### **MILLS COUNTY BOYS BREAK** TWO ALL-TIME RECORDS AT **4-H CLUB LIVESTOCK SHOWS**

James Horton's 800-pound Hereford steer calf, "Late Model," last Friday was judged the Grand Champion of the San Angelo Livestock Show-making three Grand Championships won by Mills County 4-H Club Boys in three state livestock shows entered this year.

Young Horton's "Late Model" also won the Grand Champion place in the Brownwood Show late in January.

He is the 19-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Willis Horton who live four and a half miles southwest of Star. His calf was the first to be auctioned at San Angelo Monday morning, and brought \$1.50 per pound. The two livestock commission companies there were successful

Also adjudged winners in the show at San Angelo were Marion Reynolds, woh won 7th and who took 8th place.

Mills County Agent Darlus B. McCombs took 4-H Club boys and their calves to three state Champion ribbons and one Reserve Champion.

Mills County is believed to have won two all-time records with their calves in the past two years-winning the highest honors two yeras in succession at the Houston Show, with one Reserve Champion place, .. and .. winning . three Grand Champions this year in three shows entered, with one Reserve Champion.

Last year, Jim Bob Steen took Grand Champion honors at the Houston Show and Allen Poe of Star won Reserve Champion place.

#### HOUSTON WINS

This year, Mills County 4-H boys took 22 steer calves and entered them in the Houston Show. Twenty came out in the money. The boys brought back a truck load of ribbons, and \$492 in prize money-not counting the \$12.500 Robert Henry Johnson, 16-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Johnson of Goldthwaite, got when his calf was auctioned there. His calf, "Kilroy," won Grand Champion place, and Marion Reynolds, 15year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Deward Reynolds of Caradan, who entered "Butch," got Reserve Champion place.

the Goldthwaite Independent School District has unanimously called a bond election to be held on Saturday, March 20, to see if the qualified voters of the district will approve the issuance of bonds in the amount of \$75,000 to be used for building a new Gymnasium and adding additional classrooms and making other improvements to the present school system, principall on the High School Building.

If the voters approve the issue, the bonds are to be retired over a period of 20 years, will not draw more than three and one-half per cent interest, and will not cost the taxpayers one cent in additional taxes. It will not be necessary to raise either the present tax rate of \$1 on the \$100 valuation to retire the bonds.

Sergeant Dyches went over- the present time. seas with the 60th Coast Artillery Regiment 8 October 1940 and was stationed on Corregidor Island. He transferred to the Infantry 1 January 1942 and began instucting Philippine Army recruits in fundamentals of foot soldiering on Mindanao Is-

May 10, 1942, will long be remembered by Sergeant Dyches, for it was on that day that he was captured by the Japs on the Island of Mindanao in the Southern Philippines.

He was sent to the prison camp at Malay Balay on Mindanca for six months. From there, he was sent to the Davao Penal Colony on the southern tip of Mindanao where he was imprisoned until April 1944. Continuing his prison camp itinerary. Sergeant Dyches was then moved to Bilibid in Manila and then to Cabanatuan Prison on the Island of Luzon. Next was a filthy boat ride to Toyko, Japan, where he was imprisoned in a steel mill in September 19-44. He remained there until 14 May 1945 when he was sent to a copper mine prison 100 miles north of Tokyo

His prison camp tour finally ended 25 August 1945 when United States Navy planes dropped badly needed supplies of food, medicine and clothing to the prisoners. 20th Air Force B-29 Superfortresses dropped cigarettes a few days later.

Sergeant Dyches was flown in a C-54 to Okinawa on 5 September 1945. Three days later he flew to Manila in a C-47. He sailed into San Francisco harbor on 3 October 1945, almost five years to the day after leaving the shores of the U.S.





## A SPRING GARDENS

College Station, Mar. 2-The spring garden situation is running a little behind schedule in soil preparation due to the recent unfavorable weather the past 30 days, says J. F. Rosborough, extension horticulturist of Texas A. & M. College, and most gardeners have not been able to get their soil ready at the right time. January's weather brought soil temperatures down pretty low, and in many localities the

soil is extremely wet. At the first chance, when the sun warms up things a little, the soil should be plowed into beds; wait several days, then rebed to increase warmth of the soil, and to aerate the soil through plowing.

Commercial fertilizer should be applied seven to ten days before seed planting time; five or of row is good, will provide a quick meal for the young plants and stimulate early growth.

Barnlot fertilizer is a good substitute for commercial fertilizer in the blackland areas of Texas. Use 50 to 100 pounds of foot row space.

THE first impression I get from this story is the fact that these people of Ephesus loved Paul. They loved him enough to lay aside their work and hasten to the near-by seaport of Miletus to see him for the last time, and to bow down in his presence and honor him.

Why did they thus love Paul? Because he had told them about God. You need but read again the record of Paul's ministry in that important city of Ephesus to be reminded of how greatly he had served them in the name of Jesus.

Loved and honored! What a trib ute to the worth of Christian character! Wouldn't you appreciate the tribute which they paid Paul as the goal out yonder to which you strive? Boys and girls of today may thus be ored tomorrow, if they will live for Jesus as Paul did.

THE POWER OF RIGHT LIVING PAUL not only told the Ephesians how to live, but illustrated day preached to them. The most eloquent sermons are not spoken, but lived. "What you are speaks so loud-

PAUL'S CONSUMING PASSION

WE ARE what we are becoming and never was this axiom of life more powerfully illustrated than in the case of Paul. "I press on toward the goal for the prize of the upward call of God in Christ Jesus," Philippians 3:14. And in Ephesians 5:6-21, Paul reviews the qualities of conduct which produce worthwhile character, admonishing all Christians to strive for these qualities.

"I live, yet not I, Christ liveth in me," is another of Paul's watchwords, and still again, "I can do all things through Christ, who strengtheneth me."

It was the consuming passion of his life to embody the teachings of Christ in his words and in his works. #### "Pitted" Pastures Produce More Grass

As reported by A. L. Nelson, Robert Lang and Oscar Barnes of Wyoming Archer Field Experiment Station

"Pitting" pastures has stepped up grazing capacity of range land by as much as one-third, according to the Archer Field Station in southwestern Wyoming. "Pitting" is a simple mechanical treatment. It can be done with a one-way Wheatland plow with alternate eccentric disks. These eccentric disks leave a waffle-like surface with pits about 16 inches apart. The pits trap water, help produce more grass.

The eccentric disks are 2 inches larger than the others, with the gang bolt hole 2 inches off center. In mounting the eccentrics, you start from the rear and replace every other disk with an eccentric. Mount the first eccentric with the long side up, the second with the long side to the rear, the third

with the long side down, and the fourth with the long side to the front. Continue in the same rotation until all disks are

Best time to pit is early spring, before much plant growth has started. The cost runs from 50 cents to a dalar an acre.
