

Jesus and the Psalms

Lesson for September 11, 1949

SOME parts of the Old Testament Jesus never once mentioned. Others he quoted again and again. Could this be because some parts were more helpful to him than others? At any rate, the Psalms were one section of his Bible which he often quoted.

ONE USE Jesus made of the Psalms was in public wor-Whenever he went up to the Temple he would join in singing

or in listening to the great choirs singing these ancient hymns. Many loved hymns, while not direct translations, are based Still With Thee' is from Psalm 16: Dr. Foreman

'God Is My Strong Salvation" from Psalm 27; "The King of Love" from Psalm 23; "O Worship the King" from Psalm 104.

In private worship also we Jesus used the Psalms. One of the Hebrew names for them was "The Book of Prayers," and Jesus, like many another who has loved these Psalms, found in them the natural expression of what was deepest in his heart when he turned toward his Father in heaven.

A striking proof of comes from the story of Calvary. The cry, "My God, why hast thou forsaken me?" is a quotation from Psalm 22:1, and "Into thy hands I comm my spirit" is from Psalm 31:5.

Thus, two out of three prayers he uttered in his last moments were from the Psalms. So the reader today, pondering in a quiet moment these immortal poems, either from the printed book or better yet, as Jesus did, from the treasures of memory, may often find in them prayers which seem breathed from his own mind and to which he need only say, Amen.

Truth about God

ESUS also found in the Psalms a revelation of truth. It would be too much to say that Jesus derived his ideas of God from the Psalms. But certainly some of the great teachings about God which we hear from Jesus we can read already in the Psalms.

Jesus did not use the Psalms never have supposed that you could take just any sentence about God out of some Psalm or other, and quote it as the last word about God.

For instance, during his temptations the thought was suggested to him that he could jump off a high building and not be hurt; had not God promised just that in a Psalm? Now it is true that Psalm 91:9-12 does say that God will keep you from "dashing your foot against a stone" but Jesus knew that does not mean that God will guarantee to keep you out of trouble or harm no matter how foolish you are!

Christ in the Psalms

TESUS found in the Psalms also prophecies. There is a rather thin line between illustration and

For instance, when the Jerusalem boys and girls were making such a noisy welcome for him, and the dignified priests were protesting, Jesus quoted Psalm 8:2 in defense of the children: "Out of the mouths of babes and sucklings thou hast perfected praise."

Did he mean that the Psalmist had predicted that very occasion, or did he mean that the Psalm expressed a truth always good

At all events, we do know that Jesus often took a Psalm, orea part of one, as a prophetic picture of himself. He knew himself to be the true King of Mankind, "the Lord's Anointed," as his use of Psalm 110:1 plainly shows.

Yet he also knew that he must pass through suffering to his throne (Luke 24:26). When the leaders of his people rejected him he was not surprised, for he thought at once of Psalm 118:22-23. When he hung on the cross, and saw the soldiers gambling for his clothes, Psalm 22:16-18 would surecome into his mind

And can we doubt that in his last agonies, one who knew the Psalms so well would not have remembered also the later lines from the same prophetic Psalm? It begins with the tragic question-Why? But it rises to a song of triumphhe cried unto him, he heard!"

Austin, Aug. 17th - Changes in regulations for Organized cyclopaedia Britannica. dance have eased the method in which Reservists can become eligible for armory training pay, Colonel Oscar B. Abbott, Executive of the Texas Military Dis-

The new regulation authorizes pay to be paid on an individual attendance basis for all personnel except personnel assigned to special units. Heretofore 60% of the assigned strength of a unit had to be present for the officers to become eligible for pay. Enlisted Reservists were paid regardless of attendance.

The special units deleted from this new regulation are Class "A" units that have a minimum of 30% full strength officers and 40% full strength enlisted Reservists. Most of the units in

Colonel Abbott said that "This will ease some of the problems of the smaller units in cases where officers have attended 100% and enlisted Reservists attended 20% - causing the offi- LITTLE ONES . . . cers to miss their pay for the meeting while enlisted Reservisits received pay. There will be

a control feature established by requiring specific individual attendance standards for Reservists desiring to be assigned or attached to units authorized ulorly to keep minor car disorthis pay.'

It also provides a probationary period for officers failing to meet attendance requirements, but permits leaves of absence to deserving Reservists to meet business requirements or for illness or hardship reasons.

(Continued from page one.) orporated into the Goldthwaite Independent. The district now covers approximately 300 square niles, with an increase in property valuations with additions of the new districts from \$900, 000 to \$2,400,000.

The tax rate for the district has been kept down to \$1 on the \$100 valuation, and it is hoped to be able to keep it at this figure. Mills County is under the unit system of transportation, and will receive approximately \$10 more per student from State Aid than last year.

It is recommended that all beginning first-graders see their family physician and have their health card filled out.

The High School building has been completely redecorated inside, and all woodwork on the outside has been repainted. Windows have been washed for first time in 25 years. New shades for High School and part of Elementary School building are on order now, and will be installed soon. Floors of high school building have been thoroughly cleaned and corridors have been waxed. Corridors and lockers in the Elementary building have been repainted.

The football stadium seats have been reworked and repaired ready for the game with Hamilton tonight.

A total of 25 teachers have been elected by the Board of Trustees to teach this term, compared to 22 last year. The Board has just recently hired Mrs. Hoyt Cockrell to teach High School English. She has taught in high school for five years, and the last year and a half taught at John Tarleton College. Miss Maxine Geeslin has been hired as full-time
