HUNDREDS OF PEOPLE, FREE BARBECUE TO GREET JOHNSON



When Cong. Lyndon Johnson arrives here Monday at 12 noon in his helicopter and settles down on the old ball park just west of the auction barn, he will be greeted by hundreds of people who will hear his speech and eat free barbecue luncheon furnished by Mills County Johnson-for-Senate supporters. The luncheon is to be served under the shade trees in Legion Park. The barbecue luncheon is all free, but you are asked to telephone No. 46 and give your name in order that your ticket can be reserved in advance and enough barbecue can be prepared to serve all present. The crowd is expected to number well over a thousand.

Congressman Lyndon Johnson of Johnson City, Texas, and candidate for United States Senator will bring his whirlwind campaign to Goldthwaite Monday, June 28. Congressman Johnson will land in his helicopter at 12 noon at the Old Ball Park adjacent to the Auction Barn on the San Saba Highway.

Lyndon Johnson's helicopter—he calls it the "Johnson City Windmill"—is the strangest thing in aviation. It's an airplane without wings, rudder or stabilizer. It is piloted by Jim Chudars, a famous World War II pilot who flew many spectacular relief missions during the war. The helicopter was leased by a group of veterans and given to Congressman Johnson for his campaign for the Senate.

A whirlwind campaigner and a forceful, colorful speaker, Johnson has fired the public interest in the senatorial race. From one day to the next, his crowds have continued to grow in size and enthusiasm.

Johnson slings no mud. He states his position clearly and positive on important issues and demands that other candidates do the same.

His platform is simple. Its three main planks are preparedness, peace, and progress. Johnson believes that we must have military preparedness in order to achieve peace; and that we must have peace before we can have progress.

"I have faith in my people and in my country's destiny," he says. "I want to look ahead and feel that a better world can be built for tomorrow. . . so that all can share in the vast riches of our land. . . and the common man can get a break."

The candidate was born on a farm near Johnson City, a small town that his grandfather help-

ed found nearly a hundred years ago in Blanco County. He has a wife and two young daughters. During the war he served with the Navy in the South Pacific and was decorated personally by General MacArthur for gallantry in action.

Only 39 years old, Johnson has served 11 years in Congress and is known as "the man who gets things done." In electing him to his sixth term in the House two years ago, the people of his district gave him 70 percent of the votes over two opponents.

Johnson is attempting to follow in the footsteps of Tom Connally and the late Morris Sheppard. Both of them were promoted to the Senate as young men after serving the same length of time that Johnson has served in the House.

The voters of Texas are going to employ a man to represent them in the greatest deliberative body in the world: The United States Senate. For his own district, Johnson has electrified 18,000 farm homes, helped launch a great water control program; seen to the construction of hundreds of miles of farm-to-market roads; during the years of a Democratic majority in the Congress, he was an acknowledged leader. During the present regime, he has performed the feat of getting unanimous committee reports out of committees on which he served as a member of the minority party. He was largely responsible for winning approval of the 70-group air force bill; he was wholly responsible for halting the disposal of our usable national defense plants.

Goldthwaite should respond whole-heartedly to the generosity of its own citizen, come and hear a dynamic young man who has something of vital importance to say to our people and knows how to say it effectively.

Dick Connally, Brownwood attorney, who goes ahead of the speaker and makes arrangements for the helicopter landing and speaking, was in Goldthwaite Wednesday afternoon making arrangements for the candidate's visit here at noon next Monday.

Candidate Johnson's itinerary for Monday starts with Llano at 9:30; San Saba, 11; Goldthwaite, 12 noon; Lometa, 3 p. m.; Lampasas, 3:30 p. m., to speak at the dedication of a park; Belton, at 5, and Temple that night. Congressman Clark Fisher of the 21st District will also be a speaker at the Lampasas dedication at 3:30.

JAMES P. HART
CAMPAIGNING FOR
ASSOCIATE JUSTICE

Austin, June 22.—For a "week-end" campaigner, Associate Justice James P. Hart of the Texas Supreme Court has been covering a lot of ground these last three months.

Running for his first State office and his first elective term on the Supreme Court, Judge Hart has campaigned in more than 85 counties and made speeches in some 25 Texas cities.

Meanwhile he has attended every formal session of the Supreme Court, when arguments are heard and decisions handed down, since his appointment to the bench last October.

ROGER Q. EVANS
CAMPAIGNING FOR
GOVERNOR OF TEXAS

Austin, June 22.—Texas needs no county road bond issues to take the farmer, the rural mail carrier and the school bus driver out of the mud, according to Roger Q. Evans, candidate for governor. Evans, in his formal campaign opening speech at West on Tuesday night, asserted "I know where to get the money for this purpose, and it won't take any bond issues, either."

A proper and adequate tax on Texas resources leaving the state, he declared, will provide more than enough money for necessary road building and other purposes. He is strongly advocating "adequately and properly" taxing such resources that are sent away from the state.

Basing his candidacy on a simple, 12-point program, which he insists is not a "platform" but a declaration of purposes, Evans plans to take his campaign to every section of the state before the July 24 primary. Already speaking dates and rallies have been arranged or are being prepared by Evans-for-Governor groups throughout Texas.

Cardinal points of his program, for which he says he will work if elected, include: A veterans bonus, increased pay for teachers; better and broader educational facilities on all levels; and expanded State Health Department and a new research branch "in order that we may control the diseases and epidemics that assail us;" facilities for the care of the indigent aged "who are now classed as insane and quartered in asylums, shaming and disgracing the whole state of Texas."

Evans declares he is basing his appeal to "the plain, everyday citizens of Texas," and asserts that he "is making no elaborate promises to accomplish the impossible; I'll just give the best service I can give, and operate the Governor's office on the basis of my wide knowledge of State affairs and the realization that the taxpayer is entitled to a break, which he has not had for many years."

The old world meets the new in "My Girl Tisa," an excellent United States Picture offering presented by Warner Bros., which shows Saturday night prevue, Sunday and Monday at the Melba Theatre. It is a richly peopled romantic-drama told against a colorful backdrop of New York at the turn of the century, with heart-warming romantic incidents predominating.

Milton Sperling, producer, chose wisely in selecting Lilli Palmer for the title role, and Sam Wanamaker, fresh from Broadway triumphs, plays opposite her.

Basically it is the simple story of Tisa (Miss Palmer), who is fresh to these shores, and who works overtime in a sweatshop to save enough money to pay for her father's passage from Europe. She meets Mark (Wannamaker), an energetic young man of the neighborhood.

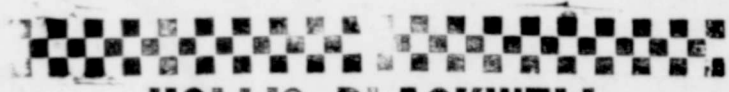

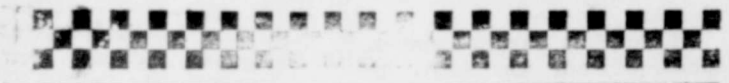

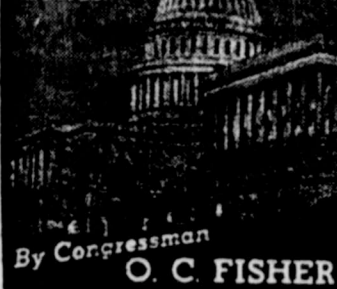

The closing days of the session witnessed confusion aplenty. Most of the legislation brought up the last two or three days was by "suspension of the rules", which means that by a two-thirds vote a bill can be called up, debated forty minutes and passed without being open to amendment on the floor.

The suspension method is a customary one when a session is about to end. The usual parliamentary procedure is too slow and cumbersome to get much done when time is limited. The result is that members often find themselves faced with the alternative of either voting to bring a measure up by suspension or of voting the other way, which means the bill is dead for the session. And since under such procedure amendments are not in order, one is often forced to vote for a measure in order to get its main purposes enacted, while being opposed to some of its provisions that are not subject to amendment. But the Senate also acts and often amends, and finally a conference committee of both Houses makes compromises and changes before the finished product is turned out.

The House, in effect, turned "thumbs down" on the T.E.W. Housing Bill by passing instead a bi-partisan measure to resume Government mortgage insurance on new houses up to 90 percent of value. The bill also gave veterans priority in buying war-

built Government housing, and included a provision to speed-up a system of figuring depreciation allowances, which means a slight tax reduction as an incentive to get people to invest in apartment projects. The bill was approved by a majority of both Democrats and Republicans. The vote was 318 to 90.

The simple fact is that there are three essential elements in getting housing—material, labor, and capital. No legislation is going to increase the supply of either material or labor. Legislation can provide credit to make available needed capital. The new House-approved bill will help in that respect. A year ago the R.C.F. secondary market for G.I. home loans was suspended. It was claimed private capital would handle all such paper. But it has not worked that way and war veterans have been unable to get many loans approved.

A bill to admit 200,000 displaced persons was enacted. I voted against it because I doubt the wisdom of bringing in so many immigrants during the next two years. The measure, however, contains many conditions, and one authority said if it is properly administered probably not more than 50,000 will be admitted under its terms.

The Republican-controlled session enacted some good legislation, particularly with regard to national preparedness. But it has a record of failure in a number of respects. The Mundt-Nixon Communist-control bill passed the House overwhelmingly, but fizzled in the Senate. The Tideland Bill, in which Texas has a billion-dollar stake, passed the House but went astray in the Senate. And there were others.

The swivel-chair experts will spend a busy week trying to figure how good and how bad was the recent session. Probably no two of them will agree.

HERITAGE OF FREEDOM
An invitation to churches of all faiths throughout the nation to observe Sunday, the Fourth of July, as a day of rededication to our American heritage of freedom by the ringing of church bells and special sermons and prayers, has been extended by the American Heritage Foundation through Thomas D'Arcy Brophy, President.

The Foundation is a non-partisan, non-controversial organization established for the purpose of sponsoring a year of rededication to our American Heritage, including the year-long tour of the Freedom Train. Its aim is to help raise the level of active citizenship.

The Foundation urges all churches to ring their bells from 9:55 to 10 a. m. on the Fourth of July as a special Anniversary chiming commemorating the Liberty Bell in 1776, and to devote sermons that day to the freedoms we enjoy in this country. Mr. Brophy explained. Leaders of all faiths have already indicated wholeheartedly endorsement of the plan, he said.

"We of the American Heritage Foundation believe that this year, when Independence Day falls upon Sunday, all Americans of every faith and creed have a particularly fitting opportunity to give a striking demonstration of faith in God and country," Mr. Brophy stated.

"This year of the Freedom Train tour with the most cherished documents of our history has been a year of rededication for millions of Americans to our great heritage of freedom. This is a year when we are realizing anew the meaning and value of our free way of life, and the duty of all Americans to protect and strengthen our freedom through conscientious observance of our obligations as citizens.

"Let this be a day of national prayer for peace, for freedom, and for rededication to our ideals."

MASS MEDICINE
Suppose, next time you feel ill and want a doctor, this happened:

You have long been a patient of Dr. Smith's, and you call for an appointment. However, a new regulation has gone into effect saying that Dr. Smith can't take care of you any longer, and you must go to Dr. Jones.

You call Dr. Jones. He can't give you an appointment for a definite hour, unless your case is strictly of an emergency nature, so you'll have to wait your turn in his ante room. You arrive and find it crowded. When your name is called he can give you only a few moments of time, make a hurried diagnosis, and then prescribe some government-approved medicine. He hustles you out, because many more patients are waiting, and the law says he must care for them, at a stated fee per head, whether he can provide adequate attention or not.

This gives you a small insight into the way socialized medicine, run by the government, works. The patient is simply a number, to be assigned to this practitioner or that, under a so-called panel system. A doctor's pay and progress depends on how well he pleases his political superiors, and whether he's got a cousin in a position of authority. Under mass medicine, patients are treated pretty much like a group of motor cars coming off an assembly line.

If we ever weaken our system of private medicine, that will be in prospect for the United States.

THE BIBLE SPEAKS
By LOUIE D. HEWTON, D. D.

SCRIPTURE: Isaiah 2:31-45; 9: 31; Malachi 2:1-5; Luke 1:47-79; 2:29-32; John 10:12-18; DEVOTIONAL READING: Psalms 139: 1-5.

From Malachi To Christ

Lesson for June 27, 1948

THE inter-biblical period, covering approximately four centuries, is one of the great silences of history, save as the prophecies of God offer flickering light upon the winding paths in western Asia, northern Africa and southern Europe.

A remnant of Jews resided in Jerusalem, whilst many others were dispersed about the face of the earth. The Old Testament was translated into Greek—the version used in the time of Christ.

The Talmud and the 14 books of the Apocrypha were written. The synagogue arose. The schools of Hillel and Shammai were founded and flourished. The sects of the Pharisees and Sadducees originated. Buddha, Confucius and Zoroaster were beginning to influence life in the Far East, while in the Near East Zeno and Epicurus dominated philosophical thought. The Caesars ruled the Mediterranean world.

To understand something of this period from Malachi to Christ, we are asked to read the Scripture passages listed above.

BEFORE JESUS CAME

"BEHOLD, I will send my messenger, and he shall prepare the way before me; and the Lord, whom ye seek, shall suddenly come in his temple, even the messenger of the covenant, whom ye delight in; behold he shall come, saith the Lord of hosts."

Did they fully understand the significance of these great words of Malachi? Hardly may we expect that they did, but they got their basis of hope, about which we studied last Sunday. Imagine the faces of the little children in the long ago as they heard of the coming Messenger!

THE COMING CHRIST

LOOK carefully at the above Scriptures and see how both the Old and New Testaments center upon Christ. These great phrases are suggested:

The promised Christ, the expected Christ, the heralding Christ, the presented Christ, the enlightening Christ, the judging Christ, the merciful Christ, the redeeming Christ, the restoring Christ, the guiding Christ.

Space does not permit the citations, but a study of the passages will reveal each of these gifts and blessings in the coming Christ.

BETWEEN THE TESTAMENTS

ONLY only do we envision that period of four centuries, but we have sufficient light to trace the steps by which the faithful amongst the Jews were cleansing themselves of idolatry as the fires of God purged away the dross of paganism and secularism. One will find rich reward in the reading of the Apocrypha and Josephus. Also, one will find in the opening chapters of the New Testament light which falls back upon those dark ages.

There were synagogue schools, taught, in many instances by very able men, such as Hillel. There was a groping toward the light. Men were hungry for the fulfillment of prophecy. It was the darkness just before the dawn.

THE LIGHT BREAKS

"BLESSED be the Lord God of Israel; for he hath visited and redeemed his people." Luke 1:68. Thus does the golden text for Sunday's lesson flash upon the waiting heart of expectant humanity the Good News.

The fulness of God's time had come. Jesus was born. Peace had come to men of good will. James Montgomery puts the Good News in these lovely lines:

Angels, from the realms of glory, Wing your flights o'er all the earth, Ye, who sang creation's story, Now proclaim Messiah's birth: Come and worship, come and worship, Worship Christ, the new-born King.

Preacher's Task

No religious doctrine has any redemptive power until it is translated into the terms of a specific situation or an actual problem. It becomes the task of the Christian preacher in this generation to do the translating. The question, "What would Jesus do?" is always with him.

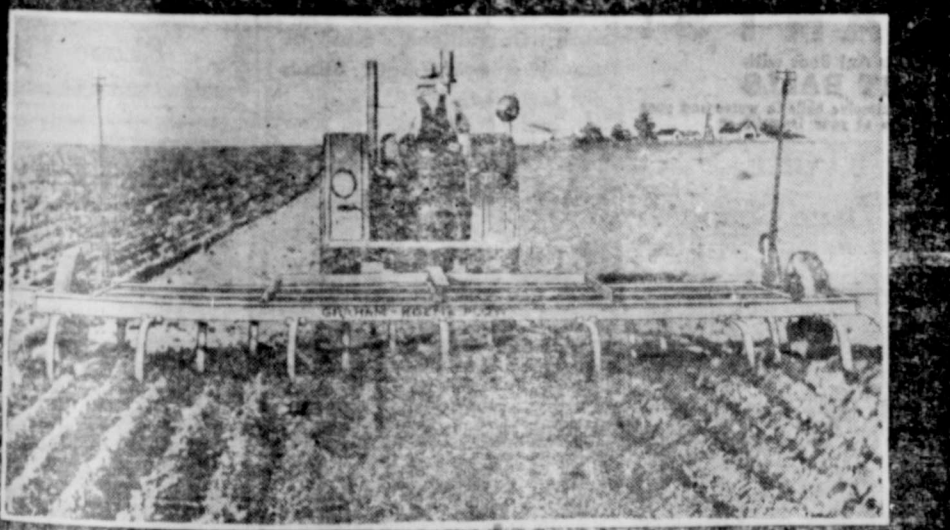

NURSES WANTED AT VA HOSPITAL

The "Registered Nurses Wanted" sign is out at the Veterans Administration's big Waco hospital.

Positions for registered nurses are open there and VA is looking for applicants to fill them.

Salaries range from \$2,644 to \$3,397 a year, depending upon training and education.

Registered nurses employed by VA have benefits not available generally to nurses, VA declares. They have full professional status in the Department of Medicine and Surgery. They may learn while working. A new in-service educational program in psychiatry starts soon at the Waco VA hospital for nurses.

Another benefit VA nurses have is liberal sick and annual leave. VA nurses are entitled to 30 days annual and 15 days sick leave, both with pay, each year. If not used, annual leave may be carried over from one year to the next up to a limit of 120 days. Unused sick leave may be accrued up to a limit of 90 days.

Nurses are not required to live at the hospital. Those who do choose to live there reside in the nurses' home, a large modern brick building.

Registered nurses can get full information on VA employment opportunities by seeing or writing the Personnel Officer, Veterans Administration Center, Waco, Texas, or the Director of Nursing, same address.

HEALTH NOTES

There is little doubt that summer is here. If you don't think so, take a quick look at your thermometer or feel your shirt or blouse—chances are that it will be wet and salty with sweat.

Excessive sweating means the loss of body salt, and Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer, advises the use of salt in drinking water as a means of avoiding heat cramps.

"Salt is a prominent constituent of sweat," says Dr. Cox. "On days when the thermometer goes to 90 degrees or above, as it has recently, the body may lose as much as fifty grams of salt. Laborers, farmers and even white-collar workers should be especially watchful of heat cramps."

Heat cramps are characterized by pains in the stomach, headaches, and sometimes nausea and vomiting. The danger comes because the loss of the salt may occur without the knowledge of the individual until the deficiency causes cramps or heat fag.

Salt tablets may be purchased commercially. If they are not available, a pinch of table salt will serve the purpose.

"Drinking milk is an excellent method of replacing body salt lost through perspiration," Dr. Cox says, "but alcoholic drinks should be avoided."

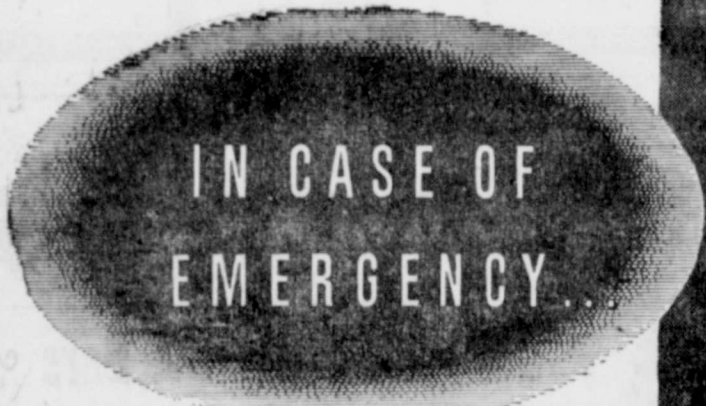
