MARCH OF DIMES

The Mills County Chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis received from national headquarters of the March of Dimes organization yesterday a check for \$1,750.00 to assist in payment of local polio patients' medical care, it was announced this week by Mr. E. T. Fairman, Chapter Chairman.

The money was requested from the emergency epidemic aid fund because the local Chapter, which retains 50% of March of Dimes proceeds each year for financial assistance to polio patients, whose families can not pay full costs unaided, has run out of funds.

So far this year national headquarters has advanced \$3,284,490.95 to Chapters as a result of increased incidence of infantile paralysis plus a heavy carryover of cases from 1948, year of highest incidence since 1916, said Mr. Fairman.

The Mills County Chapter is presently providing funds for the care, in whole or in part, of two patients stricken this year and also is continuing to pay costs of care for one patient stricken in former years.



The Constitution itself provides that the individual States shall be the judges of the qualifications of the voters in the election of federal officials in such States. But those who favor the anti-poll tax ban by the Congress aren't concerned about the Constitution and the rights of the States to determine such

At the press conference, though, he was asked a good many questions about it, and kept assuring that the plan he and has associates have submitted was just the best thinking he could present on the subject of a farm program for

this country at this time, and that when someone else has a better idea he will be glad to put his weight behind that one. He said farmers and other people should write to him, and tell of their original thinking. This sounds like a good thing,

provided people will try not to let the "something for nothing" rule dominate their thinking. 1t would be helpful if more farmers and ranchmen, as individuals, would determine to take a more active part in running the affairs of the country by participating in local group doings, studying governmental affairs, and voicing opinion.

If not, you can expect him to de so any day now. 4-H'ers are making an all-out attempt to reduce the annual cost of accidents affecting farm folksincluding motor vehicle, fire and property damage — which totals more than one billion dollars, or about \$35.00 per person! They are also trying to cut down the number of accidental deaths, which kill 51 farm residents in the U. S. every

day in the year.
Your 4-H'er doubtless will caution you to drive carefully on highways, and use proper signals when turning or stopping (top right). More than 7,300 rural people are killed annually in motor vehicle accidents. In fact, more fatal auto-mobile accidents occur in rural areas than in any other location.
Falls rank second in farm accident causes. So watch your step when carrying a clothes basket, like the girl shown in right photo. Your 4-H safety worker probably will suggest you tack down throw rugs or put them on non-slip mat-

The average American family has meat on its menu once a day; often more frequently. But relatively few of us have any comprehensive knowledge of the complex mechanics of producing that meat, and bringing it to our dinner tables.

The American Meat Institute has published an informative booklet which touches on many phases of the subject. Here are some excerpts from it: "The farmer is operating one of the most speculative businesses in the world. He continually takes chances on the weather and the market. He is hemmed in by the laws of nature ...




