Lesson for January 15, 1950

THE FIRST CHRISTIANS didn't have everything we have, but on the other hand they had one thing seldom to be seen nowadays. They did not have the New Testament, only the Old; they were not surrounded by an even partly Christian civilization;

they had no cen turies of Christian tradition; they had no world - wide Christianity, only people in one the-way city, Jerus-

alem. On the other hand, for all they Dr. Foreman lacked, they had one great thing: Fellowship. We have it too, but too often in a week and watery fashion as compared with what they

Family Living

THE VERY FIRST Christians lived literally like a big family. This is all the more extraordinary when you think of the variety of their backgrounds. (Look up the list of places mentioned in Acts 2:9,10 on a map of Asia, Africa and Europe.) A good family is a

If little Willie comes down with appendicitis, his parents don't get out the family account book and figure out how much Willie has been worth to the family, in dollars and cents, in his eight years of life.

Suppose they calculated that his services, such as they are-carrying in the wood, feeding the chickens, or what not- had been worth about \$23.75 since the last time he was sick, they wouldn't send little Willie to the hospital with the note to the doctor: "Please give our Willie \$23.75 worth of operation. That's all he has put into the family budget and that's all we're going to let him take out!"

Not by any means. Little Willie is taken to the hospital and whatever operation he needs, that is the one his parents want him to have, even if it costs 20 times what Willie has been worth in cash. The family give Willie what he needs, and they also expect him to help out in all the ways he can.

Church Living

ONE TROUBLE with our churches today is that so many of them have actually lost this family-feeling. The early Christians, we are told, "were of one heart and soul." Could you say of your church that all its members are of one heart and soul?

The early Christians, feeling thus close to one another, "had all things in common." What do the members of your church have in common? They meet in one place once a week. But what else? Do they even speak to one another? If one member of the congregation falls sick, do the others find out about it quickly, and when they find out, what do they do about it? If trouble comes to a member, do the other members rally around

members, as the Salvation Army does of hard-pressed men, "You may be down but you're never out?" Some deacon's fund, to be used in cases of need.

Contributors to the fund are as anonymous as are those who are helped by it. The idea is for those who are blessed with large income, or those who may have special windfalls, bonuses, extra dividends, big crops, and so on, to chip in for the aid of all who may run into

Not All Troubles Are Financial NATURALLY, not all troubles are financial. Some of the most serious troubles have little or nothing to do with money. There are many other kinds of needs. For example, in any church there will be lonely people, and you can't cure loneliness with a check, no matter

how big.

The minister is the key man, he can locate the needs, but he can't supply them all. Lonely people, these who have been through deep sorrow, men try-ing to find the right jobs, young folks in danger of serious temptation— a church which is like a family will not let these people fight their battles

What we all need is the feeling that we belong. The church can make all the difference between despair and happiness simply by making every single person in it feel that no matter what happens to him, he still belongs; he is more than among friends, he is among



### ASKS CONGRESS FOR DOG STAMP

Legislation in Honor of Man's Best Friend" Sought by Dog-Lovers

The United States may soon issue a postage stamp honoring "Man's Best Friend," if the efforts being put forth by dog-lovers throughout the

country prove fruitful. Spearheading the movement is Harry Miller, director of the Gaines Dog Research Center, New York, who

Harry Miller California, him-

self a long-time champion of the dog, to introduce the necessary legislation providing for the issuance of such a stamp.

In a letter to Congressman Phillips, Mr. Miller points out that the United States at the present time that more dogs than any country. has more dogs than any country

has more dogs than any country is ever known to have owned before—one in every three American families owns one or more dogs—and that certainly the dog's contributions of heroism, loyalty and intelligence are worthy of honoring in this manner.

He further states that to date 13 countries have issued nostage.

13 countries have issued postage stamps which either show dogs as the principal point of their designs, or have included dogs as an incidental to the composition. The only U.S. stamp which shows the likeness of a dog is one of 30-cent value issued in connection with the Columbian Exposition of 1893. This stamp shows Columbus with a globe demonstrating to a group of listeners his theories of geogof listeners his theories of geography and navigation, while a dog, which appears to be of a large Mastiff type, is shown lying on the floor in the foreground. Mr. Miller feels very strongly that with the country's dog population at the 20,000,000 mark, "Man's Best Friend" is now deserving of a postage stamp of his own and postage stamp of his own and merits more than the incidental

If dogs besides native American ones were to be featured on stamps, the breeds which served so gallantly in the K-9 Corps during World War II are entitled to the glory."

afforded by the extra cylinders. "Principal reason why rivals have steered clear of eight-cylinder power plants is cost. Ford has been able to hold expenses down by manufacturing economies not often duplicated

"In pioneering the low-price V-8, the Dearborn producer had to strike at the heart of the cost problem. The company was the first to evolve method of making an integral V-block and crankcase casting.

"The Ford Company is noted for excellence of manufacturing technique. Part of the reputation is based on willingness of the management to spend money on worksaving equipment. The Rouge plant foundry, for example, is a model of nates some of the disagreeableness machines obviate much of the usual

"With the use of advanced production methods the company has been able to hold expenses within reasonable limits. This is true even though use of the larger engine means two more cylinders—with more pistons, rings, 'con' rods, sparkplugs, etc.—for each car pro-

"The Ford production technique involves a high degree of precision. Vendors regard the company as a 'tough customer' because of the rigidity of inspection standards. Suppliers know they must comply closely with specified requirements or face heavy rejection

"The precision, together with the extra power of the engine, accounts for the unusual performance of the Ford V-8. Ford's ratio of applied horsepower to gross vehicle weight has long been a favored design chaacteristic. Other manufacturers have found this power plant too difficult to build inexpensively enough for a small car.

"From present indications, it may be a long time before competitors can challenge Ford in the low-priced eight-cylinder field."




