Three Boys Prown In Lake At Albany

Friends and relatives in Mills County were saddened this week when word reached here of the death of two small sons of Mr. and Mrs. Ernest M. Kennedy of Albany. The two brothers, Gilbert Kennedy, 11, and Eddie Wayne Kennedy, 7, and another boy, Charles Woods, about 13, son of Mr. and Mrs. Dewey Woods of Cisco, were drowned Monday night in Lake McCarty, Albany's water reservoir, seven and one-half miles south of town, when the boat in which they were riding cap-

The Kennedys and Woodses had gone to the lake for a family picnic, the Woodses taking along a friend, W. D. Inlis of Oklahoma City, and his son, Billy. About 8:00 o'clock Inlis took the boys on the lake in a flat bottom boat with an outboard motor. The boat capsized and sank about 100 feet from shore. Inlis and his son swam to safety. Gilbert started to swim but was apparently tired by cowboy boots. Charles and Eddie Wayne both sank. The bodies were recovered after midnight.

The boys father, Ernest Kennedy, is the son of the late John Kennedy of the Trigger Mountain Community, where he of the Kennedy hove drowned. RESPECT FOR LAW BY ENFORCEMENT

After the Mills County Grand Jury had investigated what it described as "mob violence" against the person of former Mullin School Superintendent Wray B. Williams on the Mullin Schools property late last May, the case was referred back to Sheriff C. F. Stubblefield and County Attorney A. M. Pribble with instructions to call upon the Federal Bureau of Investigation and the Texas Rangers "if necessary." Subsequently there was much talk that the Grand Jury investigation would be the end of the matter. But, as a first page news story reports this week, Sheriff Stubblefiend did have an assist from the F.B.I. and action was taken in the interest of law enforcement and to make it known to all and sundry that the law cannot be flouted with immunity. Sheriff Stubblefield and County Attorney Pribble have made clear their gratitude for the cooperation that was given by the Mullin community itself in seeing to it that justice was done and in making it evident to everybody that acts of lawlessness cannot and will not be tolerated. While the Sheriff and the County Attorney have thanked others, it seems to us that thanks is due to them for having acted diligently and for having enhanced respect for the law through enforcement. Law is not law unless it is enforced; an officer such as Sheriff Stubblefield cannot decide to enforce one set of laws and ignore others. We have heard mary favorable comments on the impartial, conscient ous manner in which Sheriff Stubblefield has met the obligations of his office. We believe that we speak for most of the community that is Mills County when we write that in the course of his day by day duties Sheriff Stubblefield is serving the public interest by enhancing respect for the law which, since the millenium is not in sight, is the protection that has to be provided for peaceable members of society.

BEST WISHES TO LYMAN SAYLOR

This week's announcement that Lyman Saylor has accepted appointment as Mills County Chairman of the Texas Republicans For Eisenhower For President is good news. It is good news because it is tied in with an effort to build a really strong Republican Party in Texas. There is bound to be disagreement on the issue of nominating General Dwight D. Eisenhower for the Presidency of the United States because there are persons who will wish to debate with themselves at length the advisability of having a military man in the White House. are considered, we are halted by the astonishing retreat of the twentieth century, with its ex-cess of divorces, its broken cess of divorces, its broken homes, its emphasis on homo-sexuality, its acceptance of ma-terialistic Marxism in wide areas that were so recently (Christian that were so recently Christian its avoidance of such concepts as faith, honor, dignity, sacrifice. If we assume that God is old-fashioned and that his natural law is superstition, then we must not be shocked by what happened at West Point.

So we are faced with the Church in Fort Worth where for problem of national defense on Campbell in Europe. the one hand and of national solvency on the other.

In terms of actual expenditure, it is estimated that we will spend about \$39 billion during the current year as compared with \$19 billion in the last year. Commitments for additional procurement contracts are expected.

By way of a brief break-down, it may be of interest to note that of the vast amount to be spent this year 49% will be for major procurement and production; operation and maintenance calls for 20%; military personnel for about 17%; acquisition of land and construction, 8%; research and development, 3%.

The program is to be built around a 3 1/2 million-man armed force, including about 1,550,000 in the army, in the navy, with 1,162 ships; 175,000 in the Marine Corps; and an Air Force of about 1,061,000 working toward a goal expansion, a reduction of about 75,000 under military requests.

Roughly, \$30 billion will be spent during the year for procurement of planes, ships, tanks, artillery, ammunition and guided missiles. A billion and a half will be expended for research and development in the race for better and improved warmaking equipment.

The big problem now will be for the Congress to ferret out vaste and extravagence and through committee investigations to keep a close watch on just how the money is spent in an attempt to protect this gigantic investment by the taxpayers in the future defense and security of the nation.

He is Commanding Officer of Stewart AFB in Tennessee and is presently engaged in the Southern Pines maneuvers being conducted in North Carolina.

Stationed in the San Antonio office, Mr. Coulter was called to Washington for a two-weeks training course. Other visitors have included Ralph P. Mayer, son of the Edwin Mayers of Sonora. Stationed at Westover AFB in Massachusetts, Ralph spent a few days leave in Washington. While here he visited with Walter McCabe, formerly of San Angelo. The latter, a son of Lt. Col. Chas. Dwight McCabe, is a veteran of the recent conflict and spent three years in intelligence service in

Berlin at the end of the war. He talks the Russian language, and took an important part in contacts with the Russians in the German capital as well as with those in the Eastern Zone. His father, Col. McCabe, a veteran of both wars, engaged in he oil business in West Texas during the 30's and since his recall a few months ago has been assigned to duty in Bordeaux, France, where he is now stationed. Young McCabe is presently attending the Foreign Service School at Georgetown University.





Small seedlings of Little bluestem and Indiangrass are beginning to make their appearance on a pasture that was largely composed of needlegrass on the H. Priddy farm. Such bonds shall be executed by said Board as an obligation of the State of Texas, in such form, denominations, and upon the terms as are now prescribed by Senate Bill No. 29, Chapter 318 of the Acts of the Fifty-first Legislature (provided, that when the limitation of Twenty-five Million Dollars (\$25,000,000) is used in said Senate Bill No. 29, the same shall foreafter be construed as One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000), or as said Act may be hereafter amended, or by other laws that the Legislature may hereafter enact; provided, however, that said bonds shall bear a rate of interest now to exceed three per cent [356] per annum, and that the same shall


