FAT SALVAGE COLLECTS 810,000,000 LBS. IN PAST 5 YEARS

In five years of operation, the American Fat Salvage Program has been responsible for collections of used fat amounting to 810 million pounds, it was announced by Roy W. Peet, chairman of the Committee. Mr. Peet pointed out that during the past 60 months, and average of 13 million 500 thousand pounds of badly needed fats and oils were saved from going down the drain and turned over to industry each month. Of the total amount of fats and oils salvaged, 625 million pounds were saved in American homes and the remaining 185 million pounds were recovered by the armed services.

The Fat Salvage Program was instituted in August, 1942, as a Government-industry sponsored project to alleviate the critical shortage of fats and oils brought about by the war. From that time to date, the program has contributed approximately 10 per cent of total domestic production of industrial fats and oils.

With the end of the war in August, 1945, the United States, as well as the entire world, still faced an acute shortage of these vital raw materials. With the cessation of hostilities, the military contribution became smaller and the job of salvaging kitchen grease in the home became even more important.

FLOWER GARDEN CHECK LIST

College Station, August 21—Here's a late August and early September check list for your flower garden. It comes from J. F. Rosborough, extension horticulturist of Texas A. & M. College.

1. Cut old blossoms and seed pods from crepe myrtle and other plants. It will keep them blooming longer.
2. Make out your list of bulbs to plant this fall. An early order gets the choice ones.
3. Order flower seeds to be planted this fall. Calendula, petunia, dianthus, pansy, stock, hardy poppies, cornflower, scabiosa and candytufts are recommended.
4. Chrysanthemums are heavy feeders; they need a monthly shot of commercial fertilizer and plenty of water. Stake plants. Pinch off some of the early buds.
5. If you have any thin spots in the lawn, mow the grass high, fertilize and water.
6. After perennial phlox and verbena have passed their glory, cut the tops back pretty severely, fertilize and water for lots of late blooms.
7. Trim back limbs and twigs from shrubs and shade trees that are growing out of proportion for the rest of the plant.
8. While your plants are still in bloom make a few notes on the changes you will want to make for next season.

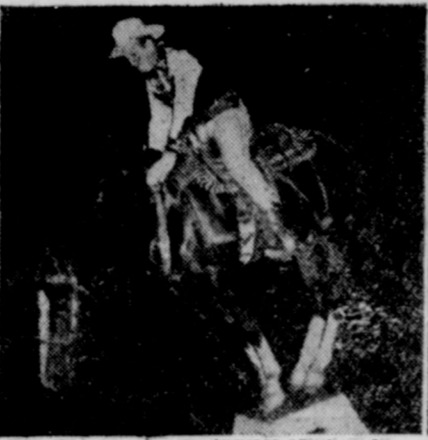

Swing Of Southwest Farm Market

Lower prices for cotton and some livestock and vegetables marred otherwise steady to strong prices for southwest farm products last week, according to the Production and Marketing Administration, U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Most grains advanced steadily last week, influenced by continued dry weather in much of the corn belt, and by anticipated large exports requirements of wheat. No. 1 hard wheat reached \$2.50 per bushel Friday at Fort Worth and Galveston and white corn rose to \$3.05 to \$3.09.

Light supplies of top quality eggs sold firm to slightly higher last week, and lower grades held up fairly well. Best eggs brought from 47 to 54 cents per dozen at principal southwest markets. Poultry prices stayed about the same. Heavy hens drew 22 to 25 cents per pound at Fort Worth and Dallas, and fryers 35 to 40 cents.

Most cattle classes sold strong to higher last week, but steers and yearlings lost cents to a dollar at some places and beef cows weakened at Fort Worth and Houston. Good beef cows brought \$13 to \$15.50 at Houston and San Antonio.

Sheep markets remain largely about steady to a little stronger, but spring lambs dropped 50 cents at Wichita Falls and \$1.00 or more at Denver. Spot cotton prices declined 75 to \$5.50 last week, as liberal new crop offerings in Southwest eased the most urgent demand. Farmers sold readily in Central and North Texas, where picking of some month-opened cotton started.

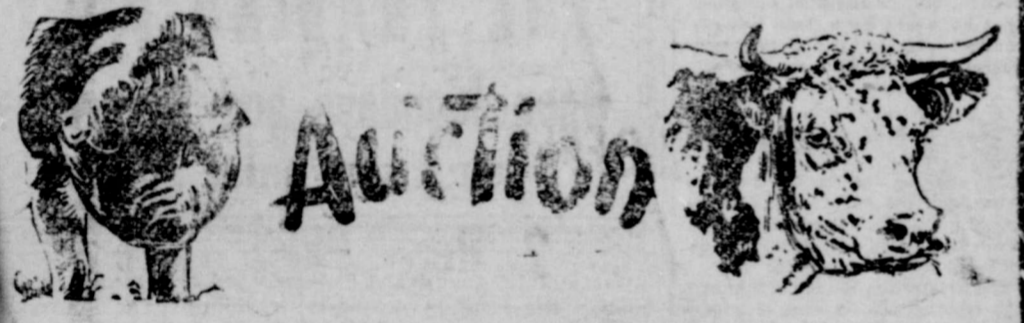

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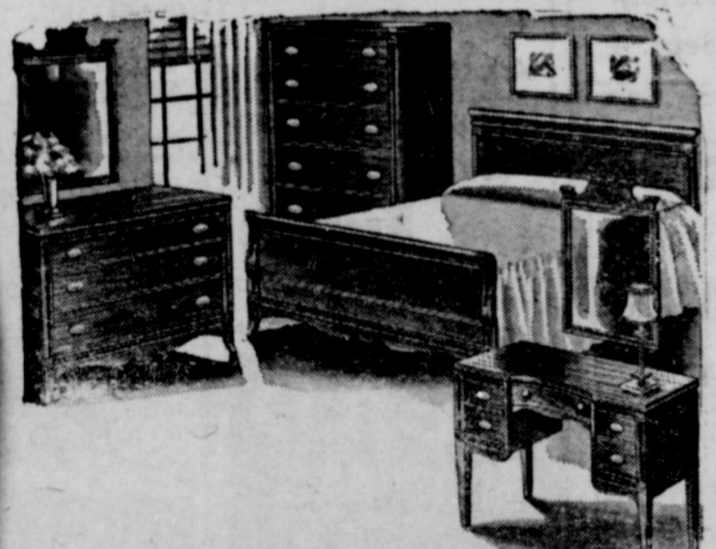

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Wide Periodic Motor Vehicle Inspection Important In Prevention Of Highway Accidents



One of these cars was in the act of passing another car as he neared the crest of a hill. He collided head-on with a car coming over the brow of the hill, and with the terrific impact the lighter car was crushed under the heavy one. The driver of this car was killed—so was the other driver, and a third person seriously injured. Passing on blind curves and on hills is a dangerous habit. Improper passing accounted for more than 100 highway deaths and injuries in 1946, according to the National Conservation Bureau.

After traffic safety results of frequent inspections. This has been the experience of many cities having a periodic inspection program. The use of periodic motor vehicle inspection is to discover any adjustments in vehicles that lead to accidents and, correcting those maladjustments, to prevent accidents.

There are 10 major benefits from motor vehicle inspection:

- (1) It improves the general standard of vehicle condition.
- (2) It maintains an automobile at a higher value level lessening depreciation.
- (3) It affords opportunity to check motor and serial numbers actually on the vehicle against registration certificates, and in other ways to assist in the enforcement of motor vehicle laws.
- (4) It improves the quality of garage workmanship in making adjustments and repairs.
- (5) It provides an excellent opportunity to inform drivers of the condition of their vehicles and their responsibility for driving safely 365 days in the year.
- (6) The psychological effect on the driver is considerable, for a motorist who has been shown that his brakes meet on the minimum requirements tend to drive more carefully.
- (7) Inspections also help to educate and keep car owners aware that certain parts need periodic attention and that it is so expensive to have the vehicle checked regularly and kept in repair than to wait until a breakdown occurs.

(8) Rejection of a vehicle informs the motorist in a specific way that he is driving an unsafe car, and that as a consequence he is liable to be held as the negligent party in the event of a collision with a car that has been properly maintained.

(9) The driver who subjects his car to periodic inspection tends to cooperate with enforcement officers and the general public in the observance of traffic rules and regulations.

(10) Periodic inspection provides for the motorist an inexpensive maintenance service not available elsewhere.

In 1946, police officers of the United States, Canada and Honolulu, examined nearly 3 million vehicles during a six-week accident prevention program. They found that 32.3 per cent of all vehicles examined—nearly one third—had obvious and hazardous mechanical defects.

A total of 2,860,346 vehicle checks were made. Of this number, 922,775 had one or more defects. The total number of defects reported by types was 1,231,161—almost one dangerous defect for every two cars examined.

In the United States, 2,718-076 vehicles were checked: 872-290 or 32.1 per cent had defects. In Canada police checked 128-814 vehicles, 44,107, or 34.2 per cent of which were defective.

In the state of New Jersey, during the first motor vehicle inspection year, there were 413 fewer fatalities, or a reduction of 30 per cent, as compared with the preceding year. Total reportable accidents and non-fatal injuries also decreased 13 per cent. This substantial reduction has been consistently sustained through the years.

Motor vehicle inspections in the United States have been recognized as an accident prevention medium since 1927, when several eastern states developed "Save A Life" campaigns.

There has been a steady development to a pre-war total of 8,500,000 motor vehicles being regularly inspected from one to four times each year in 17 states and 15 cities.

Now, two years after V-J Day, this nationwide program has been 100 per cent resumed with at least 2 states added to the list and 10 additional ones giving serious consideration to legislation requiring periodic motor vehicle inspection in the interest of accident prevention.

ATTENTION TURKEY GROWERS

Thanks to Dewey Gerald for furnishing two turkeys to be taken to the Division of Veterinary Science at A. & M. College, we were able to find out what ails our turkeys. Last year several flock owners had trouble with their turkeys getting down in their legs, with the result being tramped to death or having a crooked breast if they lived.

This year the same thing is beginning to appear, and from Dr. Boney's diagnosis it looks as if it might continue. He says the turkeys are affected with a fowl malaria (Haemoprotozoa) for which there is no preventative or treatment that is known of at present. Mosquitos transmit this disease from infected birds to non-infected and if there is any way you can keep the mosquitos from biting the birds then it may be possible to accomplish preventative measures. Fly sprays may be of some benefit but you must be careful in that sometimes it blisters the heads of the birds.

One bright side of the disease is that losses usually subside when cool weather begins.

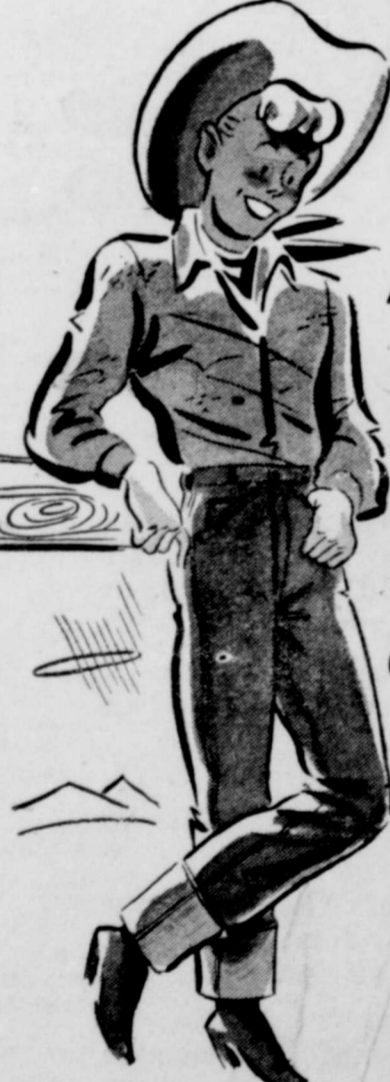
