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THE PRIVILEGE OF GIVING BLOOD

In times of stress and danger such as surround us now many persons ask, "What can I do personally to help?" The answer to those who cannot be in the armed services is contained in an article on the first page of this week's Eagle that tells of arrangements to bring a "bloodmobile" unit of the National Defense Department of the American Red Cross to

Mrs. A. L. Whittaker, Blood Program Chairman of the Mills County Chapter of the American Red Cross will be looking for volunteers to help her in finding persons who will be willing to be blood donors and thus make the difference between life and death for an American man wounded on the battlefield-or perhaps a fellow citizen in some American city that might come under enemy air attack.

In the matter of giving blood, this is a good time to remember that General Douglas MacArthur said, "Surely, no greater privilege exists for those who cannot give military service themselves than to give blood for the wounded."

In advance of the arrival in Goldthwaite next month of the American Red Cross "bloodmobile" unit, Executive Secretary Brian Smith of the Mills County Chapter of the American Red Cross, has issued the following information:

To be a donor, you must be between the ages of 21 and 60. Persons between the ages of 18 and 21, however, may be donors if they have the written consent of their parents.

A normally healthy person may give four times a year.

Your blood is needed TODAY. The demand of the armed services for plasma is about to exceed the

An hour of your time at the "bloodmobile" unit can mean a lifetime to somebody wounded while fighting for you.

Mr. Smith pointed out that no discomfort of any kind is involved in donating blood. He added that on the very day that you give your blood it will be rushed to the Armour Laboratory in Fort Worth and will be processed into plasma immediately so as to help in saving the lives of men in the armed forces.

All of us will be hearing and reading a great deal more about this vital program, to which a number of our citizens already have been giving of their time and effort—as our first page news article reports this week. The least that those of us who are qualified and able can do is to volunteer as donors and to offer our services to Mrs. Whittaker's committee. Your blood can be your gift of life. We urge that you give.

ATTENDANCE AT OUR SCHOOLS

All of those who are responsible for the schools in Mills County, whether as members of the Boards of Trustees, Superintendents, Principals or Teachers, would like to have all parents reminded of the importance of regular attendance at classes by pupils. Except for illness, nothing should be allowed to interfere with a child's attendance at school. The reason for this emphasis on regular attendance at school is of interest and importance to everybody, especially the taxpayers- and who is not a taxpayer? In Texas, as in many other States as well, a number of factors are geared to school attendance. They include the allocation of State funds for oublic education. Upon the amount of money that is received in the form of State aid depends the number of teachers any school may have, funds to help operate lunchrooms, and so on. It is not sufficient merely that a given number of scholastics be enrolled in any or all of our four schools in Mills County. What also counts very importantly is the average daily attendance. When a scholastic misses a day of school for any reason other than illness the average daily attendance figure is pulled down and accordingly, the school as a whole is damaged in its financial relationship to the Texas Education Agency-to say nothing of the fact that the child also suffers by getting behind in his or her class work. Mills County schools generally have good records for average daily attendance but still there is room for improvement. A great responsibility rests upon parents but they can meet it, serve the public interest and help their children to obtain a better education simply by making up their minds that nothing short of illness will be allowed to interfere with attendance at school. Let's give this school year the best average daily attendance record we ever have had.

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

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

3 .- Many of the legume failures are due to improper inoculation of the seed. Fresh inoculant of the proper culture should be used. Better results have been obtained by using sweet milk or a mixture of syrup legumes this and water to make the innoculant stick to the seed. The use of innoculant is good insurance any time a legume is planted, but is always essential when a legume is sown on the land for the first time.

> 4 - Legumes should be planted on a well prepared but firm seed bed. Approximately 200 of 0-20-0 fertilizer pounds should be drilled when the seed are planted. Best results have been obtained by sowing the legume seed and fertilizer with a combination grain and fertilizer drill. This piece of equipment puts the fertilizer in bands under the legume seed.

When these precautions are taken, you will have taken the first steps toward growing successful legume crop.


