

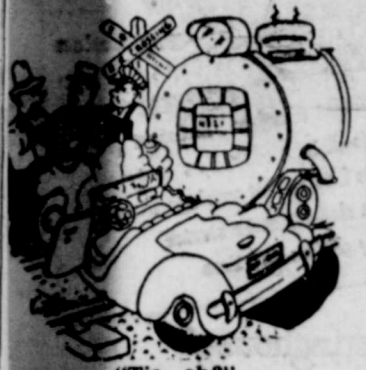


SEE ALL — KNOWS ALL — TELLS NEXT TO NOTHING

### LIGHTS, CAMERA, ACTION!



A movie photographer focuses both camera and lights on scientist Irwin A. Moon in this schoolroom scene from "God of the Atom." The Sermon from Science film, produced by Moody Institute of Science in Los Angeles, is to be shown at 7:30 p. m. (Monday) March 28th at the First Methodist Church Auditorium.

The Christian answer to a pressing world problem will be graphically portrayed in "God of the Atom," scientific motion picture, to be shown at 7:30 p. m., Monday, March 28 at the First Methodist Church Auditorium according to Rev. Joseph L. Emery, pastor of the First Baptist Church.  
Among features of the sound-color picture are full coverage of the Nagasaki and Bikini bomb blasts, exclusive photographs of the inside of the 184-inch cyclotron at the University of California, and a simple explanation of atomic theory by Dr. Irwin A. Moon, scientist who directs Moody Institute of Science in Los Angeles.  
"God of the Atom" is one of a series of Sermons from Science produced by Dr. Moon. Its predecessor, "The God of Creation," was shown to more than a million people in 1947, while "God of the Atom" reaches audiences totaling 75,000 each month. Next in the series is "Voice of the Deep," which delves into the newly discovered science of underwater sound.  
The film will be shown by a representative of Moody Bible Institute, Percy A. Bagge.

## City Council Orders Bond Election To Increase Water Supply Here

At a recent meeting of the City Council it was unanimously decided to submit a proposal to the voters of Goldthwaite whereby the council will be given the power to issue bonds to cover the costs of developing additional water supply and make other improvements to water system, such as reservoir repair, main extension, mechanical chlorination and purchase additional pumps if necessary.  
Present water supply is adequate for winter but, we are always faced with shortage in summer. Use of water in Goldthwaite has increased three hundred percent since 1940 and the experience of some other towns in this vicinity serves as warning that it does not pay to wait too long on future development.  
From test hole experience of three years ago it was proven that additional wells must be drilled outside the city limits and will be north and east of town. It is planned that in event wells are developed that they be located one half mile northeast of present city well on highway 84.  
Many improvements are needed and funds are not available for all of them. Your City Council thinks that ample water supply is most important. Your decision at the polls will govern their action.  
Attention is called to the official Order of an Election which appears elsewhere in this issue.

## Gully Washer Rain Falls Over Mills County Early Last Monday Morning

What old-timers here used to call a "gully washer" rain fell fast and furious over all Mills County early last Monday morning, accompanied in many places with hail. The rain was very beneficial at this time, and put out stock water in tanks and lakes that had been dry or nearly so for many months.  
The official government rain gauge kept here by Harry Allen recorded exactly two inches, as did the one kept by G. H. Frizell. The rainfall was general from 1.65 to 3.10 inches over Mills County, and was general in varying degrees over Texas.  
The rain was the first of any consequence since the fall on Feb. 23 of '70 of an inch and on Feb. 25 of '77 of an inch. During March rainfall was recorded as follows: March 1, .06, March 21, 2 inches. This brings the total rainfall in Goldthwaite to date up to 6.87 inches, which is a lot above average for the last three years.  
No report of hail damage in the county has been received. Reports from places who keep rain gauges over the county to The Eagle this week read:  
John L. Leonhard, 5 miles east of Goldthwaite, 1.86.  
Roy Hill place, southeast of Star, between two and three inches.  
Carl Casbeer place, Center City, 1.91.  
Jim Soules, Star, 2 inches.  
Dr. Graves Ranch at Mt. Olive, two inches.  
A. P. Lee Ranch, Moline, 1.65 inches.  
Wilkey Shady Oak Ranch, seven miles southwest of Goldthwaite, 3.10.  
Wilton Eros. Garage, Mullin, 1.85.  
Luther Jernigan Ranch, west of Bayou, 2 1/2 inches finger measurement.  
The rain was heavier south of Goldthwaite and in Lampasas County. Lometa reported 3.15 inches and Lampasas 1.16. At Adamsville the rain was estimated at six inches, and the Lampasas river was up there about 14 feet early this week. The lake at Lometa, which dried up last fall, was half filled.

Roddy is a 1948 graduate of the Star High School, and is taking a major in Mechanical Engineering.

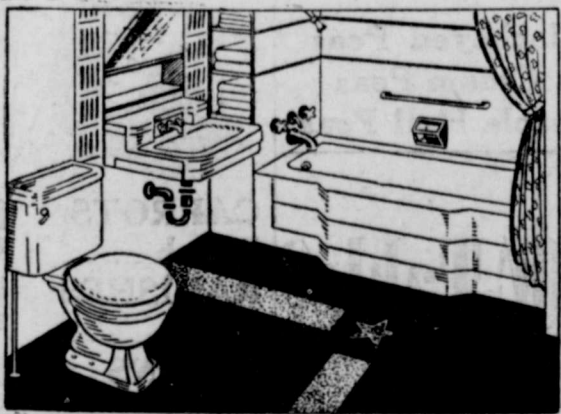

### SPECIAL COURSE FOR MILITARY INT. RESERVE PERSONNEL

Austin, March 14—Announcement of special summer training for all military intelligence personnel of the Organized Reserve Corps has been received here from higher headquarters, Colonel Oscar B. Abbott, Executive for the Texas Military District, said today.

The Military Intelligence school in lieu of summer camp training will be conducted at Fort Sam Houston during the period June 12th through the 25th with applications for attendance to be submitted not later than the 15th of May.

A Special Agents Course is to be held at the Counter Intelligence Corps Center at Camp Holabird, Md., from July 18th through July 29th. Only those Military Intelligence personnel that are assigned to a CIC Organized Reserve Corps unit can

attend this special course. Application for this course must be in not later than the 15th of March.

A special course for all Strategic Intelligence personnel will be conducted in the Pentagon at Washington, D. C., from July 25th through August 5th. Applications for this course must be submitted by the 22nd of March as the capacity of the class is limited. Attendance to this Pentagon school is restricted to military personnel having specific mobilization assignments to the Intelligence Division, General Staff, United States Army.

Individual on-the-job training with the Intelligence Division on the General Staff in Washington is made available up to a 90 day tour of duty to personnel of the MI Reserve who have specific mobilization assignments to the Intelligence Division, GS USA.

Other types of duty with the staff and faculty of the following schools will be made available to Military Intelligence personnel up to a 90 day tour of duty:

The Strategic Intelligence School, GS USA; the CIC School, Camp Holabird, Maryland; the Army Security Agency School, Arlington Hall, Virginia; and the Army Language School, Presidio of Monterey, California.

Colonel Abbott said that the Military Intelligence training set up for their personnel is the best to be issued by any of the Army services thus far. He pointed out, however, that on most of these special schools that an immediate application is necessary and that all MI Reservists in Texas are urged to contact their Organized Reserve Corps Instructor's Office to arrange for their participation in the program.

### Mohair Labeling Bill Introduced By Texas 21st District Cong. Fisher

There will be no immediate mohair support program, Sayers Farmer, Junction President, Texas Sheep & Goat Raisers' Association, told the directors and members in Del Rio last Saturday during the Association's regular spring quarterly meeting.

"We were notified Friday night by the Commodity Credit Corporation that they could not give us the loan program requested several weeks ago through the State PMA office or the purchase plan we requested the other day."

Farmer said, however, that he was optimistic about mohair being included in the Long Range Agricultural Bill now under discussion in Washington. Cong. Bob Poage of Texas talked to Association delegates a few weeks ago in Washington and told them that he saw no reason why mohair could not be included with wool in this program.

Probably the main reason that the CCC turned down the mohair support requests was that Congress had not directed or authorized it to support the fiber, Farmer continued. Two years ago the Congress authorized the CCC to support wool prices, and the Department of Agriculture officials felt that they should not support mohair without having similar authorization from Congress.

Ernest Williams, Association Secretary, reported that a bill to require labeling of the mohair content of upholstery fabrics had already been introduced in the House by Congressman Fisher and that it would be introduced later in the Senate by Lyndon Johnson, new Texas Senator. 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**TAKE YOUR FAMILY TO SUNDAY SCHOOL.**

"Going to Sunday school" has been a phrase which we have come to use all together too seldom. The real significance is "attending Sunday school with the family."

The family unit in the world is the basis of all civilization. Developing the family unit is the hope of the future. No place in all our activity should we more readily and more wholeheartedly unite than in uniting as a family in attendance at the Sunday school and, of course, the worship service.

It is not safe for a boy who has a father who insists on sending him to Sunday school while that father keeps an engagement on the golf course. It is no less a sin to send the family to Sunday school while the man of the house finds his way to the office to get caught up on some work which he wanted to get done before the new week started.

Nothing is so refreshing as to gather with friends of other families to study the Word of God on the Lord's Day, and then to sit in the place which is dedicated to worship and listen to the message of the pastor as he speaks for God to the hearts of men.

A knowledge of the Bible is necessary to be an educated person. The best source for this knowledge is found today in the Sunday schools of our land. Baptist Sunday schools all over the world are doing a marvelous job in teaching and training the youth of all of the families and to that end, we should dedicate ourselves this year and every year to having the family placed in proper departments in our regular Sunday school and church.

Not to do that is to deny the son or daughter their rights and to send them out into the world more or less adrift. If we would but anchor ourselves and then while holding on to the anchor, reach a hand out to son or daughter and say, "Catch hold, we are going together and I shall lead the way."

This will greatly increase our Sunday school attendance, but more than that, it will increase the character of our nation and decrease the juvenile failures which comes often, if not most often, from parental failure. One of the biggest failures is right here... not taking the family to Sunday school.

Let us resolve that in every home, there will be the leadership furnished that will see a united family on time in a Sunday school, ready to study the Word of God to learn His way of life. We shall see great results when this movement really gets under way.

Again let us say it... "let us take the family to Sunday school today."

**The Race Question**

Lesson for March 27, 1949.

JESUS DID NOT know there was a race question. That is to say, there was no question for him, though he well knew that his neighbors found the race problem a hot one. All the germs of any race problem, even of race riots, were there in Palestine as in all of our world today.

First there was the feeling of racial superiority. Few, if any, peoples think of themselves as an inferior race. Nobody would mind being kicked around if he thought he deserved nothing better. The Jews, to which race Jesus belonged, were no exception to the rule. They felt themselves the superior of any race on earth.

**Two Sides of the Question**

IN JESUS' time the Jew of Palestine was in the middle. The Romans, having conquered the land, were top-dog in Palestine. With the Romans, the Jews saw the under-side of the race question. But there were other races, much less pure than the Jews, races called "canaanite" for want of a better name. These people were kicked around by the Jews, just as the Jews in turn were kicked around by the Romans. Looking at the Cannaanites, the Jews saw the race question from the top side.

In Palestine the wounds of race quarrels were made worse by the vinegar of religious differences. In those days it was taken for granted: Different race, different religion.

Jesus' neighbors and relatives in Nazareth, like most Jews, supposed that God would favor only the "chosen people," namely themselves. So the Jew's resentment toward the Romans above him and his contempt of the Cannaanites below him were made more bitter by his conviction that they would all end in hell except his own race.

**What Jesus Did About It**

THE TWO STORIES in our lesson (see the Scripture references) show the astonishingly simple way in which Jesus walked straight through those walls as if they did not exist. He passed no resolutions, denounced nobody; he simply treated all races alike. He helped the Roman army officer and the Cannaanite woman precisely as if they had been Jews. (By the way, his remarks to that woman should not be misunderstood as rude. She did not take them that way. He spoke to her, we may well believe, with a smile, and she took him with equal good humor.) Jesus appreciated faith wherever he found it.

He was the last person to fancy that all human beings are alike. But he was the first to give all an equal chance. He took people as human beings, not as "Romans" or Cannaanites."

He neither cringed to the Romans nor bullied the Cannaanites. He looked at all men and women with level eyes, seeing not their skins nor their clothes, but their hearts.

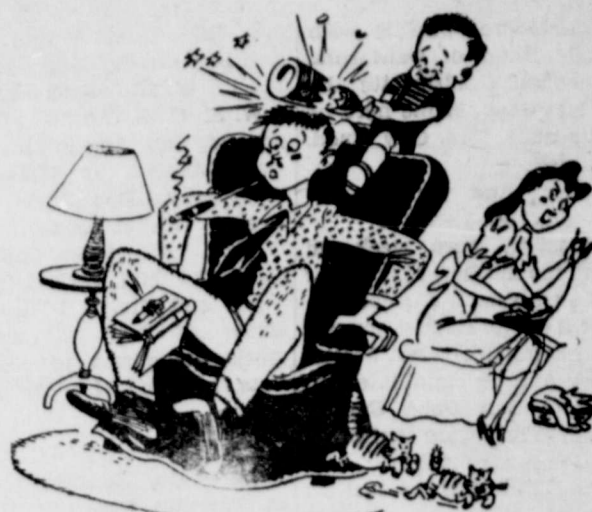
**What We Can Do**

OUR NORTH AMERICA is also criss-crossed by walls of prejudice—racial, political and religious. In Canada (for example) there is the friction between Canadians of French and those of English or Scotch descent; in the United States (not by any means confined to the South) between Negroes and white people, or between Japanese and white people; between the "old stock" and recent immigrants; and so on. Those walls look pretty solid; but a Christian will find that if he follows Jesus' example he can walk right through them. Last winter a national interdenominational organization challenged its 28 million members and through them, the Christian world, with one of the most sweeping declarations of human rights ever drafted by an American church body.

Hitting at every type of discrimination—racial, political, social, economic, religious—the group has challenged the Church to work for the creation of a non-segregated society "as proof of their sincerity."

Yet the real breakdown of human prejudices, hatreds and contempt, with the injustices growing out of these, does not come at one stroke by resolutions. It comes only by degrees, as Christ-inspired individuals make their own bright doorways.

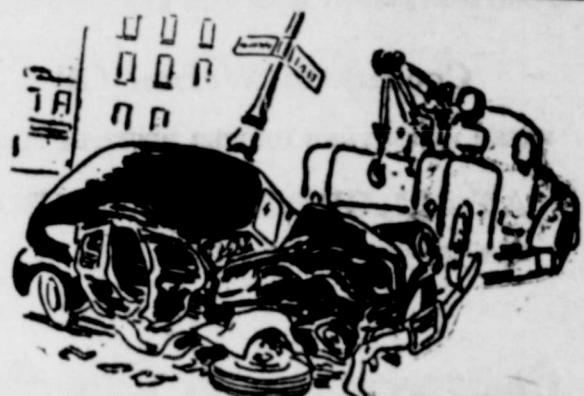

## Texas Soil Conservation District Managers Want To Save Soil Now

Austin, March 22—During the next 12 months, 798,746,000 tons of topsoil will wash and blow off Texas.

It would cost a billion, 250 million dollars to ship this amount of soil from Temple to Galveston in 16,000 hundred-car Santa Fe freight trains.

Lykes Brothers steamship Lines would charge 95 million dollars to move the soil from Galveston to Havana in 8,967 ships.

These figures were given this week by Representative J. A. Luedemann of Brenham, sponsor of legislation in the House that appropriates 10 million dollars as a capital fund for soil conservation work in Texas.

The money will be allocated by a five-man state soil conservation board to 175 soil conservation districts, there to be administered by district supervisors.

Supporting the appropriation measure is the Association of Texas Soil Conservation District Managers.

R. M. Boswell of Kenedy, representing the association in Austin, says that every penny of the 10 million dollars will go into actual work on the

land, inasmuch as the state has already provided for payment of administrative costs.

Boswell emphasized that the money will be used as a revolving fund, to be kept intact as farmers pay for work done on their property.

"In other words," Boswell said, "the fund is of a permanent nature; it will not be necessary to ask the legislature for additional appropriations at every session."

The fund, Boswell asserted, is intended to round out the present soil conservation program by making equipment and supplies available at a reasonable cost to operators of small farms.

Farmers who have limited resources frequently cannot themselves buy the equipment and supplies needed to do the soil conservation work on their land; nor is it economical for private contractors to bring in heavy machinery for a small operation, Boswell said.

By grouping small farms, however, and working out mutual problems on a watershed basis in each soil conservation district, it is possible to carry out the program efficiently,

the association's representative added.

He urged the necessity for speed in getting the work under way, pointing out that:

"This proposed legislation will expedite the soil conservation program in Texas to the extent that \$10,000,000 made available to the districts now will be more effective than ten times the amount if delayed another ten years."

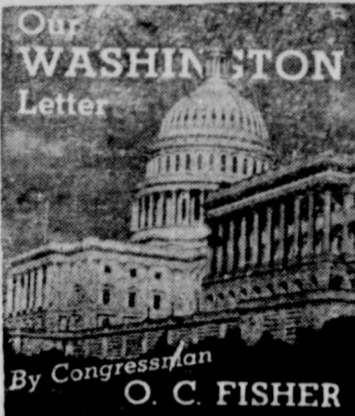

Last week on Capitol Hill was marked by the end of the Senate filibuster, the passage by the House of a rent control bill, a defeat of a sales tax for the District of Columbia, and an Army and Air Force measure. Down town, the Secretary of Agriculture turned a cold shoulder to our pleas for a mohair program.

1. The Senate filibuster ended as a result of a States' Rights—Republican coalition. It was considered a victory for the determined Southerners. Senator Lucas announced the action was the death knell for Civil Rights legislation at this session. Let us hope he is right.

It was a compromise. Heretofore cloture (two-thirds of Senators voting) could stop debate on any "pending measure". But the cloture rule did not apply to a motion to take up a measure. In other words, there has been no limit whatever to the length of debate on "motions"—cloture applying only to pending bills. And since measures do not become "pending" business until made that way by "motions", it followed that the filibuster was a powerful weapon against motions to bring up bills.

The compromise changes that somewhat. Now cloture applies to motions to take up bills as well as to the measures after they become pending business. But it will not apply to future motions to change existing Senate rules on cloture.

The real concession to the Southerners was the improved definition of "cloture". Formerly it meant two-thirds of

the Senators voting. Under the newly adopted rules it means a constitutional two-thirds—that is, two thirds of the 96 Senators. And that new requirement for cloture will apply to "pending" measures as well as to motions to take them up.

2. The rent control bill as it passed the House would continue the program but would require the property owners to be allowed a "reasonable" return on their investments. It would also allow states and municipalities to do away with rent controls if they should choose to do so. The Senate must now act.

But even as amended I was unable to vote for the measure because I regarded it as class legislation. The war has been over four years and I cannot see how we can in good conscience say to one group, "You can't profit but a certain limited amount from your investment but your neighbor can get rich over night if he can while engaged in some other type of business."

Many of the leading sponsors of rent control frankly imply that we should have this control permanently in this country. It would thereby become a part of state socialism advocated by a good many people for the U. S. A.

3. By a vote of 177 to 166 the House defeated a sales tax designed to help pay the way for the District of Columbia. As it is, the taxpayers over the nation subsidize the cost of operating the local government in the District. While I am generally opposed to a sales tax, I voted for the local bill. I could hardly do otherwise in deference to the American taxpayers. As it now is there are hundreds of thousands in the District who, like myself, live in rented quarters, and pay practically no local taxes whatever. A considerable part of the District land is owned by the government and is, therefore tax-free.

If the sales tax proposed is not revived and passed, it is estimated the Congress will be called upon to put up an additional \$18 million this year to help run the District government.

4. The much desired 70 Group Air Force, which many of us have been sponsoring, moved a step nearer reality last week with the passage by the House of a bill setting the composition of the Army and Air Force. It is apparent that the Congress is attaching more and more importance to a powerful Air Force in our preparedness program.

5. The Secretary of Agriculture, following a CCC Board meeting turned thumbs down on a mohair program. While we have not given up the fight by any means, the prospects for relief this year appear dim. It is hard to understand the fairness of a policy which permits a hundred million dollars a year subsidy for potato growers and not a cent for a hard-pressed industry which produces a storable product and which would actually cost the government very little.

Right now we are concentrating on having mohair specifically included in a pending long-range agriculture bill. Mohair should have treatment comparable to wool, cotton, etc., so long as the Government is in the support business.

### Big Valley H. D. Club

Twelve members, three visitors, and Miss Hintz, met March 17, with Mrs. Mary Weaver for an interesting program.

Since our secretary was absent the roll call and reading of the minutes were omitted.

The president called the meeting to order and the order of old and new business began. Council Delegate, Mary Weaver, gave a report on the Council plans for an exhibit in June on "Inexpensive Gifts We Can Make." The resolution and order are as follows:

Whereas, the City Council of the City of Goldthwaite, Texas deems it advisable and to the best interest of the said City to submit to the resident property taxpayers qualified voters of said City the proposition for the issuance of bonds of said City for the purposes hereinafter mentioned.

THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF GOLDTHWAITE, TEXAS:

That an election be held in the City of Goldthwaite, Texas on the 12 day of April A. D. 1949, which date is not less than 15 nor more than 30 days from the date of this order, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted to the resident qualified property taxpayers of said City, who own taxable property in said City and who have duly rendered the same for taxation for their action thereupon:
