According to a new WPB priority regulation, a dealer must furnish farm supplies if a farmer signs a certificate stating:"I certify to the War Production that the supplies covered by this quality, full -fashioned rayon order are needed now and will be used for the operation of a farm." Maternity Care Provided

Wives of men in the four lowest pay grades of the armed forces can now get maternity care plus medical, hospital, and nursing care for their babies in 23 states without cost to the family, the Children's Bureau of the U. S. Department of Labor has announced. To apply for such aid the wife must fill out a form secured from the State Health Department. Additional states are expected to have ap-

proved programs soon.

Milage From Scrap Tires To obtain additional milage from tires that can be made servicable with the addition of reliners, the Office of Rubber Director has excluded reusable tire carcasses from rubber scrap going to reclaiming plants. To relieve lumber shortages on farms for all repairs except those to farm dwellings, WPB has set aside a total of 500 million board feet of lumber for delivery on an AA-2 preference rating during June, July, August and September. Farmers who cannot obtain lumber with present ratings, should apply to the county farm rationing committee for certificates to purchase lumber for maintenance, repair and new construction necessary o the food production program







THE WORLD'S GREATEST NEED

By J. S. BOWLES

JAPOLEON BONAPARTE is reported to have said in substance I that the worlds' greatest need was mothers. He was possibly thinking of mothers to bring children into the world for mere war purposes. I have in mind mothers who are capable of rearing children who would furnish the future with a worthy citizenship. This, to my mind, is the greatest need of the world.

Not long since I heard a leading Texas preacher tell a story that drove this thought to my mind as but few things have done. He said the police of a certain city had telephoned to a mother that her young daughter was at a certain night club, intoxicated and on the way to ruin, and suggested that she come for her and take her home. For Answer the mother told the officer to bring her home. On being informed that the city had no taxies for H. Clements were surprised such purposes, the mother made reply: "Then let her stay there!"

The thought was so repulsive to me that I purported never to repeat this story, but a story in a recent issue of a great city daily changed my mind. The world needs such information.

In substance the city paper told of the arrest of three girls in a garage apartment and placed in jail. On examination one was found to be from a prominent, well-to-do family of the city. An attempt was made to persuade the girl to return to her home and start life over. This she refused to do, saying that she preferred to return with her companions to her garage apartmen to live her life of crime.

Finally a case worker was dispatched to the home to interview the young girl's mother. In her desperation to find a solution for her problem, she asked the mother if she had ever tried to get her daughter to go to school, church or Sunday school. The mother made answer, "No, and I don't care where she goes!

The world's greatest need is for mothers of the right kind, and this is not the right kind. While we have such, we shall most certainly have criminals to deal with.

SCRAP DRIVE STILL ON

MORE THAN 450,000 pounds of badly-needed copper and brass scrap were moved to processors for melting from Southwestern yards during the three-week period between May 1 and May 22, according to figures just released by Gen. John A. Hulen WPB regional salvage manager. Dealers' copper scrap inventories on May 22 were shown as 3,633,905 pounds compared to 3,099,000 pounds on February 28 this year.

FARMERS FED UP

MANY LARGE DAIRIES have gone out of business. More and more is the nation having to rely for its food on the family farm where the members get up in the early hours, milk the cows, tend to the farm during the day, milk the cows at night, and at a late hour call it a day, go to bed, and get up to do the job all over again, seven days a week.

If the farmer worked the short hours and received the high pay of workers in war industries who are constantly striking for even higher wages, those workers would probably be paying a dollar a quart of milk.

Nature's requirements on the farm recognize no artificial producton limitations and slow-down sabotage.

There are two good places to put strikers today-in the Army and on the farms. They would then get an idea of what real work is.

AIR FIGHTERS WANTED

IF YOU WANT TO FIGHT for your country in the air, where there is need for your skill and daring-if you want to be ready for a future career in aviation—the opportunity to i Aviation Cadet is still open.

Applicants are enrolled in one of several score of colleges or universities for a five-month preparatory course. This is known as the pre-flight training program. After applicant has completed his pre-flight training he is then classified as a bombardier, navigator, or pilot. Bombardiers receive 27 weeks of instruction, navigators 33 weeks, and pilots 36. This instruction is divided into four courses.

Applicants who successfully complete aviation cadet (air crew) training are commissioned second lieutenants and appointed flight officers.






