

we have sold our entire stock of 12 and 16 gauge guns to the War Goldthwaite. Department for the purpose of training military personnel.Since that time we have offered the services of our entire organization to the War Department and they have asked that we procure for them all the good used 12 Goldthwaite. gauge automatic, pump action repeaters and double barrel shotguns possible. We have accepted this assignment from the government on a strictly nonprofit basis.

These guns are to be used for guarding purposes and to train our soldiers and sailors in the art of wing shooting. An airplane is like a duck-you have to lead it to hit it and a great many of our boys are not duck hunters. It is impossible for manufacturers to supply new shotguns as fast as they are needed; therefore it is up to all of us to see to it that the training program of our Army and Navy is not slowed down because of the lack of equipment

### FRUIT AND VEGETABLE RATIONING TO START The Art and Civic Club will OVER NATION MARCH 1

According to a newspaper dispatch from Washington this week, the OPA announced Tuesday that rationnig of canned and frozen fruits and vegetables and dried fruits will start on March 1. Grocery store sales of these commoditeis will stop at midnight Saturday, Feb. 20, and will not be resumed until March 1.

This "freeze" was set by officials for the purpose of allowing grocers to stock up, to arrange and mark merchandise, and undertkae other preparations for the complicated "point ration-

ing" system. Beginning February 22 and stretchnig over six days, the entire civilian population of the country will be registered in school houses and elsewhere for this new type of rationing, in a manner similar to the nationwide registration for sugar ra-

At this registration, everyone who can show he has war ration sheet for sugar and coffee, will be entitled to receive war ration book number two, which will be used both for canned goods beginnnig March 1 and will also be used about a month later for meat rationing.

Before getting the new ration book, however, each family will have to declare how many cans the family had on hand on February 21. From this number will be subtreated five cans for each person in the family, and coupons from the new book will be torn out for any cans in excess of five per person.



### State Department Health Notes

INFLUENZA

With the incident of influenza winter advances, Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer, this week issued a warning to the public to guard against exposure to this disease.

"Influenza patients should be isolated as nearly as possible to avoid spreading the disease." Dr. Cox said. "The germ is believed to be spread from person to person through discharges from the nose and throat."

To protect yourself and others! from this disease. h things to be remembered::

Influenza is highly infectious Practically everybody is susceptible to it. No matter how many times you have had the disease you may contract it again Therefore, keep away from people who are sneezing, coughing, or sniffling who are actively ill with colds, influneza, or pneumonia. Keep away from crowded places. Have your own towel and always wash your hands before eating, and sneeze or cough into your handkerchief.

Keep fit by drinking plenty of water, by eating simple nourishing food, by some exercise out of doors every day, by dressing according to the weather, by having plenty of sleep in a well ventilated room, and by keeping the bowels regulated.

Don't neglect your "cold." If you have the slightest suspicion of fever go home, go to bed immediately and call your physician. Stay in bed until he tells you that you can get up, and follow his advice implicity.

Lesson for February 7

JESUS AFFIRMS HIS DEITY LESSON TEXT—John 8:12, 25-36, 56-59 GOLDEN TEXT—He that hath seen me hath seen the Father.—John 14:9.

"The Light of the World Is Jesus!" Who does not remember with what delight we as children sang, "Come to the light, 'tis shining for thee . The light of the world is Jesus.

How precious was the truth that thus flooded our souls. Jesus is the light. Just as the sunlight sheds its glory on an awakening world at dawn, so He sheds abroad the light of God in the hearts of men. As this portion of God's Holy Word is studied and taught, may the light break forth on many a soul caught in the bewilderment of this dark

But that is only one of the great thoughts around which our lesson simple words, each fraught with rich meaning. I. Light (v. 12).

The text says: "Then spake Jesus." When? Just after He had "Then spake silenced the hypocritical accusers of a woman taken in sin, and had spoken the word of peace to troubled soul. (No. 5 of a Series)

### HEAD OF FAMILY EXEMPTION

A single person, or a married person not living with husband or wife, is entitled to a personal exemption of \$1,200 for the year if he can qualify as head of a family. A head of family is "an individual who actually supports and maintains in one household one or more individuals who are closely connected with him by blood relationship, relationship by marriage or by adoption, and whose right to exercise family control and provide for these dependent individuals is based upon some moral or legal obligation."

The term "closely connected by blood relationship" applies to a person's progenitors and lineal descendants ( to his brothers or sisters, whether by the whole or half blood, and to his uncles, aunts, nephews, and nieces. Irrespective of any legal obligation of the taxpayer to support such dependent relatives, a moral obligation to do so exists, and if the individual is actually supporting and maintaining in one household relatives of this degree he is entitled to head of family exemption.

A taxpayer is considered to be "closely connected by marriage" with his step-sisters and stepbrothers, but whether his right to exercise family control and provide for these individuals is based upon some moral or legal obligation must be decided upor The same considerations apply to the status of a taxpayer because of support furnished to his father-in-law, mother - in - law, brother-in-law, and sister-inlaw. First cousins by blood, and cousins of lesser degree, are not regarded as so "closely connected by blood relationship," as to give rise to a head of family exemption.

A legal guardian who may maintain and support in his home a dependent ward is not enttiled to the personal exemption as head of a family if the ward was not connected with him by relationship of blood, marriage or adoption; nor is a taxpayer entitled to exemption as head of a family by virtue of maintenance and support of a child not legally adopted.

Registration of institutional users for their February allotment of coffee began on January 15 and will end on February 5, A. T. Pribble, Chairman of the Mills County War Price and Rationing Board, reminded cafes and other institutional users this

At the same time, Mr. Pribble pointed out that with this registration of institutional users with the War Price and Rationing Board, the allotment period 1-29-ok for coffee will become one month for such institutional users, instead of two months as in the past. Thus, all institutional users will receive allotments for the month of February only.

"The February allotment percentage will be only 40 per cent of the base," Mr. Pribble explained. "For example, if an institution used 400 pounds of coffee in September and 400 pounds in October, 1942, the base would be 800 pounds; and using that total as a base, the allotment for February would be 40 per cent of 800 pounds, or 320 pounds." Another amendment to the

Coffee Rationing Regulaitons also has changed the basis for allotments for institutional users who were not in operation between Sept. 1, 1942, and Nov. 21 1942.
