Austin, Aug. 16-Six pointers on what World War II veterans should do to secure their applied 200 pounds of 20 percent dends from the Veterans Administration were outlined Tuesday by the State Veterans Affairs Commission.

1. Wait until Aug. 29 before doing anything.

2. Secure a dividend application form from one of the acreage planted to vetch in the following sources: Office of the county should be materially local county service officer, a larger than last year. United States Post Office, a Veterans Administration office, Of- FOR SALE - 409 acres 3 1/2 fice of Veterans Affairs Commission service officer or veterans organization service officer.

3. Read the instructions and decide whether the procedure is understood. If not, get a service officer to help fill out the form correctly.

4. Be as neat as possible in spelling your name and listing your address. Give an address at which mail can be received for the six months following

date of application. 5. If you don't remember your policy number, which is requested on the blank, don't worry. It will help speed service, but is not essential.

6. Once the application is in the mail, don't worry about how soon payment will be made, and don't use the anticipated amount as a promissory note for personal debts. Some 17,-000,000 veterans' records will have to be checked by the VA.

LOOPHOLES in the Law

(Editor's Note: This is one of a series of short case histories, all taken from court records, showing how legal loopholes often enable criminals to escape punishment in Texas. Will Wilson is chairman of a special steering committee of the State Bar, which is working for revision of the antiquated Criminal Code and Code of Criminal Procedure in order

Mr. Homeowner went out for a short while, neglecting to close the front door of his private residence. The entrance was completely open, the door not having a screen, and during Mr. Homeowner's absence Lightfingered Harry came in and started picking up articles that suited his fancy.

Just as Harry had his arms pretty well loaded, he heard a noise behind him. He whirled around to see Mr. Homeowner standing in front of him. Harry dodged past the owner of the house, ran out the front door, which was still open, and disappeared with a number of Mr. Homeowner's valuables still in his possession.

Harry was captured and prosecuted for burglary. Mr. Homeowner testified convincingly against him and he was convicted.

The verdict was reversed by the appellate court. This court held the defendant could not be guilty of burglary because he had walked right into the house through the open door without any use of force and had left the same way, again without using force. The court ruling held that force must be used either in entering or leaving premises before the crime of burglary can be committed.

The Psalmists' Bible

IN reading Psalm 19:7-14, it is interesting to see how many different things the Psalmist says about the Word of God. He calls it by various names, but that is only because, being a poet, he likes to use several words for the same thing. As for Psalm 105, where else but in his Bible would the poet have Mr. J. B. Ferguson, to Oak Cliff, learned that story of Abraham, a suburb of Dallas, as students, Isaac, Jacob, Joseph and the de-

> The reader of this Psalm will observe that the subject of most the sentences is GOD. As the poet reviews his people's history, he shows that it is not simply the doings of the Israelites, but it is God who brings things to pass.

"Man proposes but God disposes" a proverb which the writer of Psalm 105 would approve. Psalm 119 is known as an "alphabetic" "acrostic" poem. It is divided into 22 sections, each one exactly eight verses long. There are 22 letters in the Hebrew alphabet, and in the Hebrew original of this Psalm each verse of the first section begins with the first letter of the Hebrew alphabet, Aleph; in the next section, Beth, and so on down to the last letter, Tau.

The Book of God

WHAT the writers of these Psalms said about the partly-done Bible of their times is of course even more true of the completed Bible which is our heritage as Christians. One thing they make clear is that this is first of all God's book. They knew as well as we do that different human minds had a part of it, but for all that it is always God whose message comes through what they wrote. The Bible, properly understood, reveals the mind of God and the will of God. The Bible reveals also the doings of God. His story is the weaving of God's eternal decrees on the looms of time. Again, these poets see that the Bible is for man and about man

None of them thought of it as a guide to heaven, but rather as a road map or to guide us through the mazes of this world. Psalm 119 stresses this world, and no other, as the world on which God's light shines.

The commandments of God are so many lengths of barbed wire to fence us in, rather road-signs to guide us on life's open highway. The Bible presents the "How" of living. It is God's map for me.

The Bible in The Heart

THE SENTENCE: "Thy word have I hid in my heart" (Psalm 119:11) is the clue to the right use of the Bible. When a Hebrew writer says "heart" he means something more than mere emotion. 



King the State Veterinarian any person who loses any cattle, or vaccinates cattle, shall not carry any cattle out of their premises, or offer any for sale for a period of 6 weeks. To do so will be a viciation of the State of Texas. He further warns that as the Anthrax is a deadly disease to human beings that there should be no cattle skinned, and if they have been skinned the hides should be burned, as the disease may be transmitted in the hides of the infected cattle, and in this manner it is usually transmitted to people, which results in death. This extermination process will have to be solved by the people and if the people of the contaminated territory do not do it, it will continue to be a
