to be its best school term in all history. With a teaching staff of 21 well-qualified teachers which the superintendent says is the best he has ever had, Supt. H. E. Patton announced

this week that everything was

ready to go Monday morning. The lunchroom, in charge of Mrs. L. J. Teague, will be open the first day. Price of lunches will have to be increased to 25 cents this term, due to the fact that the federal subsidy has been cut from nine to six cents. which applies to all schools generally, and to the increased cost of food.

Students and pupils starting to school Monday will find the two streets leading from the business and residential section of town have been paved, and the people of the town are working to have sidewalks built for the ones who walk.



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

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

#### EDUCATING WOMEN TO BE NURSES

With the aim of educating more women for the nursing profession to help relieve the present shortage of graduate nurses, the five Baptist hospitals in Texas are this month launching an intensive student nurse recruitment program preliminary to the opening of new freshmen classes in their schools of nursing in September.

Personal appeals will be issued to young women aged 17 to 35 through Baptist churches and Sunday schools over the state, to interest them in preparing for the nursing profession. Speakers will outline to the girls the advantages nursing offers of a well-paid livelihood, position of community prestige and an opportunity to aid suffering humanity, officials stated.

"The demand for nurses far exceeds the supply," Andrew Q. Allen, volunteer director for the nurse re-

cruitment campaign, stated. "Unless more young women answer the call and enter nursing, the people of this country will suffer for lack of adequate care in time of sickness. The shortage in civilian hospitals has been acute since the beginning of war and has not been relieved since war's end because of the great number of nurses now required in veterans' hospitals."

The varied fields open to graduate nurses today include hospitals, doctors' offices, industry, public health agencies, government service, nursing school aculties and foreign missionary work. All are in esperate need of more nurses.

Augustine was right when he said that man could be satisfied with no less than God

Test for leaking by closing the door on a piece of ordinary wrapping paper about the size and thickness of a dollar bill. If than eight hours out the motor runs more the paper pulls out easily, the gasket is not tight enough to to the refrigerator. This may be because the rubber in the gasket has become brittle and hard. Or it may be the fault of the door. Try tightening hinges or latch to make the door fit more snugly. Test again with paper. If the door still is not tight, get a new gasket.

If the temperature is normal and the door does not leak, but the refrigerator still runs too much, call in a serviceman




