SOUTHWEST STATES TELEPHONE COMPANY ASSISTS IN GREATLY ADVANCING PLANS OF REA AND CEN-TEX TELEPHONE COOPERATIVE

A pledge of cooperation by the Southwestern States Telephone Company has resulted in assurance by the Rural Electrification Administration that the Central Texas Telephone Cooperative will receive a federal loan to be used in establishing modern, dial telephone service in rural areas of nine Counties, it was announced this week by Willis A. Hill of Goldthwaite, President of the Co-op.

Week's Rainfall Measures Up To As Much As An Inch And A Half

snow and sleet late in January and early in February, blessed rain fell on Mills County during the past week.

Starting early Monday morning before most people were awake, the rain continued intermittently throughout the day. There were some drizzles on Tuesday and just at dusk on Tuesday night most of Goldthwaite was deluged by both rain and hail. The Tuesday night storm was of short duration but in most sections of Goldthwaite the hail fell in sufficient quantity to make the ground white for a few minutes before it melted.

> Incidentally, in commenting on the fact that Tuesday evening's hail storm was not general throughout the County, Mr. Allen said that the belt covered by a hail storm rarely is more than one mile wide. "It can extend a considerable distance lengthwise but up to a mile usually is the width for a hail storm," Mr. Allen said.

The Eagle's Roy Lee Hill, who now has one of Sam Henry Rahl's rain gauges, reported that the hail that fell on Goldthwaite Tuesday night did not fall on his place 3 1/2 miles southwest of Star. But Mr. Hill registered 1.1 inches of rain out Star way on Monday — which was more than was registered by Mr. Allen in Goldthwaite.

(Editor's Note: One of the most widely discussed of re-cently published articles was written by Merrill Mueller, radio commentator, for Quill-a magazine for journalists published by our fraternity, Sigma Delta Chi. In his article Mr. Mueller, who has been a friend of General Eisenhower for many years, asked: "Which Party Will Draft Ike First?" Because of the great interest in the subject, we reprint the article in full from the March issue of Quill.)




