

We are a long way from a metropolitan center. We do not face the grim prospect of becoming a target for enemy bombers. But that does not mean that we can sit back and do nothing about a future that is, to say the least, uncertain. For example: saboteurs could strike anywhere, especially at shipping points on railroads. In the case of major disaster in a large city, we might be asked to provide shelter for refugees. And, over the entire world, there are the shadows of the atom and hydrogen bombs, which can send radioactive clouds into regions far beyond the original targets. Guided missiles, developments of the "buzz bomb" and rocket bombs of World War II, can fall anywhere, especially when off course or out of control. Such tragedies may not happen, but they can happen, and whenever the proper person or organization calls for preparation, the fullest possible public ton and wife. understanding and cooperation must be forthcoming without stint in the interest of the general welfare.

As you read the news of steps toward preparedness that are being taken by responsible men and women at the expense of their own time and effort, we suggest that their load can be lightened if they know that they can depend on public cooperation and recommendations. understanding-without alarm, but with the knowledge that the fate of society as a whole may be found in the balance and that without adequate preparation, reality could be worse than even the prospect, if emergency does come. It may be years before any of us can breathe freely again. The bill requires the Communist party to label all literature which it publishes or distributes and to identify Sovietsponsored radio and television programs. And there are a number of other provisions that will add to the discomfort of these traitorous characters who live

The Anti-Slot Machine Bill which we passed would make it illegal to ship one of the unearmed bandits or parts thereof in interstate commerce. It is true, of course, that no law alone can end the mulcting and racketeering associated with these devices. But this bill when enacted, will make it easier to control the hookups with racketeers who often escape across State lines. This law, with real effort by local authorities over the country, on do a lot toward breaking down this nefarious gaming device. And it will probably become law this year.
