THE EAGLES DO THEMSELVES PROUD

If ever a community had reason to be proud of a football team this community has all the reason in the world to be proud of the Goldthwaite High School Eagles for their showing against the Dublin Lions at Eagle Field in Goldthwaite on Friday night of last week. Those treasures are, as already we have written, the accumulations of knowledge pertaining to all of the matters that concern us - whether they be spiritual, scientific, artistic, recreational, historical, philosophical, poetic, or what.

There is no means by which we can tell Lieutenant Ables of the debt that we owe to him. There is no assuaging the grief of those who loved and admired and respected him-and whose missing him is as a tight, constant band around their heads.
