## Marinda Davis Is Buried Wednesday At Williams Ranch

Mrs. Marinda Seaborn Davis, widow of the late E. T. Davis of Center Point, was buried last Wednesday afternoon in the Williams Ranch Cemetery. She died on Monday at the home of a daughter, Mrs. G. E. Shuffield, in the Draseo community, near Winters.

Mrs. Davis, who was 83, was a pioneer resident of Mills County. She and the late E. T. Davis were married in Wiley, Texas, where she was born, 67 years ago, and only a few years later they moved to the Center Point community. Mr. Davis died in 1937, when Mrs. Davis moved to Goldthwaite, where she lived until three years ago. Then, in poor health, she moved to Draseo, where she lived until her death last Monday.

Four daughters and four sons survive Mrs. Davis. They are Mrs. Shuffield, with whom she lived for the past three years near Winters; Mrs. A. P. McFarland of Buckeye, Arizona; Mrs. Joe Spinks of Goldthwaite; Mrs. E. J. Steinmann of Lida, New Mexico; Ray Davis of Austin, W. H. Davis of Lida, Fred Davis of Dallas and Earl Davis of Big Springs.

Two sisters and a brother also survive. They are Mrs. Scholar Kuykendall of Goldthwaite, Mrs. John Stark, who lives in California; and Walter Seaborn, who lives in South Texas.

Mrs. Davis also is survived by 47 grandchildren, 62 great grandchildren and a number of great-great grandchildren.

At the funeral services at Williams Ranch Cemetery on last Wednesday afternoon, the burial was conducted by the Rev. L. L. Hayes of Trigger Mountain. Arrangements were by the Fairman-Wilkins Funeral Home of Goldthwaite.

## Our Boy Scouts Hoodwink Yanks With Horned Toads, Cockleburrs

Northerners are crazy—about Texas horned toads.

That is the solemn report from Ray Campbell Hudson, who is the scribe for the Mills County delegation to the National Boy Scouts Jamboree at Valley Forge, Pennsylvania.

Hudson, as he signs himself in his limited correspondence to the Eagle, is scheduled to return to Goldthwaite next Monday, along with Penn Barnett, Lathon Jernigan, James Gilliam and Dr. T. C. Graves, from the big Valley Forge encampment of 47,000 Scouts. Larry Walton of Center Point also attended the Jamboree.

In addition to enchanting Yankees with Texas horned toads, the reports from north of the Mason-Dixon Line tell of some other shrewd trading by the delegates from Mills County. Included among the reports is one alleging that when the Texans took off for Yankee land they had secreted in their luggage a generous quantity of cockleburrs. Said cockleburrs, allegedly, have been traded off to unsuspecting youngsters from big cities as porcupine eggs.

Getting back to horned toads, Ray Campbell Hudson backed up his report to the Eagle with another to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. V. A. Hudson. In a letter to Mr. and Mrs. Hudson, Ray Campbell wrote:

"These Yankees have gone wild over the horned toads and rattlesnake rattlers. We traded away all our trading material before the Jamboree started. We have met boys from Alaska, Maine, Pennsylvania, New Mexico and other States. We traded with boys from Alaska. One of the boys from Alaska got sick because it was too hot for him. We nearly freeze at night, though."

As everybody is supposed to know, a horned toad stands on

his hind legs when his (or her) stomach is rubbed gently. One of the stories that has come back from Valley Forge tells that our own Scouts, in trading off their horned toads, told the innocent little Yankees that it took months of training to make the horned toads stand on their hind legs.

At Valley Forge, the Scouts were addressed by such notable personages as President Truman and General Eisenhower. Further reports on such high-lights of the Jamboree will have to await the return of the Scouts next week. Meanwhile, such reports as have been received have been devoted to telling about horned toads, rattlesnake rattlers, cockleburrs (porcupine eggs) — and how busy the Scouts have been. They have been too busy to write; too busy with trading. Dr. Graves continues to get very short shrift in the reports from the Scouts. He has received only one brief mention in the reports to the Eagle. That report said that Dr. Graves, too, was very, very busy.

Mrs. Graves, at least, has heard from Dr. Graves and through her, the Eagle heard from him too.

Dr. Graves wrote that "these Goldthwaite boys are tops... I still think that our group is the best up here."

Even Dr. Graves took to writing to Mrs. Graves about Texas horned toads. He said that at the rate the young Texas have been trading horned toads to northerners, they could have paid their way to the Jamboree. One group sent back to Brownwood for an additional 200 horned toads. Dr. Graves wrote to Mrs. Graves.

Dr. Graves also reported to his wife that the members of the Mills County delegation were well, happy and of course thrilled.

## Telephone Co-op Receives New Bids For Rural Service

The Central Texas Telephone Cooperative, which soon is to provide modern, rural dial telephone communications over an area of nine counties with the central exchange in Goldthwaite, continues to receive applications from hopeful prospective subscribers. Secretary Ernest E. Wilson announced this week in behalf of President Willis Hill.

Mr. Wilson said that at Rochelle, on the night of next Thursday, July 13, the officers and directors of the Central Texas Telephone Cooperative will meet to discuss with leading citizens of McCullough County proposals that the Cooperative institute rural communications throughout McCullough County.

Plans already had been made to have the service extend into McCullough County but this week, Arthur B. Scharlach, Service Agent for the McCullough County Farm Bureau and Leon Lee, President of the Rochelle Lions Clubs, approached the Central Texas Telephone Cooperative with expansion plans.

Decisions as to how much farther the Central Texas Telephone Cooperative will extend its line will be reached at the meeting that has been called for Rochelle on July 13, Mr. Wilson said.

In the other eight counties, Mr. Wilson said, interest continues so high in the plans for rural telephone service in the heart of Texas that applications again are being received, with the understanding that priority will be enjoyed by the original applicants—those who asked for membership in the Co-op prior to June 1. In making commitments for service, Mr. Wilson pointed out, it is necessary to take into consideration the unsettled international situation.

Initial applications, numbering more than one thousand, now are being processed in Washington, D. C., by the Telephone Division of the Rural Electrification Administration. It is expected that, war conditions permitting, a go-ahead will be received soon from Washington by the Goldthwaite office of the Central Texas Telephone Cooperative. That would result in putting into motion the engineering plans that already have been made for service, radiating from Goldthwaite, into a vast area that would naturally look to Goldthwaite as a trade center because of the

Oh, well, if it isn't one thing, it's another.

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HONESTY IN THE NEWS

No service can be rendered to this great nation of ours by sugar-coating the news. It is pure and simple hokey to tell the American people that by fighting Red Koreans in Korea, we are preventing World War III. We are not doing anything of the sort. We are fighting World War II right now. It is an extension of World War II. With the defeat of Germany and Japan in 1945, there remained another enemy. Russia never was on our side on what was called World War II. Russia was on her own side only. We are fighting Russia, and we have been engaged in a shooting war with Russia for the past two weeks.

It is pure and simple hokey to tell the American people that the United Nations is "localizing" or "confining" the war in Korea. In our effort to stop Stalin, we have the support of a number of nations, but the truth of the news is that the United States, as one of the last remaining islands of freedom, is fighting Red Communist Imperialism. Depending upon the fortune of battle, there may be lulls in the fighting from time to time, but for all practical purposes, we are embarked on a course that will continue to the final showdown. We must be honest about it. Just like Russia, America is girding for war. The life of every man, woman and child in the United States will be affected—to the point that the war years of World War II will seem like a picnic as we look back upon them.

War is no time for pretense at fiction. Communists, whether in Korea, China, French Indo-China or in the Red Satellite dependencies of Europe, are the instruments of the Kremlin. So are the Communists here.

The distressing part about the news of the past two weeks has been the fact that so many, who are charged with the responsibility of telling the American people the truth, have been assailed by doubt. Whether in Government, in journalism or in radio—which is not mature enough to be rated with journalism—the officials, writers and broadcasters appear to have been fearful of telling the American people the truth. The burden of the news has been that "maybe, maybe, everything will be all right." The risk has been admitted, but it has been called only a risk when, actually, the signal for the showdown came when we intervened with American arms against Red Russian arms in Korea.

This is not a dogmatic editorial. It has been written against the background of a quarter of a century of personal experience in the strong currents of world affairs. One of our first editorial comments in The Eagle's Aery on this page stated that Goldthwaite was as good a place as any from which to have a perspective on the headlong rush of mankind to his destiny. It would be easy to say "maybe, maybe, maybe," in the manner of so many other commentators on events. But there is no "maybe" about it. The certainty is that fighting will continue until it has been determined whether human beings in all countries are to be free, or whether they are to submit to the yoke of Red Imperialism.

That is why it is so essential to be honest about the news. We can win, although the price will be high. We can win better if we are not fooled or kidded—if we know from the very start that there will be war until the Red Dictatorship that operates in all countries, but which makes its headquarters in the Kremlin in Moscow, has been overthrown.

America is the world's only hope. We can have some helpers as we pass through the dark valleys ahead. But the helpers are weak. Without us, they would be in chains already.

The atom bomb and the hydrogen bomb have little to do with the case. They just happen to be the newest weapons of destruction. Man always has had new weapons for every war that he has fought—and man always has fought wars. The newest weapons make the promise of destruction more terrible than ever before—but it is just as bad to die with an arrow through your heart as with a geiger counter ticking off radioactivity at your side. The most terrible thing is to die unprepared. We need not die unprepared if we can have honesty in the news. To have it, we must insist on being told the truth. To have the grimmest possible news sugar-coated is to have Americans treated like children. We are not. We are men who can and who must fight. But we must have honesty in the news of this portentous summer of 1950. Americans always are able to meet any challenge when they know what it is and whence it comes—even the grave challenge of global warfare.

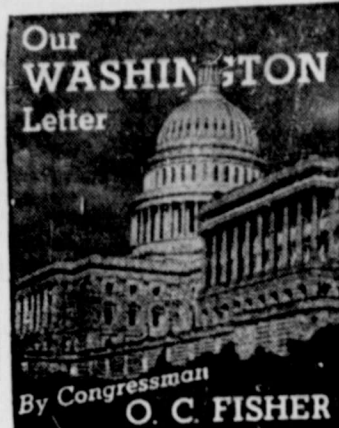

A grim calmness pervaded the Capitol last week as the Korean situation was watched with an interest reminiscent of war days. The President's dramatic and historic announcement that we would use military force to protect Formosa and South Korea was received in Congress with jubilation and approval. The extension of the draft law for a year—a week ago somewhat controversial—was passed by the House with but four dissenting votes a few hours after the President's announcement.

The invasion into south Korea was not unexpected. It had been foreseen for months, and many had urged the President last year to tell the world we would lend military assistance to south Korea if it should be attacked. But it was announced months ago that both Formosa and Korea were not considered essential to U. S. defense.

Now, however, the picture has changed and little Korea has become the symbol of freedom, of the right to live in peace and security in a world surrounded by Communist brigands.

If you will look at your map you will see that Korea is a peninsula jutting out into the sea of Japan, a hundred miles from Tokyo. It is bounded on the northwest by Manchuria for some 500 miles, and its land area is within 100 miles of Russia's Vladivostok. In area it is a third the size of Texas but with more than four times as many people.

Korea is highly strategic militarily from the standpoint of both Russia and Japan. Long ago Korea became to Japan "a dagger pointed at her heart." In fact Russia and Japan fought two wars in the past over control of Korea, with Japan winning the 1904 contest. So, in 1910 Japan annexed the peninsula and it remained that way until the close of World War II.

Back in 1943 the United States, China and Great Britain pledged at the Cairo Conference that Korea would become independent. And later Russia subscribed to this pledge at Potsdam. But meantime at Yalta in 1945, a secret agreement is reported to have been made for Russia to capture North Korea to the 38th parallel, when she entered the Japanese war. The U. S. was to occupy the southern part.

The theory was that the military occupations would be temporary and that a free democratic government would be set up. We complied with our part of the bargain and withdrew our 80,000 troops in January of 1949.

But not so with Russia. She refused to allow North Korea to hold a free election or join in any sort of united government. Instead, a puppet government in the North was set up, asserting control over the south as well. A free election conducted by the United Nations created the Southern Republic, and it claimed jurisdiction over the north where the Russians would not permit an election.

In the meantime the United Nations took a hand to try to break the stalemate. A UN commission was sent to Korea to get facts. But it was stopped at the 38th parallel and was not allowed inside the Russian dominated portion. The election in the south followed.

Moscow claimed its troops were withdrawn from Korea in December of 1948.

Now the UN has condemned the recent invasion, and the United States, supporting the UN declaration is giving military aid to the embattled southerners.

Perhaps it's the heat down in the parched San Saba bottomlands, but whatever the cause, Round-Up, the first page column in the San Saba News, is getting impatient. Even before The Eagle's Aery was able to get into print with Round-Up's S-O-S to Goldthwaite for a secondhand Mayor, Round-Up was accusing us of downright unneighborliness for not having already supplied a Mayor for San Saba.

Such impatience and downright crochettiness is bad for you, Round-Up. At best, it may lead to ulcers; at the worst, you may go right through the roof and never come down again. Then where would San Saba be—without a Mayor and, without you, Round-Up? Yes, but, Round-Up—in the very first newspaper to roll off our press after your plea to Goldthwaite for a second-hand Mayor, we published your dire need in a spirit of deep sympathy. It is enough to have to worry about that, Round-Up, without having to take on the burden of your ulcers, too.

This has to be confidential, Round-Up. It must remain strictly between ourselves. But no sooner had the Eagle hit the streets with your plea to Goldthwaite to send down a Mayor than we were literally deluged with suggestions. We are waiting calmly, and patiently, for the first impact of the response to subsidize. Our reason for counseling patience is the nature of the original nominations. There may be better ones, later, but knowing how sensitive you are down there, we would not want you to be affronted—or even thank you had been affronted—by the suggestions that have reached us so far.

If you will keep it quiet, Round-Up, the editor will confide to you that up here in Mills County (Paradise), they have had on their hands for years a character whose mere existence has posed a monumental problem. The citizens have not known what to do

full military support behind the invasion, the south will be overrun. But most people think Russia, through her puppet, is simply probing a soft spot in the free world to find out how far they can go without having the free world hit back.

But now the free world is hitting back. If the free world had hit back at Hitler and at Japan in the 30's, perhaps World War II could have been averted. And Russia has now been told that this kind of monkey business will not be tolerated by Uncle Sam; that appeasement is out; that a show-down on the effectiveness and integrity of the UN is at hand; that the Russian postwar crimes against free people will be challenged around the world.

As one observer said, the future of the free world is at stake. We have a chance to stop the Russians today without war; if we fail to make the most of that chance, then on some future day, as surely as the sun rises and sets, we shall have to stop them with a war that could end in the ruin of our civilization.

## Of The Brown-Mills Conservation District

Special windrower that was used by the Supervisors of Brown-Mills Soil Conservation District was going full during the past week harvesting the best sweetclover crop that the cooperators with district have enjoyed.

Owen's Hubam and vetch was the first cut, and everyone who the crop will testify that it is "impossible" to harvest it daily laid out in windrows. Owens will pick it up with this combine, which is used with the pick-up reel. The swindle of the Wash-Group was next, and he led-up the windrower on acre field of Evergreen. He cut it for hay, in the week when it

was baled, he discovered that he had 106 bales of excellent clover hay from the five acres. This crop was produced from May 17 when the field was mowed for weed control to June 26 when he cut it with the windrower. Early the next morning, while the dew was still on, Charlie windrowed eight acres of Madrid sweetclover. Four days later he picked-up the clover from the windrow with his pick-up reel on his combine and the seed was dried out sufficiently to keep in the sacks.

Elmer Embrey and Cecil Partin harvested their Madrid clover later in the day because the seed was not over-ripe. W. C. Echoles got his field the next day. Early Thursday morning, J. H. Priddy put seven acres

of Madrid clover in the windrow for seed production. L. B. Burnham and R. C. McCollum harvested their Madrid seed crop on Friday and during the night Friday, Roy Weidner and C. L. Evans used the windrower in their Madrid clover fields to harvest a good crop that was fully matured.

Since the seed on the sweetclovers matures in different stages, it is necessary to cut the green stalks and dry the seeds before they are threshed, otherwise, they would heat and spoil. The windrower attachment that has been purchased by the Supervisors, cuts the standing crop and places it in a windrow to allow the seed to dry out. After three to five days, the crop can be picked up from the windrow and threshed in a combine.

In the Caradan community, another successful method is being used. Jess Petsick, Clyde Kerby, Harold Beard and H. C. McNeil have cut their Madrid clover with a broadcast binder and have shocked the bundles to allow the seed to dry out. They will pull a combine from shock to shock and thresh the seed. Harold Beard and Frank Kerby used this method two years ago with excellent results. The Madrid clover harvest

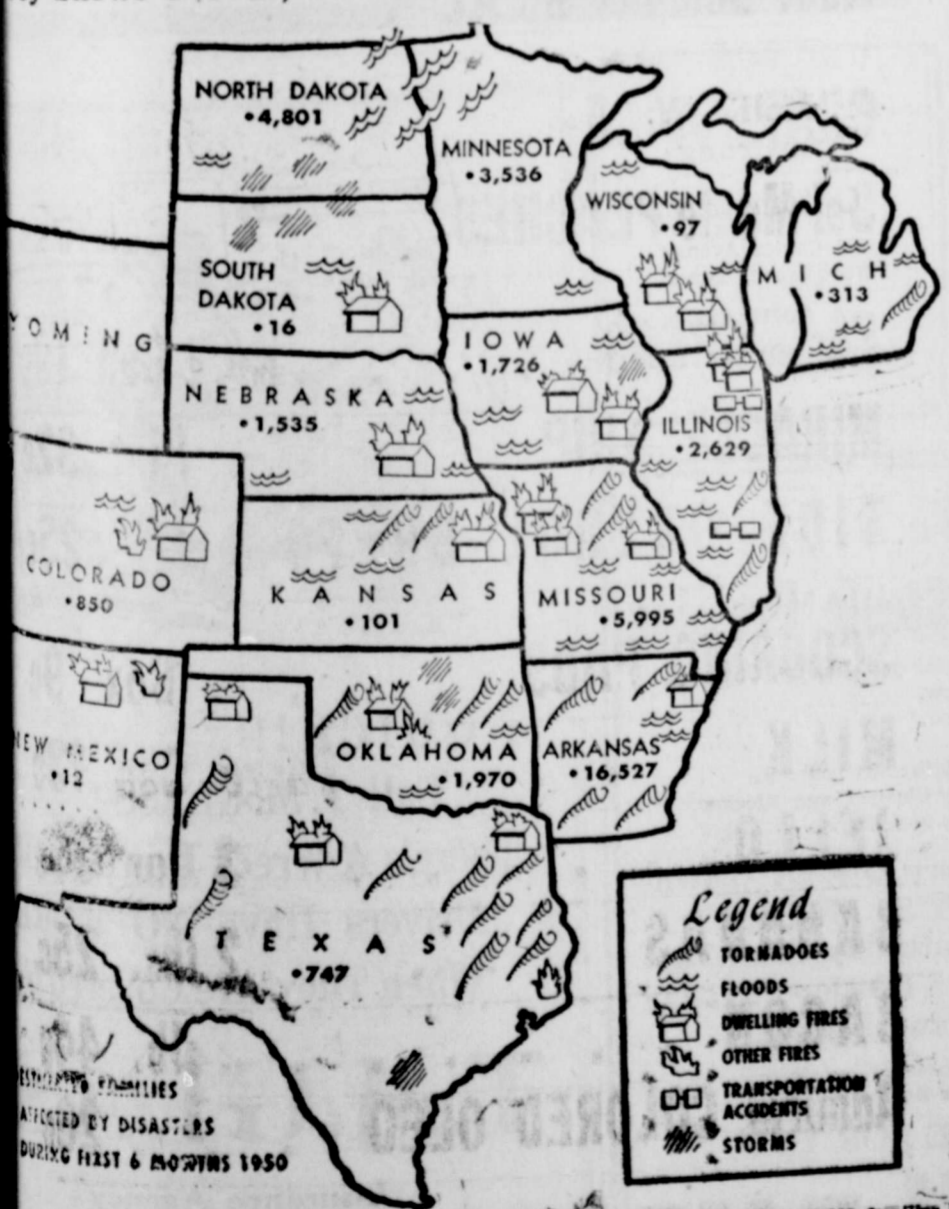

For those that were relieved from active duty shortly after the end of the war will have their commissions expire this year and in 1951.

At the present time the Reserve Liaison Office at Bergstrom Air Force Base at Austin, Texas, is attempting to organize a Volunteer Air Reserve Training (VART) unit in this city or area. The close proximity of this unit will help the participants in this locale to keep their reserve commissions current. Participation in the VART program also includes promotion and retirement benefits. The Bergstrom Office, having 36 counties in its jurisdiction including Mills County, states that their approximately 10,000 reserve Air Force officers in its area and only about 10 per cent are participating in the active reserve program at the present time.

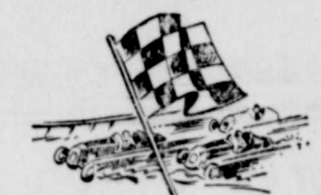
