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VETS TOLD HOW TO GET DIVIDENDS

Austin, Aug. 16—Six pointers on what World War II veterans should do to secure their national life insurance dividends from the Veterans Administration were outlined Tuesday by the State Veterans Affairs Commission.

1. Wait until Aug. 29 before doing anything.

2. Secure a dividend application form from one of the following sources: Office of the local county service officer, a United States Post Office, a Veterans Administration office, Office of Veterans Affairs Commission service officer or veterans organization service officer.

3. Read the instructions and decide whether the procedure is understood. If not, get a service officer to help fill out the form correctly.

4. Be as neat as possible in spelling your name and listing your address. Give an address at which mail can be received for the six months following date of application.

5. If you don't remember your policy number, which is requested on the blank, don't worry. It will help speed service, but is not essential.

6. Once the application is in the mail, don't worry about how soon payment will be made, and don't use the anticipated amount as a promissory note for personal debts. Some 17,000,000 veterans' records will have to be checked by the VA.

Four persons were hurt, none seriously, in an automobile collision one-half mile from Goldthwaite on the Lometa Highway, between 8:30 and 9:00 p. m. Saturday night.

Corporal Donald Roberson of Camp Hood, driving one of the two cars in the head-on crash was treated at the Childress Clinic for minor head injuries and was returned to Camp Hood for hospitalization.

Charles Ed Welch 22, driver of the second car, and two girls and another boy, all from Goldthwaite, in the car with him received minor injuries.

FERTILIZER AND VETCH PRODUCTION

College Station—L. R. Boyd, who farms near Teague, recently told Freestone county agent J. H. Pritchard that he had learned something about growing vetch for seed, especially, on the production per acre.

Boyd, this year, harvested 400 pounds of vetch seed per acre from the seven acres he grew for seed. The county average, reports Pritchard, ran from 100 to 400 pounds per acre with the late harvestings showing the lowest yields. This was largely due to shattering.

Boyd applied 250 pounds of 20 percent superphosphate and 200 pounds of 5-10-5 commercial fertilizer per acre to seven acres, and on another plot he used only the phosphate. From the latter he harvested only 200 pounds of seed per acre, so he says he got a pound of vetch for every pound of 5-10-5 that he applied. He believes the additional application of a balanced fertilizer is a good practice.

Robert Gregory, Streetman community, harvested about 300 pounds of vetch seed per acre from his 20 acre block. He reported to Pritchard that he applied 200 pounds of 20 percent superphosphate per acre, and where no phosphate was used the vetch did not produce enough seed to harvest.

Pritchard says the farmers who have surplus vetch seed will sell them to other farmers in Freestone county and the acreage planted to vetch in the county should be materially larger than last year.

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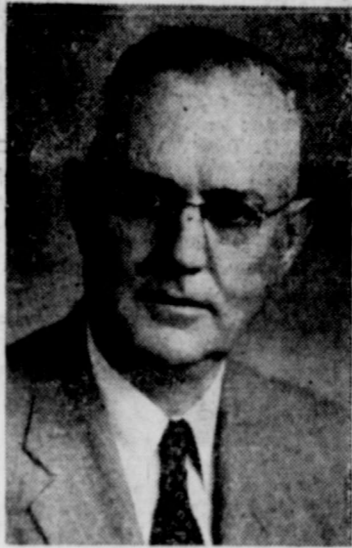

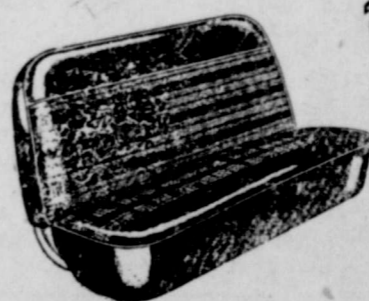

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Senate Joint Resolution No. 1

Proposing an amendment to Section 2 of Article VI of the Constitution, repealing the provisions making the payment of poll tax a qualification of an elector; requiring the Legislature to pass a general registration law for voters; providing for the necessary election, proclamation and publication by the Governor, and making an appropriate provision.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. Section 2, Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same be amended hereby so as to read as follows:

Section 2. Every person subject to none of the foregoing qualifications, who shall have attained the age of twenty-one years, and who shall be a citizen of the United States, and shall have resided in this State one (1) year next preceding the election and the last six months within the district in which such person offers to vote, shall be a qualified elector; provided that before offering to vote at any election a voter shall have registered as an elector before the first day of the next preceding such election. This provision shall be in addition to the provisions of Section 48-d, reading as follows: "Sec. 48-d. The Legislature shall have the power to provide for the establishment and creation of rural fire prevention districts and to authorize a tax on the ad valorem property situated in said districts not to exceed Three (3c) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation for the support thereof; provided that no tax shall be levied in support of said districts until approved by vote of the people residing therein."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the State at an election to be held on the second Tuesday in November, 1949, at which election all ballots shall be printed thereon (or in the case of voting machines shall provide for the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas) and the provisions of the Constitution making the payment of poll tax a requirement for voting, and providing for general registration law, and providing for the necessary election, proclamation and publication by the Governor, and making an appropriate provision, shall be printed thereon.

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Section 4. The sum of Five Hundred (\$500.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

SECTION 3. The Governor shall issue his proclamation calling said election and have the same published and said election held in accordance with this Resolution and the Constitutional Laws of this State, and return shall be made and the votes canvassed and counted as provided by law; and if said amendment is adopted by the vote of the qualified electors of this State, the Governor shall issue his proclamation as required by law.

Senate Joint Resolution No. 5

Proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, authorizing the Legislature to provide for the creation and establishment of rural fire prevention districts.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be, and the same is, hereby amended by adding to said Article a new section, to be known and designated as Section 48-d, reading as follows: "Sec. 48-d. The Legislature shall have the power to provide for the establishment and creation of rural fire prevention districts and to authorize a tax on the ad valorem property situated in said districts not to exceed Three (3c) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation for the support thereof; provided that no tax shall be levied in support of said districts until approved by vote of the people residing therein."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the state at an election to be held on the second Tuesday in November, 1949, at which election all ballots shall be printed thereon (or in the case of voting machines shall provide for the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas) and the provisions of the Constitution making the payment of poll tax a requirement for voting, and providing for general registration law, and providing for the necessary election, proclamation and publication by the Governor, and making an appropriate provision, shall be printed thereon.

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Section 4. The sum of Five Hundred (\$500.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

Session shall be at noon on the second Tuesday in January of each odd-numbered year, and of the second regular session, at noon on the second Tuesday in January of each even-numbered year.

"At other times, when called by the Governor, the Legislature shall convene in special session."

"Appropriations for monthly recurring expenses and salaries paid by the State shall be made for a period of not more than twelve (12) months."

"At the second regular session of each Legislature, only proposals to amend the Constitution and to make appropriations to pay monthly recurring expenses and salaries and such other measures only as four-fifths (4/5) of the Membership of each House may determine shall be considered."

SEC. 3. The Amendments proposed herein, if ratified by the people, shall become effective January first, A. D. 1950.

SEC. 4. The foregoing Constitutional Amendments shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this State at a General Election to be held throughout this State on the second Tuesday in November, 1949, same being November 8, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon: "FOR the Constitutional Amendments relative to sessions of the Legislature and to compensation of its members."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendments relative to sessions of the Legislature and to compensation of its members."

Each voter shall express his vote on the proposed Amendment in the manner provided by law.

SEC. 5. The Governor of this State shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

There is one thing about price supports, acreage controls, production payments, etc., that we must not forget. They are outlined and enacted by the Congress, which is elected by the people. Only Congress has the power to change them.

It's natural, we suppose, for us to be more concerned with and sympathetic toward the welfare of other peoples who have the same ancestral background as we and speak the English language and so a lot more of our tax money goes overseas for various kinds of relief than goes to our Latin American neighbors.

Maybe there is more acute need for it over there where the war ripped things apart, but there is a continuing need for stepped-up development along certain lines in Mexico and other nations to the south.

We are spending a couple of million dollars a month in Mexico, not for relief but to help control foot and mouth disease because the Mexican government can't afford the cost of the necessary work. We may be doing something similar very soon with the black citrus fly which is moving northward through Mexico devastating citrus groves as it travels. Last

House Joint Resolution No. 15

The Legislature shall have the authority to provide for the organization of county-city health units and the operation thereof and to authorize counties and cities to provide a tax of not to exceed twenty cents (20c) on the One Hundred Dollar (\$100) valuation of taxable property in counties and cities for the purpose of financing the said county-city health units; provided that no such tax shall be authorized ex-

Our WASHINGTON Letter

The B-36 probe has bogged down. It all began as a result of rather sensational charges made by Rep. Van Zandt of Pennsylvania a few months ago when he charged in a speech on the House floor that the B-36 was probably no good, that it cost too much, and, besides, that Secretary of Air Symington and Secretary of Defense Johnson were both controlled by ulterior motives in advancing the program of the world's biggest bomber.

Following the Van Zandt charges, the House Armed Services Committee, of which I am a member, decided to conduct a full-dress investigation of the entire subject. That hearing has been going on for two weeks and will probably continue for as much as a month or more.

But already the charges have fizzled out. Van Zandt, when challenged to produce proof of some of his accusations, fumbled around in his files and produced a clipping from a newspaper which contained some loose talk by a Broadway gossip columnist. Aside from that, he had no proof to offer except an anonymous letter which the Congressman had apparently used in his blast at the Air Forces.

In the meantime, the history of the much-talked-about B-36 was unfolded step-by-step before the Committee. It was put on the drawing boards back in 1941 when it was feared Britain might collapse and we might eventually be faced with absolute dependence upon long-range bombers to carry on a war. As time went on many changes were made in designs in order to speed the plane up and make it air-worthy. More recently four jet pods have been added which give the plane temporary speed of more than 400 MPH.

It is developed that by ac-

flowed for more than 10,000 miles with bomb loads of 10,000 pounds. In other words, the B-36 according to actual tests, has flown 5,000 miles, dropped the bomb load and returned to its starting base. It flies at a 40,000-foot altitude which is considered by experts as being reasonably safe at night time against enemy interference. In other words, the plane, equipped with heavy armor and its capacity bomb load, can fly to any target in Soviet Russia, do its damage and return to a starting base in the United States.

Lieut. General Curtis LeMay, head of the Strategic Air Command, described by General Vandenberg as the most experienced bomber in the world today, in his appearance before the committee, declared: "I called on to fight, I'll order out the B-36 crews and be in the first plane myself."

What is true is that the B-36 is costing a lot of money. Already around one billion dollars have been spent in the costly experiments with this giant bomber which has made the B-29 obsolete. Nearly a hundred of them have been built, and additional ones will come from the Fort Worth plant during the next few months. There are very few, however, who will say the expense has not been money well spent, if America is to have that much-needed advantage in event another war is forced upon us by the Russians.

Airplane development costs a lot of money. It takes five or six years to draw plans for a new design and finally get the finished product. The B-17 used so extensively and with so much success during the recent war, has long since become obsolete. The B-29 which dropped the atomic bombs on Japan was six years in the making and is now considered obsolescent. And, already, a new bomber to take the place of the B-36 is on the drawing boards and will be ready in a few more years.

But as the world stands today, the B-36 is undoubtedly the world's best inter-continental bomber. It is undoubtedly the only bomber in existence which can fly 10,000 miles with a 10,000 pound bomb load and at an altitude of 40,000 feet, with a cruising speed in excess of 300 miles per hour.

Sixty Per Cent Of Voters Think Old People's Pension Not Enough

Austin — Politicians looking forward to the 1951 governor's race in Texas may find themselves in a battle royal for the old-age pension vote.

To some observers, a straw in the wind is the report that W. Lee O'Daniel is out looking for fiddlers to play in his band. They can't forget how the former governor and U. S. Senator rose to power with hillbilly music and promises to the old folks. And they think he may try a come-back by the same route next year.

But whether O'Daniel runs or not, the basic fact about the old-age pension issue is that even without music it has wide appeal. A statewide survey by The Texas Poll indicates that a majority of the young and the middle-aged, as well as old voters, think the state isn't doing right by its old folks.

Interviewers for the Poll put these questions to a cross section of adults in all parts of the state:

"Do you personally know anyone who is drawing an old age pension from the government?"

Yes 73%
No 27

"In your opinion, is Texas spending too much of its tax money, not enough, or about the right amount for old age pensions?"

Not enough 60%
About right amount 26
Too much 2
No opinion 12

A breakdown of the results by age groups shows very little difference in the division of opinion among the young, the middle-aged, and the old. Of those between 20 and 40 years of age, 58 per cent expressed the opinion that the state is paying its old people too little; among those between 40 and 60 years of age, 61 per cent gave the same opinion; and among those

60 years and over, 62 per cent. Old age assistance is financed by the state in co-operation with the federal government. Top amount that may now be paid to a needy Texan who has reached the age of 65 is \$50 a month. Twenty dollars of this amount comes from the state and \$30 from Uncle Sam. But only the most needy received as much as \$50. Average grant to the more than 200,000 on the state roll is about \$34 a month.

Under the Texas Constitution, the state may not spend more than \$31,000,000 a year on old-age assistance. And since the number of needy oldsters has been growing in Texas, the prospect is that the average grant will have to be reduced instead of raised in the near future.

During the last session of the Legislature, two-thirds of the members put themselves on record in favor of a constitutional amendment to raise the ceiling on old-age assistance. But the proposal died during the closing minutes of the session when a Senate filibuster blocked approval of the final version. Thus voters were denied an opportunity to vote on the proposal in the coming election November 2.

One House member, Phil Willis of Kaufman, put the blame on Governor Allan Shivers for failure of the Senate to adopt the pension raise proposal. Shivers, then serving as lieutenant governor and presiding over the Senate, called the session at an end when the appointed time for adjournment arrived. Rep. Willis, in a personal-privilege speech before the House, said twenty-two members of the Senate were ready to vote for the measure but were not given the chance.

Shivers is considered an almost certain candidate for the governorship next year. He is now serving the unexpired term of the late Beauford H. Jester.

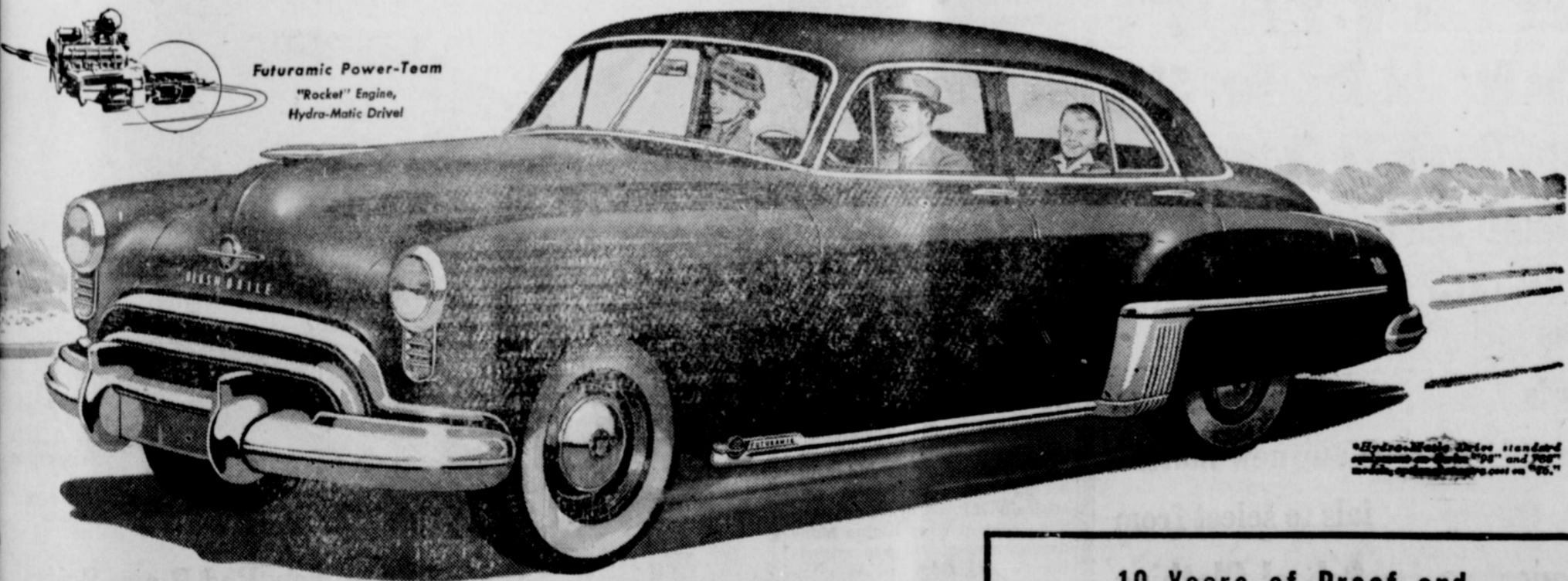

There has been indication of recurrence of the Anthrax, and by order of Dr. J. S. King the State Veterinarian any person who loses any cattle, or vaccinates cattle, shall not carry any cattle out of their premises, or offer any for sale for a period of 6 weeks. To do so will be a violation of the State of Texas. He further warns that as the Anthrax is a deadly disease to human beings, that there should be no cattle skinned, and if they have been skinned the hides should be burned, as the disease may be transmitted in the hides of the infected cattle, and in this manner it is usually transmitted to people, which results in death. This extermination process will have to be solved by the people and if the people of the contaminated territory do not do it, it will continue to be a death hazard.
