## Goldthwaite Electric, Morelands Make Changes On Business Map

### Howard Campbell Director Of Free Chest X-Ray Plan

Save the dates of May 5, 7, 8 and 9 for free chest X-ray examinations that will be given to the public generally under the chairmanship of Howard Campbell in cooperation with the tuberculosis division of the Texas State Department of Health.

Representative citizens met to plan the continuing fight for the eradication of tuberculosis at the Mills County Court House last Tuesday. They conferred with Charles H. Hoover, field representative of the Texas Department of Health, elected Mr. Campbell to direct the operation locally, and set up an extensive organization to assure success of the undertaking.

Last year, when free chest X-ray examinations were given in the display room of the Smith Equipment Company, 1,575 persons took advantage of the opportunity. Mr. Campbell said this week that he hoped many others would make a point of free chest X-rays this year—including those who were examined last year.

Between now and the May dates for the examinations, Mr. Campbell will announce the names of those who will serve with him in the Mills County anti-tuberculosis effort this year. He pointed out that the free chest X-rays will be for all persons over 15 years of age and that free transportation will be provided for any person who may need it.

Mayor Loy Long will serve as the Vice Chairman of Mr. Campbell's committee.

### Conradt Plans To End Heart Fund Campaign Soon

Charles Conradt, Mills County campaign fund director for the American Heart Association, said this week that he hopes to finish the 1951 drive to aid in fighting heart disease during the next week or ten days.

Mr. Conradt also announced that he is being assisted in his work for the American Heart Association by Leroy Beard of Star, T. M. Cash of Priddy and Wray B. Williams of Mullin. Eugene L. Dyas, President of the Goldthwaite Junior Chamber of Commerce, is Chairman for Goldthwaite.

In appealing for public support of the work of the American Heart Association, Mr. Conradt pointed out that in most places the 1951 campaign was conducted in February. Accordingly, he asked for prompt action in Mills County through donations, large and small, to be placed in the plastic "hearts" that are to be found in business establishments.

Mr. Conradt also pointed out that practically all of the money raised by the American Heart Association is used to assist the medical profession in reducing the ravages of heart disease.

New business activity involving expansion of the Goldthwaite Electric Company, a new location for the H. E. Moreland & Son Grocery, and the opening of a new Humble Service Station next door to the Eagle office on the east side of the Square, was evident during the past week.

Ernest E. Wilson of the Goldthwaite Electric Company was busy directing the painting and renovating of the former Shepherd Hatchery where shortly he will open with considerable fanfare new display and sales rooms for the Philco line of appliances.

On the south side of the Square, Jesse C. Moreland was busy directing the reconstruction of the former Lee Long garage, adjoining the H. E. Moreland & Son feed store. With completion of the work, the Morelands plan to move their grocery store from its present location on the west side of the Square so that their combined business operations will be virtually under one roof.

A separate news account of the opening of the new Humble station under the management of Hub Howard will be found elsewhere in this week's Eagle.

Mr. Wilson said that the opening of Goldthwaite Electric's Philco establishment on Fourth Street, between the Square and the railroad tracks, will represent definite expansion since he will continue to operate the Goldthwaite Electric Company in its established location on the east side of the Square. Further news on Mr. Wilson's burgeoning plans for Philco sales headquarters will be announced shortly.

Mr. Moreland said he hoped that the changes he is making on the Goldthwaite business map will be completed before the end of this month.

## Adams Says King May Suffer From Writer's Cramp

Having completed his replica of the Stone of Scone to replace the one that was stolen from under the Coronation Chair in Westminster Abbey, London, late last year, E. B. Adams this week expressed the opinion that

Mr. Adams had many offers of help. Slick Airways want to fly the replica of the Stone of Scone to New York—for the mere consideration of \$6.60 per 100 pounds. The Stone weighs 485 pounds.

Leonard Archer has volunteered to take the Stone to London in a rowboat. No fee, he said, but Mrs. Archer will do the rowing. The twins, Linda and Lana, will have to stay home because they might rock the boat and fall overboard, Mr. Archer said.

The proposal was made that Mayor Loy Long push the replica of the Stone of Scone to the British Embassy in Washington in order to obtain more publicity for Goldthwaite.

Between the Goldthwaite and San Angelo Shows, Scotty took sixth place in the boys' show at Houston and won in his class in the open show at San Antonio. San Angelo was the end of the road for Scotty, because after he was declared the Grand Champion, he was sold for \$1.25 per pound. He weighed 1,060 pounds.



This week, Johnny Wigley—naturally proud and brimful of enthusiasm over his success as a calf feeder—said he would "get me some more calves" and try for further honors in next year's livestock exhibitions. Johnny is only 11. He has just finished his first two years as a 4-H Club calf feeder.

At the San Angelo Show, Dana Saylor of Goldthwaite took seventh place with a Hereford

calf, while eighth place went to Wayne Poe, and Leo Reynolds took 12th place. Dana, Wayne and Leo also are 4-H Club members.

## Eagles Will Scrimmage For The Quarterback Club Friday Night

President E. B. Gilliam, Jr., said that in addition to the scrimmage that will demonstrate the results of the first two weeks of spring training, there will be a Quarterback Club business meeting and a social hour revolving around the serving of coffee and sinkers.

## Ridge Again Is First To Exceed Red Cross Quota

With the 1951 fund campaign of the American Red Cross off to a good start, the community of Ridge repeated last year's performance and again became the first in Mills County to exceed its quota.

On Wednesday of this week Mrs. W. H. Freeman of Ridge went to the Trent State Bank and delivered to General Campaign Director Warren P. Duren \$24.77—an amount that was \$4.77 over the Ridge quota.

Last Tuesday night Mr. Duren exhibited the latest film, "Red Cross Report," to the Goldthwaite Lions Club at the Hangar and last Monday Mr. Duren presented the same film before a group that had gathered for a Mullin Lions Club ladies night.

Demonstrating how close the American Red Cross always is to the people of Mills County—as it is to people in every community throughout the nation—Ray Barnett, Principal of the Mullin High School, told Mr. Duren that while he was a prisoner of war during World War II, Red Cross food packages saved his eye sight. Malnutrition, Mr. Barnett said, had caused him to face the possible loss of an eye but the timely arrival of the Red Cross food packages averted surgery that had been threatened.

Throughout Mills County, co-Chairmen who are working with Mr. Duren on the 1951 Red Cross campaign are making their collections toward the overall quota of \$2,800.00 for Mills County. This week Ray Duren, Chairman for Goldthwaite, said that he will announce the names of district committee chairmen and the members of their teams very soon.

Warren Duren said this week that the film, "Red Cross Report," is available for showings before groups and that to book the picture it will be necessary only to communicate with him or with any of his co-workers throughout the County.

As the 1951 American Red Cross fund campaign is conducted in Mills County under the general chairmanship of Warren P. Washington News

(Editor's Note: This week the United States, Great Britain and France began in Paris another attempt to reach agreement with Communist Russia by negotiation. Because very soon we shall find ourselves in a new phase of the crisis that has been mounting since last June, the Eagle this week publishes in this column an illuminating article by Stewart Alsop.)

A nightmare is beginning to hunt those principally responsible for American foreign policy. For it is now about as certain as such things can be that the Kremlin will soon formally propose a German settlement based on the unity of a "neutralized" Germany, after the staged withdrawal of all occupation troops. And it is even possible that the Kremlin will ostensibly accept the principle of a free, secret, unsupervised vote to elect a single all-German government.

This prospect has initiated a crucial, agonized debate in the inner circles of the State Department and the Pentagon. For the objective of such an apparently reasonable Soviet offer would be to end Western rearmament, split the Western alliance, and thus knock the props right out from under American foreign policy.

The evidence is increasingly strong that the Soviets will produce some such proposal at the forthcoming foreign ministers conference. This evidence takes various forms, such as dispatches from Moscow, reporting that the Soviets are now eager for a German settlement on generous terms. But the most convincing evidence is provided by the course of the campaign for "unity and neutrality" waged within Germany by the East German Communists.

Recently East German Communist Chief Otto Grotewohl more than hinted that the Communists would welcome free, secret elections throughout Germany as a basis for forming a united government.

Grotewohl acted, of course, on specific instructions from the Kremlin. And Grotewohl's line thus almost certainly foreshadows the Kremlin's line at the foreign ministers' meeting. Almost no informed official believes that a Soviet offer of a German settlement on such terms would be genuine. The reasons are obvious.

A genuine German settlement also would involve a genuine Austrian settlement. This would mean a Soviet guarantee to withdraw the Red army from all the satellites—and the satellites are more restive than ever before. It would mean the

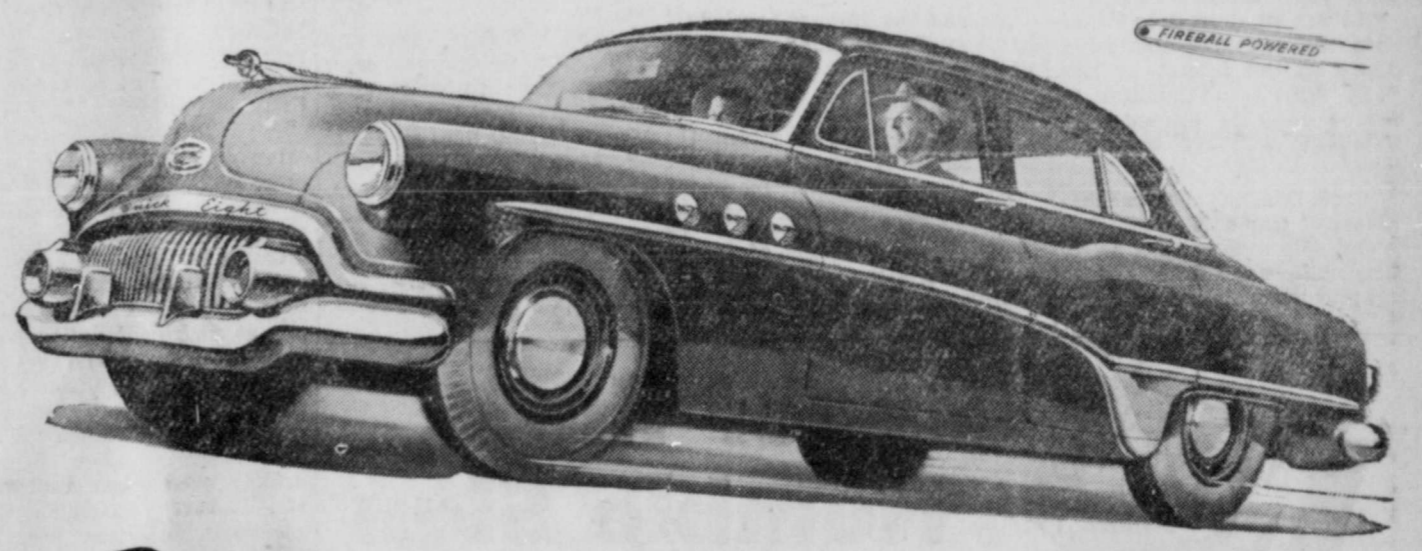

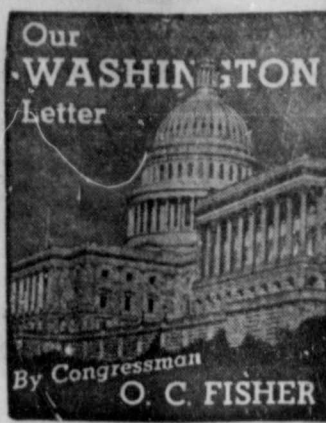

Still marking time until committee hearings are concluded on important measures, the House attended to routine business last week and listened to a special message from President Truman calling for cuts in the huge annual Post-Office Department deficit by increasing and adjusting postal rates.

The House tackled that problem last year and succeeded in passing a bill in part modernizing postal rates as recommended by the Hoover Commission. The measure, if it had been finally enacted, would have raised revenues by \$130 million annually to partially meet the \$550 million annual Post Office deficit, the largest deficit in postal history. That bill included no increases for first-class letter mail, air mail, weekly newspapers of less than 5,000 circulation, daily newspapers of less than 10,000, religious publications, bulk mailings of seeds, plants, etc., and money orders.

It costs the Department 2.6 cents per piece to handle penny post cards, causing an annual loss in that item alone of \$57 million. The House bill upped the post card rates to 2 cents. Rates on second class mail were increased by \$15 million, and third and fourth class matter was hiked moderately. Other adjustments are overdue, and a new bill on the postal rate subject will probably be before the House before long.

It's easy to preach economy in general terms but it is quite another matter to get specific where particular groups are affected. Not long ago I announced that, in an effort to more nearly balance the budget and pay as we go for national preparedness, I favored cuts on all non-essentials, including retrenchment on payments to farmers and ranchmen for certain range practices such as drilling wells, brush eradication, etc. However desirable these splendid practices are, this Federal help can be reduced and much of the program can be carried on by individuals and State agencies.

Following my announcement I have received scores of letters from farmers and ranchmen commending me for my stand. The Farm Bureau directors of Tom Green County unanimously endorsed my position.

This is but one instance where savings can be had. There are many other non-essentials that Uncle Sam can cut or reduce during this emergency when we are faced with higher taxes and a need for more preparedness funds. Unless and until new taxes are voted, a Federal deficit of more than \$16 billion during the next fiscal year is faced, if the President's spending program is permitted.

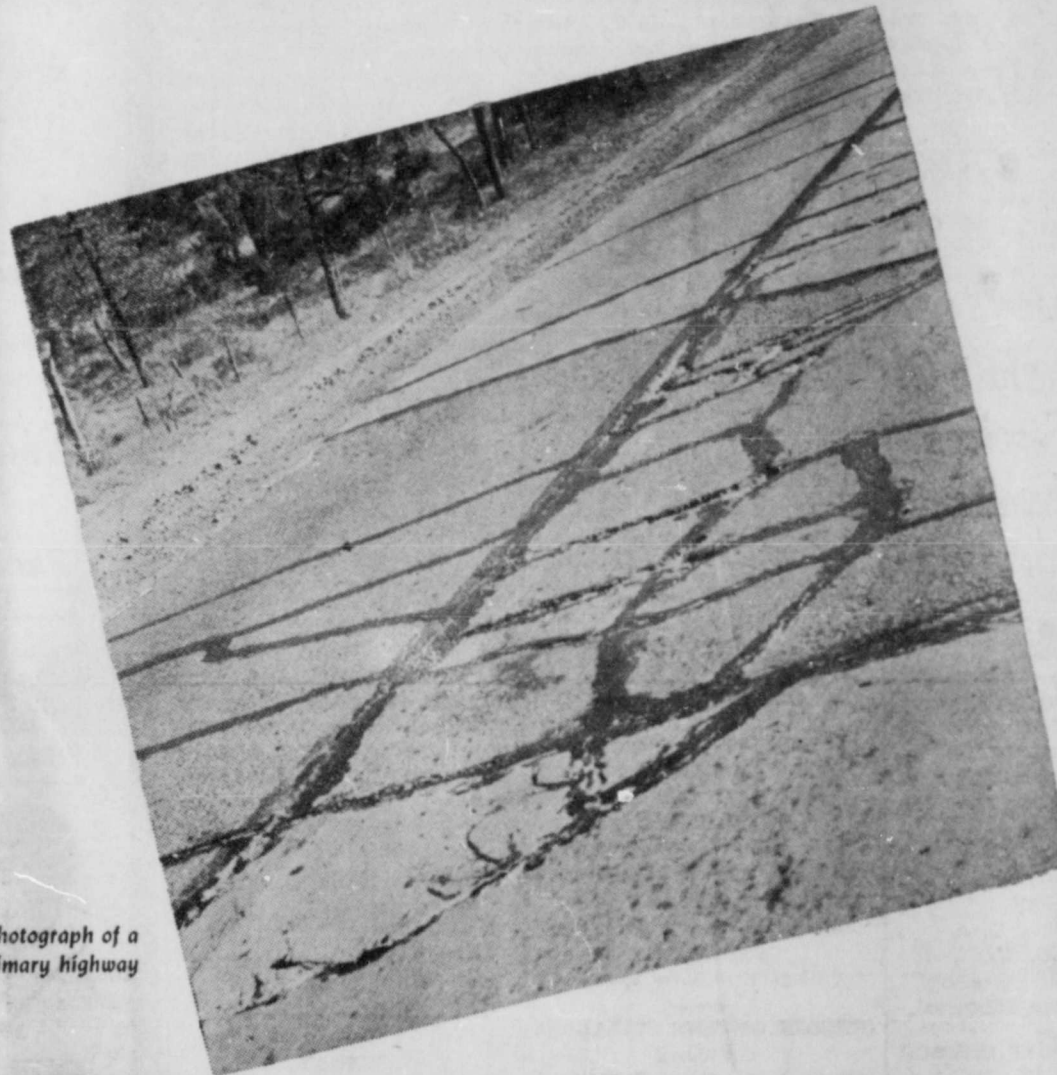

## News Of The Brown-Mills Soil Conservation District

Sandy land farmers can plan to keep their soil from blowing next fall and spring. District cooperators with the assistance of Soil Conservation Service technicians have discovered practical ways to hold their sandy soils in place.

A winter cover crop of rye or vetch and rye has proven to be an effective means of tying the loose sand down. But the farmers who have relied entirely on winter cover crops to hold their sandy land have failed the past two years to get a good stand due to the dry weather. This has left the land bare in many instances and the sand has blown.

G. G. Goss, Supervisor of the Brown-Mills Soil Conservation District from Rising Star says, "I made a statement in the early days of our cover crop program, that cover crops would be successful about three years out of five, and was severely criticized for knocking on my own program. After about five successful cover crops, I became over-confident as to the dependability of cover crops, and omitted strip cropping. Due to the unusually dry fall and winter, my land, and that of most of my neighbors has suffered severely from wind erosion. In my opinion, it will require years to build back the organic matter being lost. I feel that it is my duty, now, to recommend strip-cropping, on the contour, spaced according to the recommendations of the Soil Conservation Service technicians, in all cases where peanuts are planted on sandy land."

Another practical way of preventing wind damage is to use strips of grain sorghum or sudan across the sandy land fields between each eight rows of peanuts. Cooperating farmers in the Upper-Leon Soil Conservation District are reporting good results from using 2 rows of Sudan and eight rows of peanuts. The strips of Sudan are holding

the soil despite the failure of winter cover crops. Red top cane, grain sorghums, corn, and trial plantings of millet are also used in strips with peanuts, but none have proven as effective as the Sudan.

In an effort to keep the sandy soils covered at all times, some farmers are using trashy tillage methods. This leaves all the cover crops and crop residues on the soil surface which holds it in place. To prepare the land for planting the farmers use a stalk cutter to chop the cover crops up. Then the land is plowed with flat sweeps which leaves the straw on top of the soil for protection. With special care during the planting and cultivation of the peanut crop, an effective cover can be maintained on the land until the peanuts become well established.

Since the peanut combine has come into popular use, more and more peanut hay is being left on the land. This offers additional protection to the soil and adds organic matter that usually is baled for livestock feed. Some farmers feel that the peanut hay is more valuable on the land.

Farmers who wish to keep their sandy land from blowing will use a combination of conservation practices rather than depend on any single measure. They will plant their strip crops of Sudan or grain sorghums this spring preferably on the contour. When they harvest their peanuts, the hay will be allowed to go back on the land. Immediately they will sow a winter cover crop of rye and vetch. They will delay their land preparation until the cover crop makes a good spring growth. Then by using a stalk cutter, sweeps or tillage tools, they will prepare a seedbed and leave most of the straw on the soil surface.

Sandy lands do not have to blow away. They can be farmed safely.

 The Russian of the vital  
 large uranium mines in  
 Germany. A really secret  
 would mean an overwhelm-  
 ing defeat of the East German  
 Communist regime, and a deadly  
 blow to Soviet world prestige.  
 If it would mean a pro-

Western, or at least strongly  
 anti-Communist, all-German  
 government, and however "neu-  
 tralized" Germany might be, it  
 is almost unimaginable that  
 the Kremlin would accept such  
 a risk.

For these reasons and others,  
 it is believed that any Soviet  
 proposal for a German settle-  
 ment will be essentially a fake,  
 a tempting trap for the unwary  
 West. Yet even a fake proposal,  
 cleverly camouflaged, could have  
 disastrous consequences. Ameri-  
 can policy is now squarely based  
 on the assumption that a true  
 balance of power can only be  
 achieved and peace maintained  
 if Western Europe is rendered  
 defensible.

The Pentagon is convinced  
 that Western Europe can never  
 be defended without German  
 participation. A German settle-  
 ment providing for withdrawal

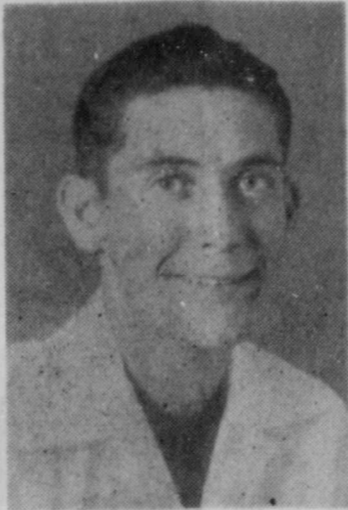
of all occupation troops and the  
 permanent demilitarization of  
 Germany would, it is feared,  
 cause the western European de-  
 fense effort, now just getting  
 under way under General Eisen-  
 hower's leadership, to crumble  
 into nothingness.

Yet even if the Kremlin only  
 seemed ready to offer a reason-  
 able settlement involving the  
 withdrawal of the Red Army to  
 the Russian frontiers, the offer  
 would be almost unbearably  
 tempting to the Germans, the  
 French, the British, and even to  
 many Americans. It might  
 throw the whole Western al-  
 liance into an uproar of bitter  
 mutual recrimination, causing  
 the alliance to fall apart.

This is why the internal debate  
 now going on is so vitally im-  
 portant. One school of thought,  
 particularly in the Pentagon,  
 believes any German settlement  
 at this time, on any terms, dis-  
 astrous. This school would at-  
 tempt to forestall the Kremlin  
 with a prior American proposal  
 for a German settlement, festooned  
 with conditions which the  
 Soviets would not conceivably  
 accept. Yet any diplomatic  
 device so obvious and so clumsy  
 might itself split the allies, by  
 convincing the Europeans that  
 the United States was interest-  
 ed only in war.

Another smaller school of  
 thought believes that German  
 rearmament should be used as a  
 bargaining counter; that it is  
 not wholly impossible that Sov-  
 iet policy may actually have  
 reached a turn in the "zig-zag"  
 course prescribed by Lenin; and  
 that we should be prepared to  
 recognize this change of course,  
 and to take maximum advan-  
 tage of it. One thing is clear—  
 and it is the reason why one of
