



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#### AN ACT OF COWARDICE

The assault on Tuesday night of last week on Mullin School Superintendent Wray B. Williams was a cowardly act. Further, it was a violation of just office. plain decency which in an orderly society, forbids anybody but constituted authority to take the law into his own hands.

It is to the credit of the Board of Trustees of the Mullin Independent School District that upon learning of the dastardly attack on Mr. Williams, a full report was filed with Sheriff C. F. Stubblefield and with County Attorney A. M. Pribble.

Persons who would jump a lone man, in the dark, are hardly worthy of being called men. Their disgrace was compounded by the fact that they resorted to mayhem on public property-in the entrance to the Mullin High School - and they made a public servant, their School Superintendent, their victim.

After the attack on Mr. Williams we visited Mullin. One of the respected citizens of that community her son, Tom Rahl, at Los said: "We are ashamed." That reflection of a community attitude served further to set aside the assailants of Mr. William in a class all by themselves - a sas, a long time resident of Mills County and Goldthwaite, class in which no fair or brave man would want to be died in a Fort Smith, Ark., hosfound.

All evidence points to Mr. Williams as a conscientious man who for four years has served sincerely, loyally and with ability to give Mullin a good school administration. But even if he were not an admirable citizen, there would be no excuse under which any group could take it upon themselves to hurl eggs at him and then to give him a physical beating.

When he was set upon, Mr. Williams did not strike back. 





The plants will utilize the moisture stored later in the summer.

Site two was lacking in the amount of moisture that soaked into the soil. At a deph of eighteen inches the soil was dry, packed, and run together. The grass roots present, laid within the first six inches of the soil profile. When hot weather arrives. little reserve moisture will be present in this pasture. The plants will then begin suffering from lack of moisture.

A similar test was made on cultivated land on the David Watter's farm in the Pleasant Grove community. A field of second year Madrid Sweetclover was examined and found that the water had soaked approximately three feet into the soil. The deep roots of the clover had penetrated the tough waxy subsoil making it porous and allowing the water to soak deep into the soil. In a corn field a few yards away where no clover had been grown, the moisture quit at a depth of ten inches. This field had been cultivated before the rains. This would tend to increase the ability of the soil to soak up water. However, on the contrary, washes
