So far Mr. French has bought more than a score of cats, which he ships to a pet shop in Madrid, N. Y., where, so far as is known, they are sold at outlandish prices to Yankee suckers who have been so charmed by the legends of Texas that they will buy anything with a TEXAS label on it.

Mr. French will be in the Goldthwaite Square again on Saturday, October 6, to buy

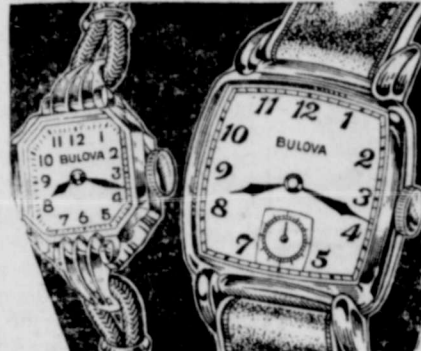

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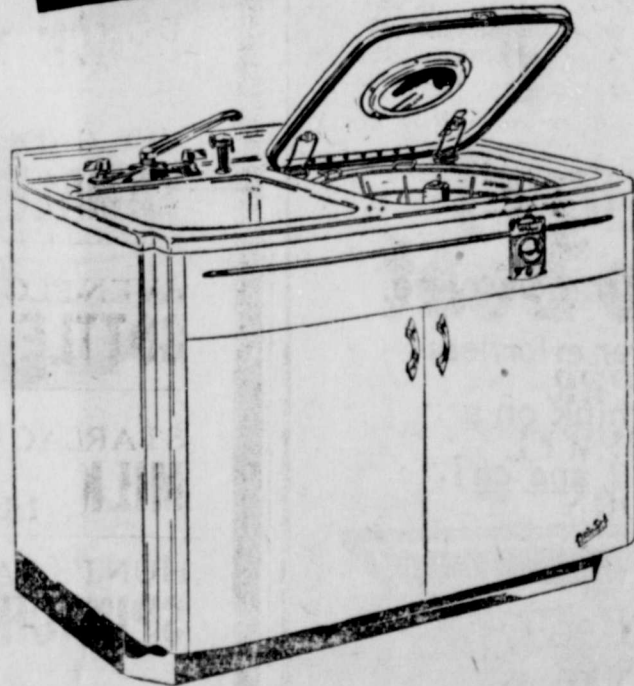

## MILLS COUNTY'S STORE OF KNOWLEDGE AND CULTURE IS ENRICHED BY LIBRARY GIFTS IN MEMORY OF LT. JAMES LATHAM ABLES

During recent weeks the Jennie Trent Dew Library in Goldthwaite has been enriched by several hundred books that have been presented to it in loving tribute to the memory of the late Lieutenant James Latham Ables of the United States Marine Corps, who gave his life gallantly in combat in Korea on April 29 of this year.

The volumes that will perpetuate remembrance of the sacrifice by Lieut. Ables cover a wide range. They include a complete set of the Encyclopaedia Britannica and many other reference books, a master Webster's dictionary and stand, books on art and poetry, works of fiction, classics by such authors as Dickens, Eliot, Hawthorne, Flaubert, Bronte, Shakespeare, Benjamin Franklin and Jane Austen, many biographical and autobiographical books, and numerous books for children.

The books which are housed in the Jennie Trent Dew Library and which are available to contribute to the knowledge and learning of all of the citizens of Mills County were presented by Mrs. Ruby Ables, mother of the late Lieut. Ables; Mr. and Mrs. J. Claude Smith, the Coca Cola Bottling Works of Brownwood, and Representative O. C. Fisher of the 21st Texas Congressional District. Mrs. Ables and Mr. and Mrs. Smith live in Brownwood, which also was the home of Lieut. Ables. Mrs. Ables and Mrs. Smith are sisters.

After Lieut. Ables was killed in action last April, the Eagle published a deeply moving tribute to him by Congressman Fisher. Before Lieut. Ables returned to active duty with the Marines, he was Secretary to Congressman Fisher. Although Representative Fisher wrote beautifully of Lieut. Ables last May, the Eagle this week deems it a privilege to publish an inscription by the Congressman that now is in the Jennie Trent Dew Library in a "Biographical Directory of the American Congress, 1774-1949," and that was presented to the Library by the

Congressman in memory of Lieutenant Ables. Congressman Fisher wrote as follows:

"This book is presented to the Jennie Trent Dew Library of Goldthwaite . . . in honor of the memory of the late Lieutenant James Latham Ables of Brownwood who gave his life while leading a Marine rifle platoon in one of the fiercest battles of the Korean War on April 29, 1951.

"Lieutenant Ables, prior to his tour of duty in Korea, had served as my assistant in Washington. In that capacity, he was outstanding and brilliant in his interest and devotion to his duties and to the welfare of our District and the Nation. In Washington he made hundreds of friends and commanded the admiration and respect of everyone who knew him.

"He gave his last full measure of devotion to his country in the cause of freedom against Communist aggression. His life, his zeal, his gallantry and his supreme sacrifice will be an inspiration to his surviving friends and patriots for years to come. All honor to his memory.

Signed, O. C. Fisher, Congressman, 21st District, Texas."

Congressman Fisher's inscription was dated last August 18. Last July 2, Mr. and Mrs. J. Claude Smith gave nearly 70 volumes to the Jennie Trent Dew Library in memory of Lieutenant Ables. Since then, the Coca Cola Company (Brownwood) has presented its valuable reference works, including the costly Encyclopaedia Britannica, which is a set of 24 volumes with, in addition, the Britannica Year Books. Lieutenant Ables' mother, and Mr. and Mrs. Smith also gave 70 more books to the Jennie Trent Dew Library early this month. Further additions to the memorial collection in tribute to Lieut. Ables are planned by Mrs. Ables and by Mr. and Mrs. Smith.

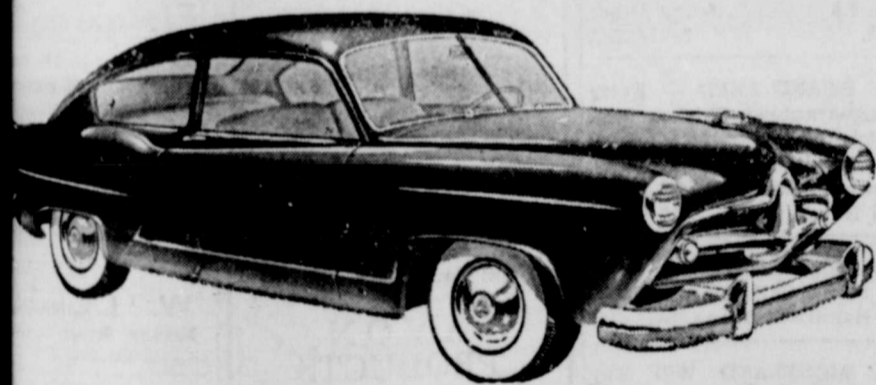

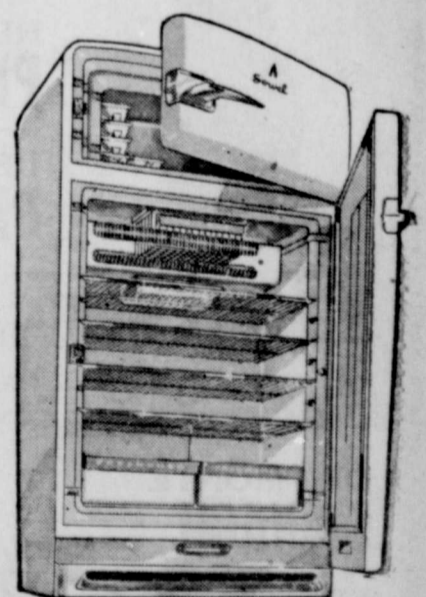

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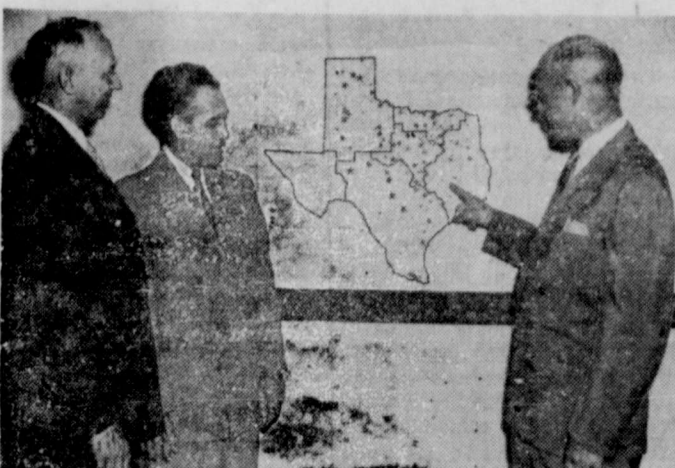
