SAN ANTONIO, Tex., - Local defense councils and coordinators in the eighth region, including Texas, Oklahoma, New Mexico, Arizona and Colorado, were urged today by Regional Civilian Defense Director R. E. Smith to discourage all amateur investigative efforts in connection with suspected cases of espionage, sabotage, and "fifth column activity."

The President of the United States and National Defense Director LaGuardia have directed that all such investigative work be conducted by the Federal Bureau of Investigation with the cooperation of local peace officers, so that it can be correlated on a national basis, Mr. Smith said.

Some local defense councils in various sections of the nation are reported, Smith said, to have organized "intelligence divisions" and enrolled "secret observers" to do investigative work. This, he declared, is in violation of the national plans for civilian defense.

"Director LaGuardia has specifically requested that local defense councils and individuals refrain from such activity," said Mr. Smith. "Individuals who observe suspected cases of espionage or sabotage are asked to turn over whatever information they may have to local police authorities, or to communicate with the nearest local office of the Federal Bureau of Investiga-

#### The Bill of Rights In a World at War By GEO. C. HESTER

The celebration planned for our Bill of Rights Day this year has now been obscured by the momentous developments of the war. The day may even pass almost unmentioned.

In a larger sense, however, the real meaning of the Bill of Rights never conveyed a greater significance than now. The fundamental tenets of political faith which its provisions lay down, lie at the very basis of the democratic order which we are defending in this hour of trial.

The Bill of Rights constitute the first ten amendments to the national constitution. These are binding on the acts and operations of the national government. In a like manner each state constitution contains a Bill of Rights composed generally of the same principles, and are binding on their respective state govern-

In many ways the Bill of Rights is the most representative principle of constitutional government. It is here the individual can find the specific statements of the rights he can expect to enjoy. It states in summary form the results of the long struggle of mankind for personal liberty and religious freedom. It is the touchstone of democracy.

Briefly stated, these rights are as follows: (1) Freedom of religion; (2) Freedom of speech and press; (3) The right of petition; (4) Right to keep and bear arms; (5) Quartering of troops without consent of owner of any house in time of peace prohibited; (6) Freedom from unreasonable searches and seizures; (7) Just compensation for private property when taken for public use; (8) All the rights under the general term of "due process of law" such as habeas corpus. grand jury indictment, and all the safeguards of a fair and imparted jury trial.

There are several important points about the Bill of Rights that should be taken into consideration. In the first place, a Bill of Rights merely states the privileges that a citizen has the right to expect any system of government. We should remind ourselves, however, that it is only under a constitutional democracy that such rights exist at all. Under totalitarianism, for example, all rights exist in the state since all sovereignity or final authority exists in the state. The individual, therefore, has no rights of his own accord but only such rights as are implied in the state or those which the state wishes to give. The status of an individual is that of a mere subject under such systems.

In the second place, all our guarantees of freedom are conditional and limited. Freedom itself is relative, not absolute. No government, for example, can allow freedom to men, either in speech or action, who attempt to overthrow it. Generally speakng, a person is free to write and speak as he pleases so long as "it does not lead directly to disorder, violence, or a breach of law wherein the rights of others are infringed. No one, for example, has the legal right to cry "fire" in a crowded theatre merely to see the people rush from the building. Again the right to bear arms under the state constitution, becomes the privilege to bear arms under whatever reasonable restrictions the law may see fit to impose in the interest of public safety or welfare.

And lastly, in a time of war or great emergency, we should jember that constitutional liberties, may be severely restricted me being. In time of danger we must emphasize duties sacrifice instead of rights.

In 1918, for example, the most drastic restrictions on freedom speech were imposed by the Sedition Act. We are now probably ded into a time, when restrictions will be imposed upon us such we have never known. This is democracy's way of selfpreservaon. In short, a wartime democracy is one thing; a peacetime mocracy is another. It is by laying aside many of the rights and privileges in the fury of war that we preserve the opportunity of returning to them in the days of peace.

#### SMALL STONES ALSO SERVE

WHILE PILING STONES behind our new fence I was reminded of a story that David Grayson tells in his inspirng book, "The Countryman's Year."

"Yesterday," writes Grayson, "I was talking with an old country philosopher I know. He was laying a stone wall and commented on the indispensability of small stones to keep he large ones in place-to make the wall solid.

"And I was thinking," said he, "of the need of small men, ike me, to keep the big ones in place. They can't leave a man of us out."

"That's what they sometimes forget," said I.

"'Yes, sir, they forget-but it ain't for long. Their walls falls down "

In America today we need the small stones as well as the big stones to build up our wall of defense. Without the little men the big plant must close down. Without the united efforts of the little men the big cause may be lost. No matte: ow small we are, if we do our part, we can help hold up the

They had some wonderful high school bands, as well as police and firemen's bands. I had to catch the 9:15 plane back to Washington, so I missed the greater part of the exoition, but the glimpse of what the young people could do was a great satisfaction. I felt there was ential strength there which could be translated into sound and healthy

bodies as they grew up. I feel that our physical fitness nrogram should serve to awaken interest among young people and their elders to look into all available sources of material.

#### PLEDGES OF FREEDOM

Carl Sandburg has just sent our Office of Civilian Defense two short pledges, which I hope people will copy and carry around with them. The first is: "I pledge myself to be a little thoughtful every day about the meaning of freedom and how and why I am a citizen of a republic of free men and women, and how and why men and women toiled and fought yesterday for my freedom today.

If we bear this in mind, I think we shall have a greater sense of responsibility about the preservation our freedom today.

Mr. Sandburg's second pledge reads as follows: "I pledge myself to do a little thinking every day about the need of discipline and how, in a time of national danger e than ever, my own rights as a citizen are tangled and interwoven with the rights of others and these rights always deserve a decent respect."

#### HEALTH PROBLEMS

In New York city I went to America's Town Meeting of the Air. I enjoyed the program very much. As so often happens, I felt that many sides of the problem of health could not be covered, even in as long a period as we had on the air.

One thing I felt needed emphasis, namely, that the workers themselves, through their labor union organizations, are doing a great many things to improve their health. It seems to me that the employer has an obligation to use every safety device possible to prevent accidents and has an obligation to initiate other programs, with the idea of social welfare always in the background and the realization that health is a stepping stone to all real welfare and security.

But the employees also have a responsibility for plans and programs which they can work out themselves, or in co-operation with the employer. I think a shining example of this is Mr. David Dubinsky's International Ladies Garment tally, spiritually, and physically.

#### WOMAN'S LAND ARMY I have had so much enthusiasm

over the suggestion that a Woman's Land army might be needed. I know there are a great many women and young people who would welcome preparing for some definite thing. It is not in the province, of course, of the Office of Civilian Defense actually to carry out a program, but we hope before long to be able to suggest ways in which people can fit themselves to do whatever emergency work may be required in their communities when the summer comes.

There will be parts of the country where it will be possible to provide paid workers for farmers who need Wherever that is possible, it should be done. Volunteers may be needed in various specific ways, but they will be of value only if they have trained and disciplined themselves to stand outdoor work.

se "birthday" we celebrate. May Christmas, 1941, be the best you have ever spent. This is the writer's sincere wish for you. One way to make it just that is to diligently study our lesson for this next Sunday, which tells of the coming of God's Son.
