## Sheriff Solves Star And Center City Burglaries

Detective work by Sheriff C. F. Stubblefield last week resulted in apprehension of suspects who are believed to have burglarized the stores of Paul Kelso and Herman G. Lee in Star and of Darrell Head in Center City in the early morning hours of May 16.

After the burglaries, in which money totaling nearly \$50.00 was taken, Sheriff Stubblefield and Deputy Sheriff Clyde Cockrum found identical tire marks in both Star and Center City. Sheriff Stubblefield broadcast descriptions of the marks to other law enforcement officers with the result that two negroes, Johnny Cook and Raymond Harris, were picked up by San Angelo police.

Last Thursday Sheriff Stubblefield returned Cook and Harris to Goldthwaite from San Angelo. They were held for grand jury action by Justice of the Peace E. A. Obenaus. Bond was set at \$1,500.00 each. It developed that Cook and Harris also were wanted in Bosque County for theft of a safe. While they were in the custody of the Bosque County sheriff last week the safe was recovered intact. Subsequently, and after they had failed to post bond in Goldthwaite, Sheriff Stubblefield gave custody of Cook and Harris to the San Angelo police. Cook and Harris also are wanted for several robberies in West Texas. In Goldthwaite, Sheriff Stubblefield said, they made a statement confessing to the Star and Center City burglaries.

County Attorney A. M. Pribble said that grand jury action here on the cases of Cook and Harris would depend upon the outcome of charges against them at several other places. Both are residents of San Angelo.

## 1153 Children Of School Years Are Counted In County

County Judge Lewis B. Porter, who also is Superintendent of Schools, ex-officio, last week filed with the Census Bureau of the Texas State Education Agency in Austin an enumeration showing that there are 1,153 children of school age—between the ages of six and 18—in Mills County.

The 1951 enumeration of 1,153 showed a decrease of 46 from the 1950 figure of 1,199.

Mrs. V. A. Hudson, Assistant County Superintendent of Schools, said that during the past year the Mullin Independent School District was the only one in Mills County to show a gain in the number of children of school age.

The breakdown by school district of the 1951 enumeration follows: Goldthwaite, 602; Mullin, 252; Priddy, 161; and Star, 138.

Judge Porter said this week that if anyone in Mills County with children between the ages of six and 18 did not have their children enumerated in the 1951 school census, a report should be made at once to the office of the County Superintendent of Schools at the Court House. Because of the effect on State aid to the educational system here, it is essential that all children of school age be enumerated, Judge Porter said.

## TEXT OF GRAND JURY REPORT

Following is the text of the Report by the Grand Jury that was made on Thursday of last week to District Judge Wesley Dice:

"To the Honorable District Court, Mills County, Texas: Your Grand Jury for the May Term, 1951, in recall session, respectfully submits the following:

"That in a two day investigation of the mob beating and egging of W. B. Williams of Mullin, Texas, the Grand Jury has ascertained that the mob was composed of both adults and juveniles, some of whom still are unknown to the Grand Jury.

"That the law abiding citizenry of the Mullin School District regret this lawlessness and express determination that such shall cease and that all school and community matters be decided at the ballot box and in the Courts in the democratic manner of the United States of America.

"That the officers (Sheriff C. F. Stubblefield and County Attorney A. M. Pribble) be instructed to continue the investigation of this matter and call upon the assistance of the Federal Bureau of Investigation and the Texas Rangers, if needed, to end such mob violence, realizing that the Federal and State governments have laws governing assaults by groups, two or more persons of which compose a mob.

"That the laws governing juvenile delinquency be invoked upon juveniles who persist in acts of lawlessness and violence, whether led in such acts by adults or whether acting upon their own initiative.

"That the Grand Jury recess, subject to call."

## Harry Allen Measures June Rain At 2.3 Inches; Others Have More

June got off to a fine start with Harry Allen measuring 2.3 inches of rain last Sunday. Scattered showers since then provided some more moisture but it was not enough to be measured for the records that Mr. Allen keeps so conscientiously for the United States Weather Bureau.

Mrs. Dora Goode reported 1.6 inches of rain at Star (Texas), while 3 1/2 miles southwest of Star (Texas), Roy Lee Hill measured last Sunday's rainfall at 1.4 inches.

As for what happened on

Chappell Hill, the Eagle's Miss Pearl Crawford reported as follows:

"What an impression we had when we awakened early Sunday morning and found our rain gauge measured 2.5 inches! Water was standing in the garden and in the fields. The creek was running and the water was high in the dirt tank. We just had to laugh a little about that old long face we wore during the drought. All the work we did last week will have to be done over. And how the weeds and Johnson grass will grow, and grow, and grow!"

Miss Crawford reported that with the showers of Monday the water in her rain gauge climbed up to 2.8 inches. She quoted Roger Smith as describing the rain as "beautiful," and as "the best we have had in months."

Before he went to Inchon, Pvt. Wright was stationed on the edge of a landing strip at Taijon. He liked that, because mail planes landed there several times a day. Mail for Inchon lands at Kimpo, 15 or 20 miles away. Jake doesn't get his mail so regularly and he doesn't like that. In telling of the work of the Army Engineers, Jake wrote: "Well, we finished moving today a large pile of what used to be a factory. I don't know what we shall do tomorrow."

Jake, just as soon as your Mother received your May 30 letter she sent your Dad in to have the Eagle sent to you. It is on the way and it will keep coming to you as long as the Old Bird can keep up with your addresses. Further, Jake, if the Draft Board or the Reserves go looking for you any more, we'll tell them where you can be found — on duty with the Army Engineers at Inchon, Korea.

## Grand Jury Cites Williams Attack As Mob Violence

Applying such words as "mob violence" and "lawlessness" to the May 22 egging and beating of Mullin School Superintendent Wray B. Williams, the Mills County Grand Jury last Thursday returned the case to Sheriff C. F. Stubblefield and County Attorney A. M. Pribble.

Indicating that in the event of further lawless acts in the Mullin Independent School District it would call additional witnesses, the Grand Jury recessed "subject to call."

On Wednesday and Thursday of last week the Grand Jury heard 68 witnesses after receiving instructions from District Judge Wesley Dice. Mr. Pribble and District Attorney James K. Evetts were in attendance.

The Grand Jury report, the full text of which is published in an adjoining column, directed Sheriff Stubblefield and County Attorney Pribble to continue their investigation of the attack on Mr. Williams and to "call upon the assistance of the Federal Bureau of Investigation and the Texas Rangers, if needed, to end such mob violence, realizing that the Federal and State governments have laws governing assaults by groups, two or more persons of which compose a mob."

The Grand Jury, of which W. C. Echols was Foreman and Charles Conradt was Secretary, also noted that "the law abiding citizenry of the Mullin School District regret this lawlessness and express determination that such shall cease and that all school and community matters be decided at the ballot box and in the Courts in the democratic manner of the United States of America."

The Grand Jury met in a recall session at the summons of Judge Dice, who acted on a petition of the Board of Trustees of the Mullin Independent School District asking for an investigation of the egging and beating of Mr. Williams at the entrance to the Mullin High School on the night of May 22. ## Mrs. Flo Wilke Granted Divorce By Judge Dice

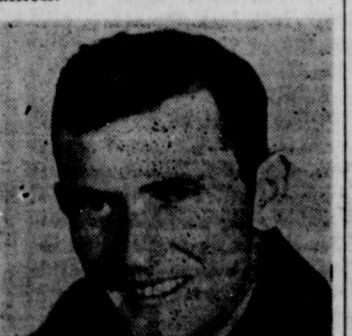
District Judge Wesley Dice granted a divorce to Mrs. Flo Wilke of Shady Oaks Ranch on Rt. 2, Goldthwaite, from B. N. Wilke on Thursday afternoon of last week.

Judge Dice also approved a property settlement that had been reached out of Court after a Mills County jury had failed to agree on a settlement last month.

Under the terms of the settlement as approved by Judge Dice, Mrs. Wilke received the 2,912.67 acres that comprise Shady Oaks Ranch, along with all livestock, structures, equipment and other appurtenances of the property. One half of the mineral rights to the property represented by Shady Oaks Ranch were retained by Mr. Wilke. He also received the previous community property in Harris and Runnels Counties.

E. B. Gilliam, Jr., of Goldthwaite, and J. D. O'Bryant of Houston were attorneys for Mr. Wilke. W. G. Gerron of Brady was Mrs. Wilke's counsel.

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ACHESON AND TEXAS POLITICS

Secretary of State Dean Acheson has become a matter of great political interest in Texas. That is because Senator Tom Connally has been an Acheson man. And Senator Connally has to be passed upon by the voters at the polls again next year.

Policies of the Department of State under Secretary Acheson have been a matter of vital national interest for some time. Those who believe with General Douglas MacArthur that in war, "there can be no substitute for victory," and those who have for long deplored the State Department's attitude of appeasement toward Communist imperialism, took many a rap because they had courage enough to speak out in strong protest against Secretary Acheson. Now, however, there has been a change. Secretary Acheson is regarded by strong elements among the Democrats as a liability to the Party and so, where principle could not prevail, it seems likely that political expediency will.

A considerable number of United States Senators and members of the national House of Representatives—all of them Democrats—seem to have decided suddenly that even if Secretary Acheson's damage to the country did not matter, the harm he may do to the Democratic Party does matter very much. Senators Lyndon B. Johnson of Texas, Richard Russell and Walter George of Georgia, and Harry F. Byrd of Virginia are among those who see Secretary Acheson as a political liability. In fairness to Senator Johnson, however, it must be emphasized that he is not a Johnny-come-lately to the anti-Acheson crowd. On principle, he has stood firm against State Department policies for a long time and he has made his stand known without mincing words.

Senator Johnson, however, does not come up for reelection until 1954. It is Senator Connally who will have to seek renomination in Texas next year. That is where Secretary Acheson comes into Texas politics.

Politicians have a cynical idea which often is justified by experience. It is that the memories of voters often are short. But there is reason to believe that when Senator Connally comes back to Texas to try to round up votes next year, he will have to answer for his support of Secretary Acheson, who will not then be the Secretary of State. It may be that even by next year, the memories of some voters still will be long enough to want Senator Connally to explain why, last week, he voted in favor of Dean Acheson when the Secretary of State struggled to have withheld from the American people the official publication of a document that had been designed to deceive our own people and the people of other free nations.

The document, of course, was what once was the State Department line on Formosa. Running counter to the convictions of our military chiefs, it instructed State Department representatives all over the world to peddle the erroneous argument that it would be all right for Red China to have Formosa. At the time it was sent to State Department employees, the gist of it was published by the United Press. Official publication of it had no bearing on military security. But Secretary Acheson last week fought, but in vain, to have the document not published because it would show up the State Department as an agency of deception.

A principle far more important than the document itself was involved in last week's vote, which found Senator Connally lining up with Secretary Acheson and with Senator Johnson voting against the Secretary of State.

We hope that Texas voters, by primary time next year, will remember Senator Connally's vote of last week. We have no idea whether Governor Shivers, Martin Dies, or somebody else will oppose Senator Connally in the 1952 primaries. But since Senator Connally has proclaimed that for renomination he is ready to fight all comers, he also must expect to have his consistent "me too" attitude with regard to the Department of State recalled. As Chairman of the highly important Senate Foreign Relations Committee, Senator Connally appears to have been more intent on following the State Department line than on considering the national interests and the wishes of the people in his own State. He is a picturesque and loveable man, but issues are more important than personalities and principles should not be sacrificed to expediency.

Secretary Acheson's testimony on Capitol Hill in Washington should be of more than usual interest to Texans if only because of the fact that Senator Connally will be up for renomination next year.

GUEST EDITORIAL

(Editor's Note: The Southern Weekly said in its issue of May 30 that sentiment in the South against President Truman and the "Fair Deal" legislative program is strong and more widespread now than it was in 1948. Because of mounting interest in the national elections to be conducted next year, we reprint in full from The Southern Weekly an article that was entitled, "Just How Big Is the Job Ahead?" It follows:)

With the growing indications that Mr. Truman will again be the nominee of the Democratic Party for President in 1952, which now amount almost to a certainty, the proposal of Senator Karl E. Mundt of South Dakota and his Congressional group and of the National Coalition Committee and the National Republican Roundup Committee of an alliance to insure that all anti-Truman voters support the same Presidential ticket in that election becomes one of immediate importance.

The two national conventions are only fourteen months away, so there is not too much time in which to create and to crystallize the sentiment that will be essential to put this proposal over.

It is in order, therefore, to take a look at the actual situation and to appraise the job to be done, with respect to its size and to the means at hand for doing it.

It can be said with certainty that sentiment among the people of the South against Mr. Truman and against his legislative program is stronger and more widespread today than it was in 1948. Due to causes which need not be rehearsed here, the expression of anti-Truman sentiment at the polls in the South in 1948 was very far from what it might have been. But even so, it was greater than is generally realized. An analysis of the results in that election should give us a start in appraising the job ahead.

First of all, of course, there was the fact that four Southern States, Alabama, Louisiana, Mississippi, and South Carolina, rejected Mr. Truman and the platform of the Democratic National Convention absolutely withheld their electoral votes from the national Democratic ticket, and voted for a ticket of their own choosing. These four States had 38 electoral votes in that election.

How was it in the rest of the South? For this purpose the States of Oklahoma and Kentucky may be omitted as not being strictly of the "solid" South, though even in those States a Presidential ticket representing an alliance or coalition would arouse more enthusiasm than the usual kind of Republican ticket and platform. The other States to be considered are Arkansas, Florida, Georgia, North Carolina, Tennessee, Texas, and Virginia.

In these seven States taken together the popular vote in the 1948 Presidential election was as follows: Truman, 2,377,542; Dewey, 1,237,717; Thurmond, 608,636. The combined anti-Truman vote was 1,846,353, so the Truman majority of the popular vote in those seven States was 531,189.

On the face of these figures it would appear that a shift of the votes away from Truman amounting to less than 15 per cent increase of the combined anti-Truman vote would have left him with less than a majority.

However, this doesn't give the true picture. In three of those seven States Truman received only a plurality of the popular vote. These States were Florida, Tennessee, and Virginia.

The vote in Florida was: Truman, 281,988; Dewey, 194,280; Thurmond, 89,755. The combined anti-Truman vote was 284,035, or 2,087 more than the Truman vote.

Myron Hillman was in the Ranch and Farm News of the Fort Worth Star-Telegram. Mr. and Mrs. Harvey cracked last Sunday's Dallas Morning News. And Mr. Evetts was in the June 9 issue of Collier's Magazine.

The Harveys made the printed page in distant places because of the loss of their little talking bird, Pat—an Australian Budgerigar or parakeet that says "Pretty Baby" or "Good Morning, Precious." Since Pat flew off Mr. Harvey's head when he went outdoors, forgetting where the bird was, it has been seen by Deputy Sheriff Clyde Cockrum and at the Earl T. Fairman Ranch. The Harveys still are hopeful that Pat will be returned to them. correct the steal of our tide-lands frizzled.

Now we are girding for another attempt. I believe the House will pass the new measure overwhelmingly, but what the Senate will do, despite the valiant efforts of the Texas Senators, remains to be seen.

A new draft-UMT bill will soon be sent to the White House. It's a compromise between the House and Senate. Briefly, here are the main provisions:

1. The draft age is set at 18 1/2, but all eligibles at 19 and above must be called before dipping below the 19 year level.

2. Draft service is set at 24 months, and the draft law is extended to 1955.

3. Mental standards for inductions are cut and physical standards are lowered to the standards in effect for men of the same age in January, 1945.

4. A five-million-man ceiling is placed on the Armed Services—about 1,500,000 more than the present goal.

5. A UMT commission of five is provided to prepare plans for a universal training program. Actual beginning of the six months of training provided for will not go into effect, however, until world conditions permit a shift from the draft to UMT. A part of the training may be integrated with school work, and each young man will, after completing the training program be put in active reserve units for a period of 8 years.

The questionnaire which I mailed to residents of the district has caused much interest in the subjects covered and the

responses have been generous. They are now being read and processed. The results will be announced as soon as possible. The answers and comments are most revealing and interesting.

The Mason Lions Club spent a program discussing the questionnaire and sent me the results of votes on each of the 15 questions. Several teachers have reported discussions of the questions by students in civics classes. One man at Kerrville showed his poll to a visitor from Orange and the latter asked me to send him 100 for distribution to interested people down there.

Here are a few comments on the questionnaires, taken at random:

A. F. Leesch of Boerne, former Master of the Texas State Grange wrote:

"Yesterday at the official opening of the A. & M. College Adjunct and presentation of awards in Region 2 of the Ft. Worth Press Conservation awards at Junction, I heard much favorable comment on your idea of the questionnaire. We appreciate this and the good work you are doing in Washington for us."

A Civil Engineer at Del Rio, after comments, noted: "Please continue with this questionnaire—Need two copies in the future, however, as sometimes there is quite a difference of opinion between the members of the household."

A Uvalde man writes: "I feel that any Washington official who feels that we can reach an agreement with the Communists, without either appeasing them or whipping the devil out of them, should have his head examined as undoubtedly, his brains are petrified."

A Petroleum Engineer at Brownwood likes the questionnaire idea:

"I have taken the vow over one hundred times, that I would stay in closer contact with our Congressmen. I am glad to have this opportunity to get better acquainted with you, and hope that I can become more so in the future. On preparedness and universal military training; now is the time. Tomorrow will be too late. We had better wake up; pick a road to follow, and take after our objective with full speed."

A farmer and livestock producer at Coleman writes: "I think you have something here, and I only want you to go on using your own good judgment as you have heretofore done in preserving our American way of life."

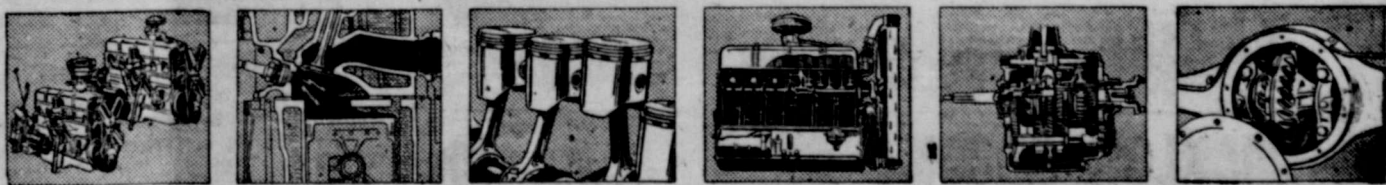

## News Of The Brown-Mills Soil Conservation District

Francis Kyle of Blanket Springs community, cooperating with the Brown-Mills Soil Conservation District, says that the April 19th grass fire really hurt. Some old time ranchers remarked to him that his only loss is the fences. To Francis, loss of fences are the minor part of the fire damage.

For nine years Francis has "babbed" the south pasture to

get a good cover of choice native grasses and to accumulate a litter (the dead grass cover that blankets the ground) on the ground. For nine years this pasture was rested during the growing season. Last fall Francis had the best seed crop of little bluestem, sideoats grama and Indiangrass. The grass cover and litter on the ground had reduced the runoff and soil loss

to practically nothing. But after the fire, things have happened to the soil and grass cover. The live feeling of the top soil full of organic matter is gone. It is dead. The original stand of grass is reduced 10 to 50 per cent. To Francis, these are the major losses.

Twenty four hours after the fire, nearly two inches of rain fell. Again, after nine years, drifts of trash, small rills caused by soil loss and very shallow penetration of moisture were noticed.

Weeds are already bad six weeks after the burn. There are large bare areas where no green cover is present. Francis feels that in these bare areas where large quantity of fuel was present, all grasses are killed and will need reseeding.

If it was not for the fire, Francis says he could have deferred other pastures to speed up the return of the choice native grasses. As it is, he says he will have to defer the south pasture again to keep the stock from killing out the remaining choice grasses that are weak from the fire.

Mr. Kyle knows that highest production of livestock products come from pastures in good or excellent range conditions. His aim is to get all his pastures in top condition so as to hold all the moisture that falls and convert it into grass. Grass is the resources for livestock production.

life is cheap out there. People are expendable under any dictatorship and especially under the rule of Oriental despots.

Space limitations make it impossible for me at this time to go into an extended exposition of my conviction that the end to fighting in Korea is nowhere in sight. But that is my conviction. I have been talking with several parents whose sons are over there and I have had the privilege of reading a number of letters that have been written home by our men who are over there. I think that to build up false hopes among those who have the highest stakes in the war in which we are engaged is just plain cruel and I just wanted to go on record as saying so.
