# RAIN REPORT

and clouds threatening rain put new life into citizens of drouthstricken Mills County this weekend. Goldthwaite got a shower which registered 08-100ths Wednesday afternoon, and Thursday afternoon was threatening rain

Reports from Priddy yesterday fternoon stated it was sprink-Wednesday; Center City, sprinkled Wednesday and sprinkling Thursday afternoon.

Today is Goldthwaite's birthlished on September 3, 1885.

It really has been dry in Goldthwaite and Mills County for the past three months-and, in fact, since last October, when the last good rain of 6.14 inches was recorded here by Harry Allen, who who has kept the records for the U.S. Government for the last ten years.

Only 1.09 inches of rain has been recorded here in Goldthwaite during the last three months, although some sections showers that failed to fall in Goldthwaite. Mr. Allen's records show that in June .92 inches of rain fell here, in July .17 inches and in August-none. During the year 1942, 3.42 inches were recorded in August, 2.86 in September, and 6.14 in October. For 1941, 2.66 inches in August, 2.17 inches in September, and 4.63

inches in October. The years 1938 and 1939 were dry in the summer, with 1.98 inches in August and only .01 in September for 1938 with 1939 registering 3.27 inches in August and .79 in September.

Total rainfall for the first eight months-January through August-for the last three years follows: 1941, 27.15 inches; 1942, 24.87 inches; and 1943, 8.45 inches

armed guard crew of a ship identified only as a U. S. merchantman. Somewhere on the high seas she was attacked, but survived. Again the ship was struck by a torpedo which tore her in half.

It was then, the citation accompanying the award said, that Baker "assisted in lowering a life boat, but with utter disregard for his own personal safety refused to abandon ship in order not to overcrowd the boat.

"Remaining aboard the stricken ship, he watched until the craft was safely launched, then assisted in cutting the lines which enabled his comardes to escape from the sinking vessel.'

Secretary of the Navy Frank Knox, who signed the citation for the President, said of Baker 'His gallant self-sacrifice and outstanding bravery were in keeping with the highest traditions of the United States Naval ervice.

Boatswain's Mate Baker enlisted in the Navy in Dallas in September of 1939, his service record revealed.

We have our own bn. show and we go practically every night. We get our cigarettes for 50 cents a carton; everything is pretty cheap at the post exchange, but the natives try to hold us up if we try to buy something from them.

The natives are very friendly toward us in some way, especially when we buy coconuts and bananas from them. We have to make signs on our hands to make them understand what we want. They practically go wild over a cigarette or chewing gum.
