Make the boiling water cover the containers from 1 to 2 inches and keep it at this level throughout processing.

Put the top on the canner, Start counting processing time when the water begins to boil rapidly.

Process tomatoes for five minutes, whether you use tin or glass containers. This processing time applies only to altitudes of 1,000 fee tor less.
