OIL TEST NORTH OF GOLDTHWAITE DOWN CLOSE TO PAY LIME David T. Roach's No. 1 Hargrave, ten miles north of Goldthwaite, yesterday was down over 3,000 feet. Rain Wednesday night caused delay in drilling. Ellenburger lime is expected to be found at around 3,300 feet, which should be reached in a few days. This lime is expected to contain oil, if there is any. This is the first oil test ever drilled in Mills County near the top of a mountain, old timers say.

### Three Inches And Over Added To Mills Co. Rainfall During This Week

From two and a half to three and a half inches of rainfall has been recorded over Mills County this week. This is added to one to six inches of rain that covered the county last week. Rainfall here in Goldthwaite as recorded by Harry Allen's government gauge measured 1.20 inches for last Sunday night and 1.80 inches for Wednesday night, a total of 3.00 inches. This brings the total moisture measured here in town to date for the year to 12.21 inches. However, on the J. H. Priddy ranch west of Priddy, the gauge there has measured 18.67 inches for the year to date. No hail or wind damage has been reported. At Lampasas Wednesday night, a hailstorm caused much damage. The glasses in Herb Harris' car were beaten out by the hailstones. The rain Wednesday night added 18 inches to the level of water at Lake Merritt. The Lake, which was down last summer to ten feet below its capacity, now lacks only 30 inches of running over the spillway. Over 20 tanks up the creek from the lake are all brim-full, and one more rain is expected to fill the lake. It looks like another 1919, old timers here are saying, and everybody now wants some sunshine. Pastures are in better shape than at any time during the last five years. ### GOLDTHWAITE FOURTH ANNUAL RODEO TO STAGE THREE PERFORMANCES, MAY 27 AND 28

A volunteer rodeo committee of 17 business men to help in making arrangements for Goldthwaite's Fourth Annual Rodeo met at The Hangar Monday night and organized a temporary Rodeo Committee. It is expected that this may later be made a permanent Mills County Rodeo Association. First Annual Goldthwaite Rodeo was staged here on V-E Day, May 8, 1946, to honor returning World War II veterans, and it is planned to make it an annual affair in their honor. Contract was agreed to by the committee with T. C. Steiner and son, Tommie Steiner, of Austin to furnish stock and seats for the Fourth Annual Rodeo to be staged at Jernigan Rodeo Arena, two miles east on the Waco highway. Dates for the Rodeo were settled on as Friday and Saturday, May 27 and 28. Three performances will be put on, one Friday night at 8:00 o'clock, one Saturday afternoon at 2:30 and the last Saturday night. This was made necessary in order not to conflict with Commencement Exercises for the Goldthwaite High School which will be held Thursday night, May 26. Tommie Steiner of Steiner and Son met with the committee. Steiner and Son have some of the toughest rodeo stock in the Southwest. He will have at least 24 bulls and 54 bucking horses here for the Fourth Annual Rodeo. He is also to furnish from 2,000 and 2,500 seats for the three performances. Malcolm Jernigan, who owns the arena, is offering free use of it to the committee of 17 who are underwriting the rodeo. He was elected chairman of the Rodeo Committee; Dr. T. C. Graves was elected vice-chairman, and Howard Campbell, secretary-treasurer. The Rodeo Committee decided to make the cowboy added money \$1,000, with \$60 added money for the Girls' Flag Race. Admission price was fixed at \$1.25 for adults, tax included, and 75 cents, tax included, for children under 12. 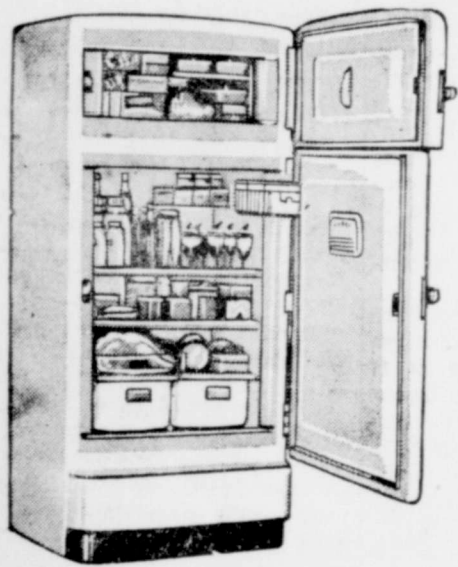

## Weekly Swing of SOUTHWEST FARM MARKETS

Both gains and losses appeared in the price picture of southwest farm markets during the past week, the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Production and Marketing Administration reports. Some products showed little change.

Egg and poultry prices changed hardly any since a week ago. Current receipt eggs remained at 40 to 41 1/2 cents a dozen in North Texas. Fryers sold around 30 cents a pound at the farm in northwest Arkansas, 32 to 33 at Fort Worth and Dallas, and 31 to 35 elsewhere.

Cattle eased slightly at Fort Worth, but gained a little at Oklahoma City, as other southwest markets showed steady or mixed trends. Stockers and feeders increased in numbers. Medium and good stocker calves changed hands from \$20 to \$25 at San Antonio and Fort Worth. Oklahoma City moved good and choice stocker yearlings and steer calves at \$25 to \$26. Denver paid \$23.50 for good stocker steer calves.

Hogs recorded net losses of mostly 50 cents to \$1 at Denver and Oklahoma City but sold steady to strong for the week at Fort Worth and San Antonio. Prices fell during the week to the lowest levels since the end of price controls. Monday's closing top was \$18.25 at Fort Worth and San Antonio, and \$18.60 at Denver. Dressed pork lost \$1 to \$2 for the week at eastern markets.

Sharp gains at lamb markets Monday brought the week's advances to \$1 to \$2. Prices of dressed lamb were \$3 to \$5

higher for the week and sheep receipts at Texas and Oklahoma markets were vastly reduced. Good and choice spring lambs sold at \$28 to \$30 at Fort Worth. Goats changed little. Most kids sold from \$3 to \$4.50 each at San Antonio.

Good 8 to 10 month Texas wools sold in Boston this week at an estimated cost of \$1.20 to \$1.25 a pound, clean basis. Mohair trade was very quiet.

Oats and barley lost around 3 cents for the week, but other grains sold unchanged to slightly higher. No. 2 white oats closed Monday at 86 to 87 cents a bushel in bulk carlots at Galveston. No. 1 wheat sold from \$2.38 to \$2.45 at Texas common points. No. 2 yellow milo brought \$2.72 to \$2.77 per hundred pounds. Cotton lost 75 cents to \$1.50 a bale at most markets. Spot middling 15/16 inch closed Monday at 33.05 to 33.15 cents a pound in Texas and Louisiana, and 32.60 at Little Rock.

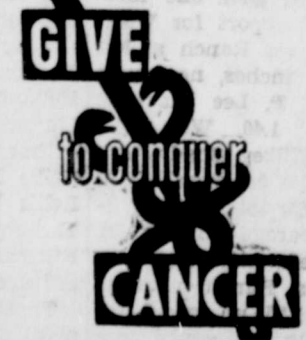

A southdown ram has been purchased by the Goldthwaite F. F. A. chapter. The ram, part of Mr. Bob Steen's flock of registered southdowns, will be used in a southdown improvement program.

John Carothers, a chapter farmer, will care for the animal. The boys who breed ewes to the ram will provide feed for the ewes and will pay a small breeding fee to the F. F. A. chapter.

**DEFENSIVE DRIVERS' CLUB ORGANIZED**

PONCA CITY, Okla., April 25—Newest offensive against traffic accidents—the Defensive Drivers' Club.

Continental Oil Company has begun enrolling its employees in a newly formed organization that pledges its members to defensive driving—allowing for the other driver's mistakes. Launched by the company's safety division, which is directed by J. S. Boylan, the Defensive Drivers' Club offers as its creed:

"I will be a defensive driver. I will make allowances for the other fellow's carelessness, lack of skill and knowledge. I recognize that I have no control over the unpredictable actions of other drivers and pedestrians, nor over conditions of weather and roads; therefore, I will develop a defense against these hazards. I will concede my right-of-way and make other concessions to avoid collision. I will be careful to commit no driving errors myself and will be defensively alert to avoid all accident traps."

Bronze lapel pins in the shape of an owl—for wisdom—and windshield stickers bearing the "Defensive Drivers' Club" emblem, along with defensive driving, will identify the members. Continental Oil Company, in enrolling its employees from coast to coast, hopes the idea will catch on nationally.

**STATE TAKES ACTIVE PART IN 4-H SOIL CONSERVATION**

When Miles Standish came to America the topsoil averaged about nine inches in depth. Today the national average is six inches. Moreover, nature must work 300 to 1,000 years to rebuild each lost inch. In an effort to help save the hundreds of millions of productive acres endangered by erosion and gullying, Texas has accepted the National 4-H Soil Conservation program for 1949. During the past year an increase of more than 9,000 4-H'ers participated in the nationwide project, reports the National Committee on Boys and Girls Club Work.

4-H members learn to successfully conserve soil and prevent wastage and deterioration. Because of its wide scope, parents cooperate in a farm-family soil conservation plan. Some of the activities are: to establish a farm nursery; sow fall cover crops; test for lime-stone, phosphate or potash; construct checks in gullies; sow grass; plant windbreaks; build a dam to hold water for livestock. The Cooperative Extension Service directs the program.

Although individual awards cannot be given all 4-H youth for their work in the project, what they accomplish is a vital contribution to the country's future. 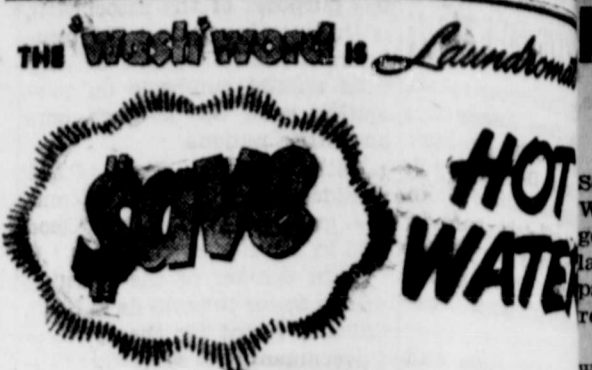

# Superintendent Woods Best Known In Texas As Governmental Candidate

By JOE BELDEN

AUSTIN, April 23 — State School Superintendent L. A. Woods has said he may run for governor next year if the legislature abolishes his job by passing the Gilmer-Aikin school reform plan.

The question arises: What would be Woods' chances of winning the governor's race against the other possible contenders?

In a recent statewide survey, The Texas Poll found Woods to be better known among voters than any of the others who have been mentioned as possible candidates for governor. Of every hundred voters questioned, 45 could identify Woods as head of the schools. Only 44 per cent could identify Lieutenant Governor Allan Shivers, and 34 per cent Attorney General Price Daniel.

Cast in the role of a candidate for governor, however, Woods today does not rate as high as Shivers or Daniel. Shivers placed first in a trial heat conducted by The Texas Poll, with 17 per cent saying he would make the best governor; Daniel, the second, with 8 per cent; Woods, third, with 5. More than half of the voters questioned had no opinion.

The survey was based on two questions put to a cross section of qualified voters in all parts of Texas:

1. "The men listed on this card may run for Governor of Texas next year. Will you try to identify each one by telling me what he does, or anything else you may know about him?"

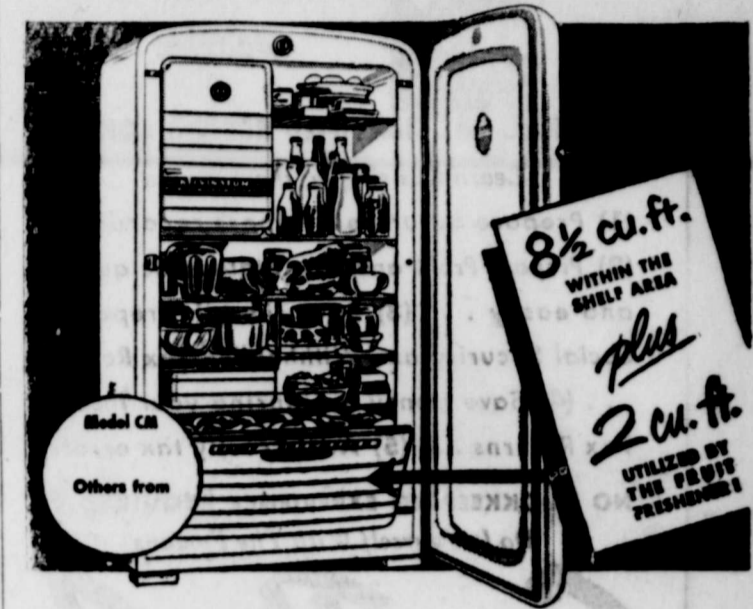

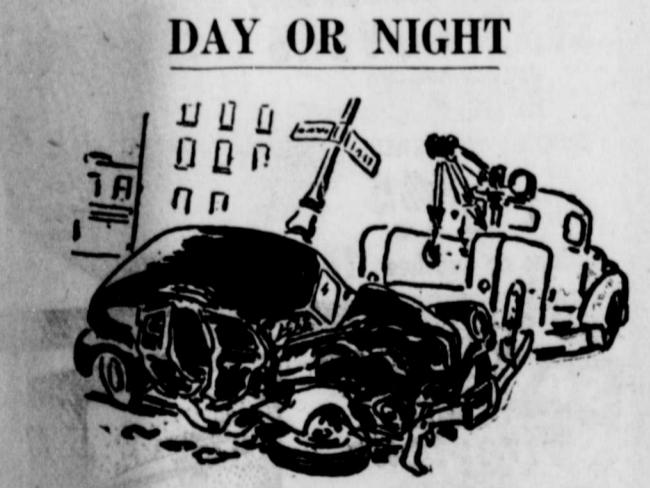

**SOCIAL SECURITY AIDS FAMILY PLANNING**

Applicants will be required to assemble in an examination "Sooner or later, each of us will grow old or die. When either of these events occurs, wage income stops. It is upon these simple truths that old-age and survivors insurance under the Social Security Act is based," said James B. Marley, Manager of the Austin Office of the Social Security Administration.

"Under this system of Federal insurance, wage-earners earn, and they and their employers pay for the financial protection of their families," he continued.

"The insurance is paid when it is likely to be needed the most—that is, when older people or young children are left without wage income. When earnings cease in old age or death, the retired wage-earner or his family receive the benefits which have been earned. The insurance payments are not large, monthly amounts, but when paid over a period of years, they aggregate very substantial sums, and they are paid as an earned right to those who are entitled to them. The payments partially replace an insured wage-earner's average wages for work done on social security jobs."

Mr. Marley believes that if families know what their rights are, they will be encouraged to

### HOUSING BILL PASSES SENATE

News was spotted on Capitol Hill last week. While the House was taking an annual ten-day Easter recess, the Senate passed a Housing bill that will cost plenty of money before it is over with.

The bill calls for 810,000 units of public housing to be built over six years, at an estimated cost of \$308 million a year.

Another section provides \$250 million in long-term loans and \$12.5 million in grants over a four-year period for farm housing, the money to go mainly to self-sufficient farms.

It provides \$1 billion in loans and \$500 million in outright grants to local governments for slum clearance.

With regard to money for slum clearance, it was brought out that very few of the people who live in slums actually own them. Such run-down buildings are usually owned by well-to-do individuals or corporations. So it may turn out that Uncle Sam will be subsidizing prosperous property owners by helping them fix their houses up.

At any rate, this federalized housing program, endorsed by the Senate, will cost the taxpayers several billion dollars before it's over with. If finally passed by the House, Uncle Sam will become the biggest landlord in America, and, once begun, this program will likely get bigger in the future.

### ODDS AND ENDS

At a Congressional hearing in Washington recently a number of champions of the rights of the so-called "minority groups" were being heard. An elderly man who was trying to make his way through the throng was asked, "What group do you represent?" "I, sir, represent the downthodden majority," the man replied.

If you like that easy-going, folksy type of poetry, you should get a copy of Senator Carlos Ashley's book, "The Spotted Sow and Other Hill Country Ballads", (The Steck Co., Austin). It's worth two dollars of anybody's money. Here's a sample verse:

I begin to get the notion  
She's opposed to bein' caught."

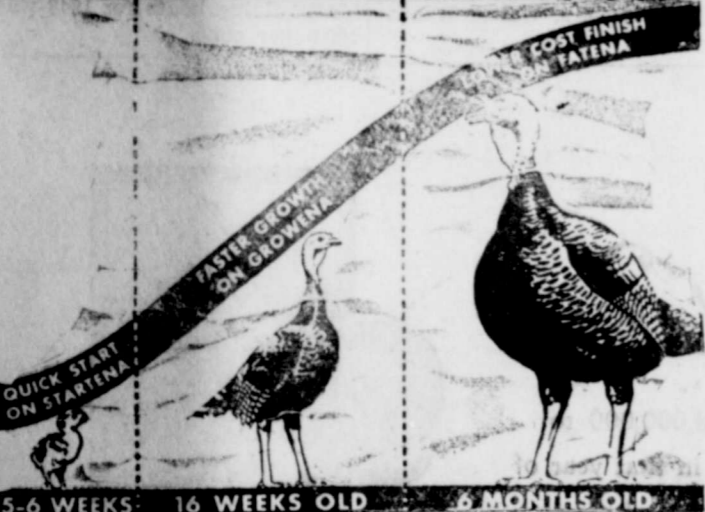

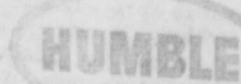

County Judge Lewis L. B. Porter has received the following letter from State Health Officer George W. Cox, of the State Health Department at Austin:

Dear Sir: Your attention is invited to the enclosed "Notice" concerning development of the Hospital Construction Program for the fiscal year 1950 under which the State Agency will continue to implement Public Law 725, 79th Congress. As you no doubt already know, this law provides for grants-in-aid to be made from Federal funds to assist in the cost of construction and equipment of hospitals and health centers.

The State Agency will be glad to receive an application from your community. Any publication which you may be able to give this matter will be appreciated since the creation of adequate hospital facilities for the people of the State is of prime importance in improving general health conditions.

## Construction Program

To Whom It May Concern: Public Law 725, 79th Congress, commonly referred to as the Hill-Burton Act, which provides for grants-in-aid of Federal funds for the construction of public or other non-profit hospitals and for health centers, is now entering upon its third year of operation in this State.

A revised State program, which takes into account changes in area population, additional beds provided during the past two years, percentage of occupancy of existing facilities, a clearer conception of service areas, and other factors such as common economic interests, financial and personnel resources, and the like, will be completed within a short time. Changes in area priority ratings will result since many of the needs of high priority areas now have been satisfied.

The State Agency will develop its Hospital Construction Program for 1950 during the next few months. In doing so, the priority system, which is implicit in the law, will be followed. Projects in lower priorities will not be placed normally above a project in a higher priority unless such project is

more urgently required for providing a service on a regional or statewide basis which will not otherwise be provided in the higher priority areas. Projects in lower priority areas may be approved when it can be demonstrated (a) that a real need exists for additional hospital beds to provide reasonable facilities for a logical service area, (b) that there exists a keen community interest, and (c) that adequate local funds are available for applicant's share of the cost of construction and of operation; provided, that applications already submitted from areas having a higher priority have been given full consideration; and provided further, that applications from areas having a higher priority have not been submitted within a reasonable time following publication of the Revised State Plan. In reference to the latter proviso mentioned above, the State Agency has set 1 July 1949 as the deadline date.

The priorities mentioned above cover general hospitals only and are not applicable to hospitals constructed for the treatment of tuberculosis, nervous and mental, and chronic diseases. Projects for hospitals in the latter three categories will be considered on their individual merits at time of receipt of applications.

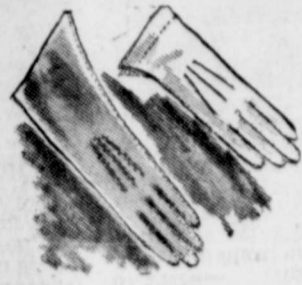
