of discussing the advisability of changing the schools of Mills County from the 11-grade to the 12-grade system. Quite a large crowd attended and showed much interest. The discussion was led by G. D. Holbrook, deputy state superintendent. Present also were all members of the County Board, who called for an expression by teachers and trustees present as to their preference in the matter. The question was put to a vote and the crowd unanimously voted to institute the 12-grade system. Thereupon the County Board adopted the 12-grade system for Mills County and classified the schools accordingly. Final adjustments in classification of the schools was deferred to the regular meeting of the board on August 11.

A brief discussion of the new rural aid law was held and the general opinion was that it does not differ greatly from the expiring law. However, nobody can be certain as to the full interpretation of the law yet, as the law sets up a joint legislative committee to make rules of interpretation.

#### BAPTIST MEETING CLOSED WEDNESDAY

The Baptist Revival which has been in progress for the last ten days came to a close on Wednesday night, after a most successful and inspiring series of services.

A large number joined by letter and a good many were candidates for baptism, which took place at the Baptist Church on Thursday night at the Baptistry.

### AMERICAN LEGION COMMITTEE ORGANIZES TUESDAY NIGHT

#### WPA STREET AND ROAD IMPROVEMENT IN COUNTY FINISHED

The WPA projects covering street and road improvements in the City of Mullin and Precinct No. 3 was completed on July 3, according to John C. Stillely, WPA district director division of operations.

The project, sponsored by the City of Mullin and Mills County Commissioners' Court, began in November, 1940, and has employed an average of 44 workers with an average monthly payroll of \$1,467.00.

One mile of new county road was built under this project, including three concrete structures. In the City of Mullin there are 35 blocks to have a caliche top, including two concrete structures and 16 boxes, 2x1x30.

Other Improvements

Sponsored by the City of Mullin and Mills County, the WPA road and street improvement in Mills County was completed on July 3, according to John C. Stillely, WPA district director division of operations.

Operating since November, 1940, this project has employed an average of 40 workers with an average monthly payroll of \$1,500. WPA furnished \$13,203 and the sponsors \$4,846.81 of the amount spent on this work.

Work included grading, low-type surfacing, and construction of drainage structure on streets in the City of Mullin and on South Mullin and Goldthwaite road.

#### COMMITTEE TO ASSIST OFFICERS IN THIS COUNTY

At a called meeting of the Harry F. Edmondson Post of the American Legion held in the district courtroom at the courthouse Tuesday night, a permanent Mills County Defense Committee was organized. Representative and patriotic citizens from every section of the county, who had been previously invited by the American Legion, met with the Boys of 1918 and organized a committee for the purpose of reporting to the proper authorities any subversive or unpatriotic acts that may come to the attention of the members; and to run down and prove or disapprove any wild rumors that may be put into circulation in Mills County to the end that innocent persons may not be wronged by these unfounded accusations—as has already occurred in this county.

Lewis B. Porter was acting chairman of the meeting, and Sheriff Hern Harris was elected permanent chairman and Barton Smith was chosen vice-chairman. Charlie T. Wilson was appointed to serve as chairman of publicity.

Date for the next meeting of the committee was set by Chairman Harris as July 29. One matter—to be handled in secret—was turned over to the committee at the meeting.

At the meeting Tuesday night, Chairman Porter asked that a verse of America be sung, and that prayer be said by Post Adjutant Sansom, F. P. Bowman, Goldthwaite attorney, was called on and made a patriotic speech, in which he told of the difference in citizenship in a free country like America and in countries that had dictators.

County Judge R. J. Gerald, who is head of the aluminum drive that takes place in the county next week, outlined the plans for the drive to those present. S. J. Eaton of Mullin, Mills county chairman of the USO drive just completed, explained what he and his committee was doing, and told of the USO drive which was taking place all over the country. Mills County's quota of \$500 had then nearly been reached, and Charlie Frizzell read the list of donations from each community of the county. Mr. Eaton said 360 club houses would be built from this USO money over the United States, all to be near army camps in small cities. He said that about 130 Mills County boys were now in the armed services of Uncle Sam.

Sheriff Harris introduced Texas Ranger Dickson, who has been residing in Goldthwaite for the past six months, and who made a very interesting talk to the meeting. He stressed the fact that unfounded accusations against persons suspected of being unpatriotic were worse than no accusations at all, and that much money and time were now being spent in the state by having its peace officers run down false rumors that were started by some person to get even with an enemy.

CO. COMMISSIONERS' COURT COMMITTEE BEING ORGANIZED HERE-3 MAIN OBJECTIVES NOW

County Judge R. J. Gerald has received the following letter from Governor W. Lee O'Daniel in reference to organizing the county into a Civilian Defense group:

Austin, Tex., July 7, 1941. The United States Office of Civilian Defense has assigned certain responsibilities to the State of Texas and its political subdivisions. The direction of these activities in your county will call for your leadership as County Judge and for the cooperation of the Commissioners.

Action on three matters is indicated at this time, as follows:

(1)—Organization of Machinery for Participation in the Nation-wide Movement to Collect Scrap Aluminum for National Defense Purposes.

Mayor F. A. LaGuardia, United States director of Civilian Defense, has asked that we proceed at this time with the local organization of this movement. You, as county judge, are asked to be the ex-officio chairman for your county and to enlist the aid of the Commissioners to serve with you as members of the steering committee.

It is suggested that you ask the mayors of the incorporated towns in your county to serve as chairmen for their communities, and that such steps as you deem proper be taken to organize the unincorporated towns and the rural areas.

Mayor LaGuardia suggests that you or your chairmen for the cities and towns call upon the veterans' organizations, Girl Scouts, Boy Scouts, women's clubs, business and commercial organizations, and upon similar groups for co-operation. He also states that county farm agencies are available to help in the rural areas. The mayor will send detailed instructions later this week, and these will be relayed to you from this office.

(2)—Organization of Aircraft Warning Service for the State of Texas.

The office for Emergency Management has requested us to organize this activity in the State of Texas. In this instance, again, we shall make contact with the County Judge and the Commissioners as the local authority in the organization of the Observer Corps.

Under separate cover, I am sending you a manual entitled "Procedure for Organization of Observer Corps of the Aircraft Warning Service," which you can present to the Commissioners' Court.

On page four of this manual you will see a suggested procedure to be followed by the Court in setting up the organization.

You will note the suggestion that the personnel of this committee for your county—to be known as the Aircraft Warning Service Council—consists of the County Judge, the Commissioners, and additional members to be selected from veterans' organizations, civic organizations, service clubs, government agencies, fraternal organizations, and other groups which can aid in the civilian defense activity.

The American Legion of Texas has already made extensive plans for the participation of their organization in this patriotic movement. The Department Adjutant of the American Legion, Department of Texas, is notifying the Commander of each Post to call on the County Judge and offer the organization's co-operation.

I have also received an offer from the B'nai B'rith Brotherhood of America to furnish the co-operation of their 3,000 members in the State of Texas.

I am enclosing a multilithed list of their clubs in Texas so that you can seek the co-operation of the units located in your county.

Civil Service Exams For U. S. Positions

The Civil Service Commission has announced new examinations for filling six grades of positions for housing management supervisor, salaries ranging from \$2,600 to \$6,500 a year. An examination will be held for project auditor in the Quartermasters Corps, salary ranging from \$2,600 to \$5,600 a year. An examination for coal mine inspector for employment in the Bureau of Mines, salary \$2,600 to \$4,600.

Also announced were examinations to fill the positions of assistant inspector of hulls and assistant inspector boilers; for appointment in Washington, D. C., senior and junior blueprint operator and senior and junior photostatic operator.

## GOVERNMENT LOANS EXTENDED

Act of Congress, Title I, Section II, of the National Defense Finance Act has been extended to June 30, 1943. The new regulations became effective July 1, 1941.

### Key Features of Title I Loans

**CLASS 1 LOANS**  
Repairs to or in connection with existing structures: Maximum amount of loan, \$2,500; maximum maturity, 3 years, 32 days.  
Repairs to an existing dwelling designed for more than one family: Maximum amount \$5,000; maximum maturity, 5 years, 32 days.

**CLASS 2 LOANS**  
Non-residential buildings: (a) Non-agricultural—maximum amount, \$3,000; maximum maturity, 3 years, 32 days. (b) Agricultural—maximum amount, \$3,000; maximum maturity, 10 years, 32 days.

**CLASS 3 LOAN**  
Residential buildings: Maximum amount, \$1,000; maximum maturity, 15 years, 5 months.
