Mrs. Sanders attended Star High School, while the groom attended Mullin High School, and is now employed by a construction company in Kerrville.

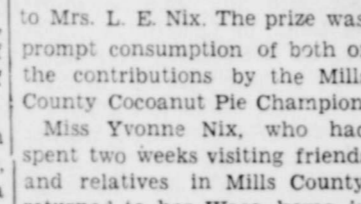

**News Of The Brown-Mills  
Soil Conservation District**



"Plow erosion may not be the proper name for it," says Ben R. Day, Work Unit Conservationist of Goldthwaite, "but we will use the term to describe the ditches and bare ground that are left when the topsoil is removed by plowing." The condition becomes serious, Day points out, after a field is terraced and the land is plowed year after year between terraces with the disc plow and one-way plow.  
Proper terrace maintenance comes into the picture the first year the terraces are constructed, Day says, and the way the land is plowed will determine how long the terraces will last. First, the terraces should be plowed in such a way that they can be easily farmed. Second, the plowing operation should maintain or increase the capacity of the terrace channel. Perhaps each terrace in a field would have to be plowed in a different manner in order to meet the above requirements.  
Bert Hooper, who farms the Anna Pfluger place near Priddy, shaped his terraces as he plowed his land and found that the terraces were easier to farm. On the terraces that were pointed, he plowed the top of the terrace down-hill. On the ridge-type terraces, he lapped the dirt in the lower water channel in order to convert them to the channel-type terraces. In each

case, he wound up with the dead-furrow in the channel of his terraces. This dead-furrow cleans out the terrace channel and maintains the capacity of the terrace while the ridge is being shaped up so that the harvesting equipment can be operated on the terraces.  
After the terraces have been shaped and maintained, Day points out that the remaining land between terraces should be plowed in such a way that the land will be left level. Many farmers know that in a few years the crops half way between terraces do not produce. The topsoil has been moved against the fence or piled on top of the terrace. On land that is not terraced, the dead furrow in the middle of the field is usually running up and down the hill and is the beginning of a serious gully.  
Day has figured out that if a farmer can plow 10 acres a day 6 inches deep, he has moved 8000 cubic yards of soil one foot closer to the fence. The plow is a dirt moving machine, Day says, and the farmer had better plan where he wants to move his topsoil on his farm before he starts plowing. The technicians with the Soil Conservation Service at Goldthwaite are assisting cooperating farmers with their terrace maintenance and land preparation this season.

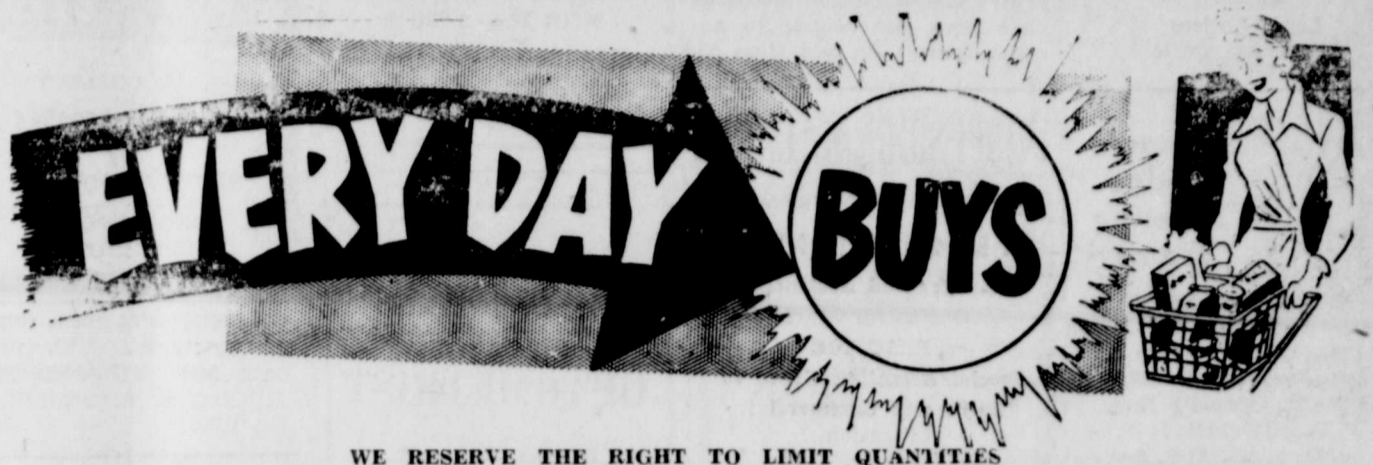

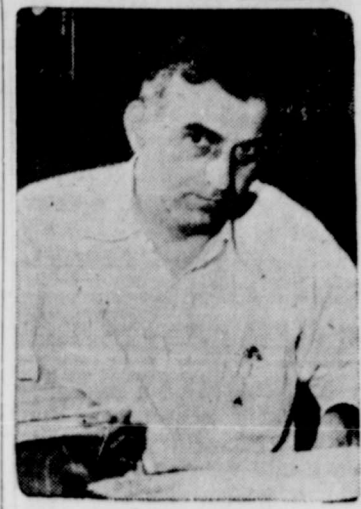

While Secretary of State Dean Acheson, in his awful bewilderment, tries to peddle the puny thought that nobody knows what is in the Russian mind, the fact is that young American men are paying with their lives for the stupidity of men who, at best, and by giving them the benefit of charitable thoughts, have misled the American people.

Some of us thrilled when the United States Marines landed in Pusan, in Korea, and said to battle-weary soldiers: "Okay, Junior, the Marines are here, and you can go home now!" That would be nice stuff to read now—except that the Marines are finding themselves not up against a bunch of "gooks" from North "Red" Korea, but, rather, against the military power of the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics. Let's have an end to pretending. Let's go into this fight with everything that we have, determined to win—but bereft of the fuzzy, bewildered and confused thinking that marks the "hope for the best" daily statements from official Washington.

Russia, six months ago, took a walk from the United Nations. This week, the Russians came back to use the United Nations as a sounding board for the propaganda of the Kremlin. It is hypocrisy for us to continue to sit in the United Nations and allow the Russians to continue to use it for their own purposes, when we know that from the start, the Kremlin went into the United Nations only for the purpose of rendering it impotent as an instrument for the preservation of peace among men.

Look to the hills above, and the beaches around Pusan for your news. Then, raise your voice against the hypocrisy that, at Lake Success, keeps us arguing with Jacob Malik about what it is on which we cannot agree. Come right down to it, and we cannot agree that Red Russian Communism will rule the world. The war is between Freedom, on the one hand, and Tyranny on the other. The cards must be placed, face up, on the table. The diplomats were licked a long time ago. The soldiers have taken over. The soldier fights—his prospect of life is too brief for hypocrisy.
