At the time of the fateful Munich appeasement in 1938 Dr. Taborsky was secretary to Czechoslovakia's Minister for Foreign Affairs. When the Nazis marched into Prague in 1939 he escaped to England. During the years of World War II he served as secretary to President Edward Benes of Czechoslovakia and accompanied him on visits to President Franklin D. Roosevelt in 1943 and to Premier Stalin in Moscow in both 1943 and 1945. After Czechoslovakia was liberated from the Nazis, Dr. Tabosky was appointed Ambassador to Sweden but he resigned when the Reds seized his

Dr. Taborsky took his degrees at Charles University in Prague -the oldest university in Central Europe. He has taught at his alma mater, at the University of Stockholm, Ohio State University and the University of Texas, where he serves now in the department of government. He is the author of several books, two of them in English.



It is: "Why is the United National State of the Control of tions so mousy about that big moral issue—the branding of Russia as an aggressor?" Here, in the paragraphs below, is the discussion of the issue by

Another meeting of the United Nations Assembly is being held, and again the talk is about "negotiating" with the Russians.

Plans and counter-plans of an all-embracing nature related to the propoganda battle between the East and West are the main subjects of the press dispatches. Yet not a single move has been made to declare Soviet Russia the aggressor and Soviet Russia the aggressor and to hold the Moscow regime re-sponsible before all the world for the mischief her agents are causing in Asia and the Middle East as well as in Europe. The United Nations received a

The United Nations received a tremendous build-up in prestige in the United States when it was established in 1945, but it has declined in the esteem of many who looked forward so hopefully to this international organization as an instrument of moral rather than they have been supported. rather than physical force

As a means of enforcing peace by military means, the U. N. has already revealed its limitations, it has become necessary to anize regional groups such as the North Atlantic treaty organthe North Atlantic treaty organization and a Pacific organization for defense purposes. The resistance to aggression in Korea was, of course, originally a U. 

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
