The engine is Case No. 1, brought back for the occasion from the Henry Ford museum, and the thresher is an Eclipse, both built in the late 1860's. The celebration was in honor of 100 years of threshing and farm power progress by the J. I. Case Co., whose founder built his first threshers in the county in 1842.

UNION GROVE, WIS.—The importance of farm food products in the war was emphasized as a century of progress in threshing and farm power was displayed at the 72nd annual meeting of the Racine County Old Settler's Society. Cradling and flailing were the most primitive steps. Then there was a demonstration of a one-horse treadpower driving a "ground-hog" thresher such as Jerome I. Case brought to Wisconsin in 1842. This was no more than a crude spiked cylinder which threshed the grain, after which the chaff had to be winnowed from the grain as after flailing.

Most spectacular of the demonstrations was a 12-horse sweephowered thresher. Six teams of horses walked in a circle to turn a "tumbling rod" that operated an Agitator threshing machine introduced in 1880. To show the type of equipment used at the time the Old Settlers' Society was organized, the Case Company brought back

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

Possibilities Of A Post-War Boom By GEORGE C. HESTER

As someone remarked, "These are days when fools and children sleep well." We are living in a period of supreme emergency. For three years we have watched the course of a war that has moved from climax to climax, a war that has pulled down dynasties, destroyed nations, uprooted millions of helpless peoples, and has already changed the political and economic face of the world.

To what fate are we being borne by that hurried tide of af-

Being a teacher of history, I am often asked what I think about the possible business and economic conditions which we shall face in this country when peace returns. The question, of course, assumes that the Allies will win a clear-cut victory, and the great nations such as the United States, England, Russia, and China, will "have free reins in directing the post-war ad-

It is dangerous these days to predict anything. On the other hand, nations that do not look forward are doomed. By this we mean the exercise of reasonable foresight by which we may be better prepared to face the facts, and thereby be better fortified against the hazards of the future.

There are today two widely contrasting viewpoints regarding post-war business conditions. There is first, the general assumption that a post-war depression is inevitable. Those who hold to this view, point out that depressions are the natural aftermaths of wartime booms. Such were our own experiences after the Civil War and after World War One. They further argue that this war has already upset and disarranged the business economy to an unprecedented extent. The future, they say, holds little more in store for us than withering taxation, governmental control and regimentation of our economic life, plus the possibilities of fiscal bankruptcy.

In recent months, however, another viewpoint is taking hold in this country. Instead of a depression, this viewpoint predicts a post-war boom of enormous proportions.

Upon what basis does such viewpoint rest? There are several economic straws in the wind which point to such a possibility Today, inventories are being eaten up. People will go on paying installments on homes, cars, refrigerators, furniture, and clothes which they bought last year, but they cannot buy new durable goods. This means our citizens will accumulate assets through an unprecedented volume of savings. Widespread rationing shead will limit further all purchases of durable goods for the dura-

The pepole today are paying their debts. Unless the war is over soon, Americans are going to emerge with more savings and freer personal and private debts than at any time since 1919. at the same time, an enormous reservoir of deferred demands for We are exhausting our peacetime assets of durable goods while such things as new homes, cars, furniture, and a hundred other | 10) needs is being built up. Next week this column will discuss other factors pointing toward the post-war business cycle and enumerate some of the nazards that must be avoided.

ABRAM: A PIONEER IN FAITH

LESSON TEXT-Genesis 12:1-9: He-GOLDEN TEXT—Fear not, Abram: I reward.—Genesis 15:1.

Without faith it is impossible to read the Bible and consider Christian experience, it is evident that God is constantly longing to show Himself strong in behalf of them who believe Him (II Chron. 16:9). Abraham was not the first man to walk by faith. Before him came such men as Abel, with his acceptable sacrifice; Enoch, with his walk pleasing to God; Noah, who believed and obeyed; and others.


