In a review of medical progress during the las half century, Dr. T. C. Terrell, Fort Worth, Chairman of the Board of Trustees, State Medical Association of Texas, deelared here this week the the free medica system has increased the average life sp.
years in 1900 to nearly 70 yeags $\ln 1950$.
"Although death cannot prevented, it can be postponed. Man is born doom to die. At the presen time in the United States has the longest life span than at any other timis in history. In 1900 life expectancy at birth was 41.7 years. In 1930 it was
59.5 years. In 1940 it was 6.8 years and at the end of 59.5 years. In 1940 it 63.8 years and at the end of
1949 it probably reacha 68 years. The true measure of medical progress are is not how many people die, but how long they live before they die.
