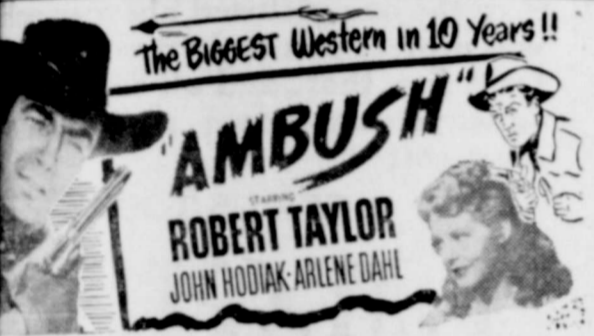

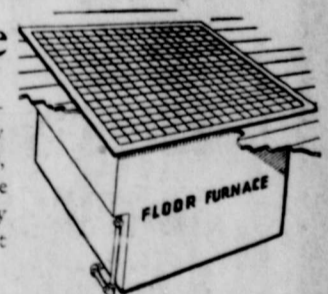

1/2 cup brown sugar
No. 2 1/2 can fruit cocktail, well drained
1 package white cake mix
1/2 cup Pet Milk

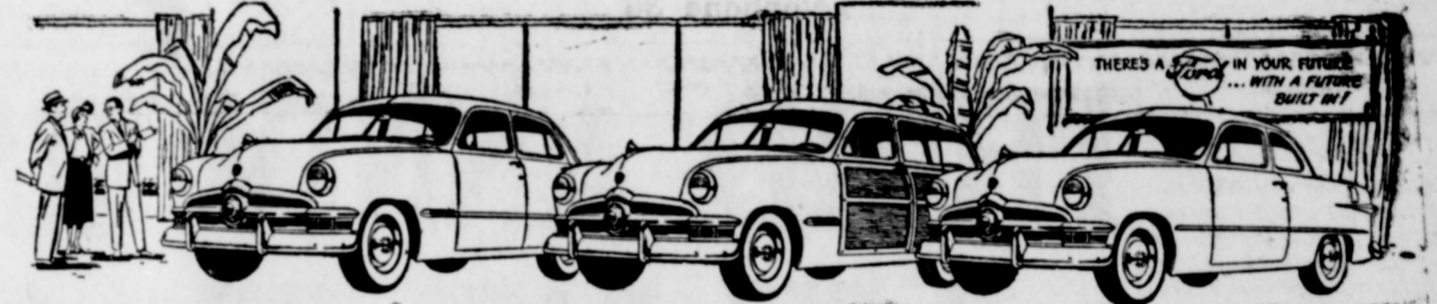

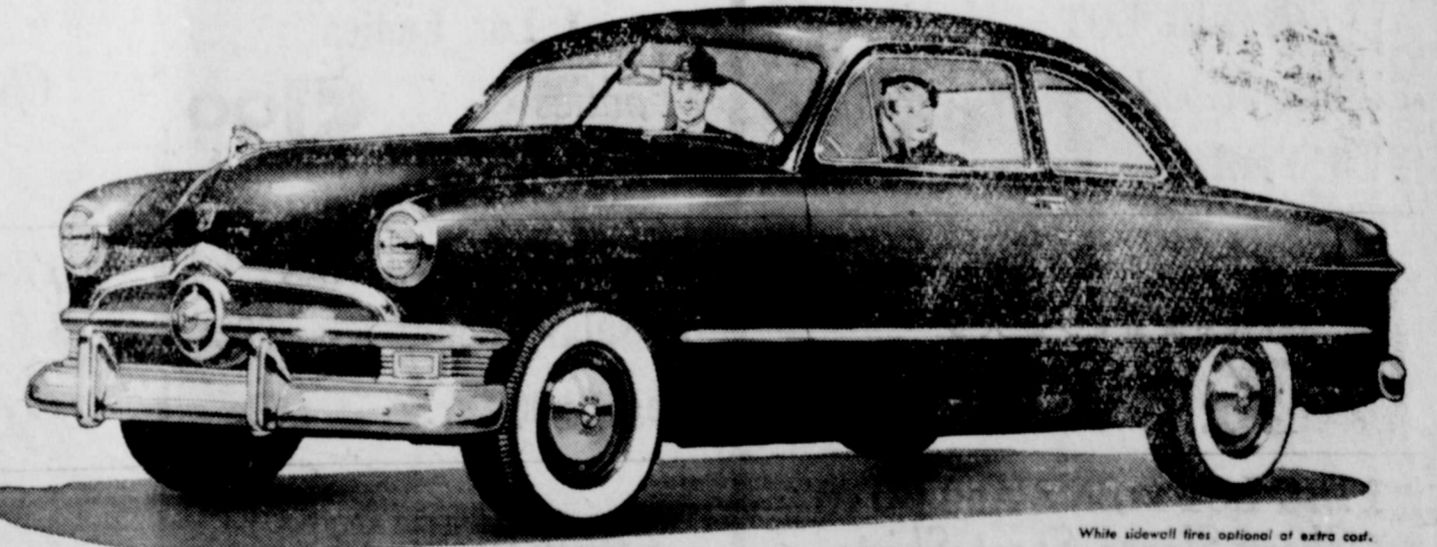
