Jay Partin Now In Contest For Best GI Farmer

Jay Partin, who lives one mile south of Priddy was selected by the Mills County Veterans Training School as their candidate to enter a State wide contest sponsored by the Veterans of Foreign Wars which will recognize the outstanding G. I. Conservation Farmer in each of the Soil Conservation Districts.

Mr. Partin will compete with a G. I. Farmer from the Brown County portion of the Brown-Mills Soil Conservation District for District honors. The winner from the District will compete for regional and State honors.

Jay Partin was selected from the fourth year agricultural class of the Mills County School on the record that he had made while he was in training. Mr. M. B. Harrison is the instructor of this class.

After his military discharge in 1945, he started farming, and in 1946 he made a plan with the Brown - Mills Soil Conservation District. None of the farm was terraced and gullies were beginning to cut up the hillsides. Jay started applying conservation measures immediately after he made his conservation plan, and completed his plan last year. He has constructed 3.8 miles of terraces with his plow and has completely covered his farm with soil-improving legumes. Before the terraces were constructed, Jay built and sodded two waterways.

Mr. Partin's program of sol improvement is paying off in increased yields, easier plowing and less operating costs. - Crops crop that was planted three years ago. 

The remarkable part of the story is that Franklin reported for work that day, glued the wheel back on his "motor car," which is running again-and he stayed at work until quitting time. And the strangest part of the story is that at her office in the County Court House, Mrs. Weathers always insists she has "no news." That can't be, Mrs. Weathers-you have Franklin.



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
