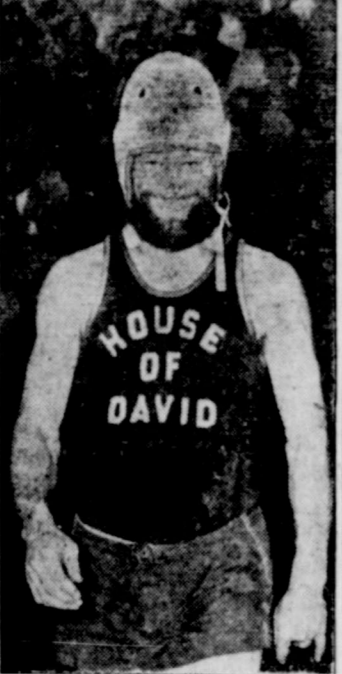

"Mr. Womack will be in complete charge of our San Saba branch and he also has acquired a direct interest in the business," Mr. Blackwell said.  
Mr. Womack and his wife, the former Polly Stubblefield, daughter of Sheriff and Mrs. C. F. Stubblefield, moved last week to San Saba from Sonora. They will make their home in San Saba.  
After having been employed by Mr. Blackwell some time ago, Mr. Womack subsequently had considerable experience in the wool business at Ballinger. During recent years Mr. Womack has been with the Sonora Wool and Mohair Company at Sonora.  
Mr. Blackwell recently added the San Saba warehouse to his extensive interests and shortly afterward completed negotiations with Mr. Womack to become associated with him and to take charge in San Saba.

## Ray Duren Won't Seek Reelection To School Board

Ray Duren, who got away from it all by going fishing this week in Lake Azucar in Mexico, announced before his departure that he would not seek re-election to the Board of Trustees of the Goldthwaite Independent School District.

School Board elections will be conducted on April 5.  
Vance Cockrell, whose term of office also is expiring, said this week that he has not yet decided whether he will be a candidate for reelection. Mr. Cockrell, who indicated that he would announce his decision soon, was appointed to fill the unexpired term of C. C. Collier, former Chairman of the Board, who resigned last year.

Mr. Duren, who has been a member of the School Board for several years, has served as Secretary during the past year.

## Henry Taylor, Jr. Of Temple Runs For Prosecutor

Henry Taylor, Jr., at present County Attorney in Bell County, announced this week that he is a candidate for election as District Attorney for the 27th Texas Judicial District, which includes Mills County.

Mr. Taylor seeks the post for which District Attorney Jim K. Evetts has announced he will not seek re-election.

While in Goldthwaite on Wednesday of this week Mr. Taylor visited a number of citizens and he filed with Joe A. Palmer, Chairman of the Executive Committee of the Democratic Party in Mills County, application for a place on the ballot.

Mr. Taylor's father, Henry Taylor, Sr., who now is practicing law in Temple, was District Attorney for Mills, Bell and Lampasas Counties from 1928 to 1936. He was Mr. Evetts's predecessor.  
Mr. Taylor is 32. He is married and he and Mrs. Taylor, who make their home in Temple, have two daughters, Nancy Katherine, 6, and Martha Carol, 2. In Temple Mr. Taylor maintains offices in the Professional Building.

## Grand Jury And Court Act Fast In Crime Cases

There was rapid action in Judge Wesley Dice's 27th District Court Wednesday when a Grand Jury handed up a number of indictments and when Judge Dice imposed sentences on some of those who subsequently pleaded guilty.

Max Darrell Wolfe, who was indicted on two counts of cattle theft, subsequently pleaded guilty before Judge Dice and was sentenced to two years in penitentiary—the sentence to run concurrently with a sentence previously imposed in Dallas County. Wolfe pleaded guilty to stealing cattle from Pete Smith and Blackie Lawson of Mullin last year.

Ray Van Tutor and Milburn Jennings were each indicted on two counts of burglary, including thefts at the Goldthwaite High School. They pleaded guilty before Judge Dice and were sentenced to penitentiary terms of not less than two years and not more than ten years, the sentences to run concurrently. (Continued on Back Page.)

## Howard Hoover Signs For Election As Mayor; Councilmen Also Named

Howard Hoover will stand for election as Mayor of Goldthwaite in regular City Elections to be held on April 1, it was announced this week.

Other candidates who have signified their willingness to appear on the ballot for the April 1 City Elections are Jack Reid and R. E. Worley for reelection as Aldermen, and Carl Letbetter, for election as Alderman.

Mr. Hoover, who is Oldsmobile and GMC truck dealer in Goldthwaite, is the senior member of the City Council, having served for 12 years. He is interested also in ranching and, according to reliable but as yet unverified reports, is about to go in for pheasant raising.

With Mrs. Hoover and their son, Mike, Mr. Hoover lives on Fisher Street in Goldthwaite.

The office of Mayor for which Mr. Hoover is willing to stand will be vacated by the present Mayor, Loy Long, who has served for six years. Mayor Loy Long last month announced that he would not seek reelection. At the time, he expressed belief that the post ought to be taken by another member of the Goldthwaite business community.  
Mr. Reid, who also is Chief of the Goldthwaite Volunteer Fire Department, is a veteran member of the City Council. He is associated in the garage business with Jerry Walker, Mr. Worley, who also will stand for reelection, operates a Texaco service station on the south edge of Goldthwaite.

Mr. Letbetter, who operates the Letbetter Machine Shop, has signified his willingness to stand for the post on the City Council that will be vacated by Mr. Hoover.  
In addition to notifying Mayor Long in writing of their willingness to stand for election to City offices, the candidates this week also took the loyalty oaths that are required by the law of the State of Texas.

From Fredericksburg the Mullin girls brought home a large and handsome trophy attesting to their victory.

## Judge Dice Says He Is Candidate For Another Term

Judge Wesley Dice of the 27th Texas Judicial District, which includes Mills County, said this week that he is a candidate for re-election.

While he was in Goldthwaite on Wednesday, Judge Dice filed with Joe A. Palmer, Chairman of the Mills County Democratic Party Executive Committee, application for a place on the ballot in the first primary election on July 26. He said he would issue a formal announcement of his candidacy at a later date.

In a later issue of the Eagle this newspaper will wholeheartedly support the candidacy of Judge Dice for re-election and will express its gratification that a man with his record of distinguished service is willing to continue in public office.

Judge Dice, who is 43, has served for ten years as the Chief Judicial officer in the 27th Texas District, which also includes Lampasas and Bell Counties. Originally he was appointed by former Governor Coke R. Stevenson and subsequently has been elected to repeated terms of office.

With Mrs. Dice and their daughter, Carolyn, Judge Dice makes his home in Belton. He has been recognized widely not only for his fidelity to duty but also for the soundness of his judicial opinions. Very few of them have been reversed in the higher Courts. Judge Dice also is widely recognized for his ability to avoid "clogged" dock- (Continued on Back Page.)

Mr. Womack is an Elder of the Church of Christ in Goldthwaite.

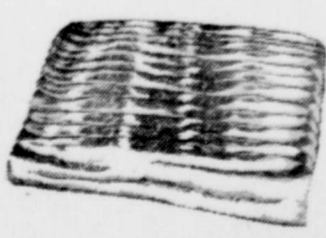

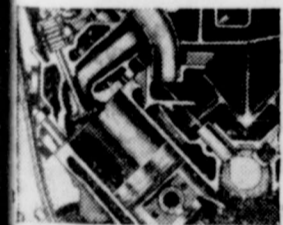

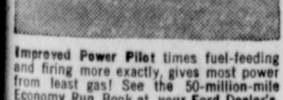

then are applicable today. Phillips told Roosevelt in 1933 that the major prerequisite to United States recognition should be the abandonment by Moscow of "direction, supervision, control, financing, et cetera, through every agency utilized for the purpose, of Communist and other related activities in the United States."

Phillips, of course, knew that the Communists would not abandon their revolutionary tactics outside the Soviet Union any more than they would inside Russia. He told Roosevelt this and was ignored. But that does not detract from the wisdom of his remarks today.

Friendly relations with Russia are out of the question. Nor have there been any indications since 1933 that the Soviets are any more likely to keep their word than prior to that date, when England, France and other countries got sick of their lying and meddling and kicked their representatives back to Moscow.

We mean nothing by recognizing Russia as a decent government. Our diplomatic posts in

the Soviet Union are no more than show cases with Americans limited in travel to within a few blocks of the embassy. The same is true in the Iron Curtain countries.

Yet in the United States, Russian and Russian - controlled diplomats are allowed to roam the land refurbishing their espionage network and financing the illegal importation of new agents whenever the Federal Bureau of Investigation catches some of these already operating here.

As a starter, one of the presidential hopefuls might make a lot of friends by suggesting the severance of diplomatic relations with Communist countries as a party plank. We're wasting money and losing secrets by letting the Moscow thieves hang around our back door now. Let's slam it shut and be done with it.

that the Presidency of the United States carries with it more power than any other office in the world, and probably than any other office in all history, and the party leaders, especially those of Mr. Truman's personal coterie, will go to extreme lengths to retain this power. They are not likely to risk losing it by backing a candidate of too uncertain outlook at the polls. If Truman seems their best bet at convention time, they are likely to insist on his nomination.

The Byrd program will remain the proper one for Southern Democrats, regardless of the course followed by Mr. Truman and the elements in control of the national Democratic Party. Southerners must not be deceived by camouflage, and they must be on their guard against it. They must insist on a showdown with the anti-Southern elements now in control of the national Democratic Party. And the program outlined by Senator Harry F. Byrd of Virginia is adequate to that object. The convention must be forced to take a stand on the two-thirds rule at the very outset, and it must not be permitted to dodge the issue of States' Rights. And in no circumstances regardless of who is nominated to head the ticket, must Southern delegates in the convention consent to a platform similar to the one adopted in 1948. The time has long passed when Southerners can afford to countenance political expediency on the part of their leaders. Too much is at stake to run the risk of jeopardizing the future of the country for the sake of a fancied political advantage. Constitutional government and a free economy are menaced, not merely by Mr. Truman personally, but by the policies he inherited and which he will bequeath to his successor on the Democratic ticket. The South must oppose those policies at the polls this year, just as its representatives in Congress have opposed them during the past nine or ten years. The whole future of our country may be decided in the coming Presidential election, and its outcome may be determined by the attitude of the people of the South. Besides, the South itself has much at stake. The Presidential election this year will provide it with the greatest opportunity it has ever had to exercise its balance of power in national elections to its fullest extent. If it passes up this opportunity, it may never get another. Compromise in any degree this year may mean the final doom of the South to a permanent condition of political impotence and to a subordinate position to the rest of the country. As Governor Shivers has said, this is the year of decision.

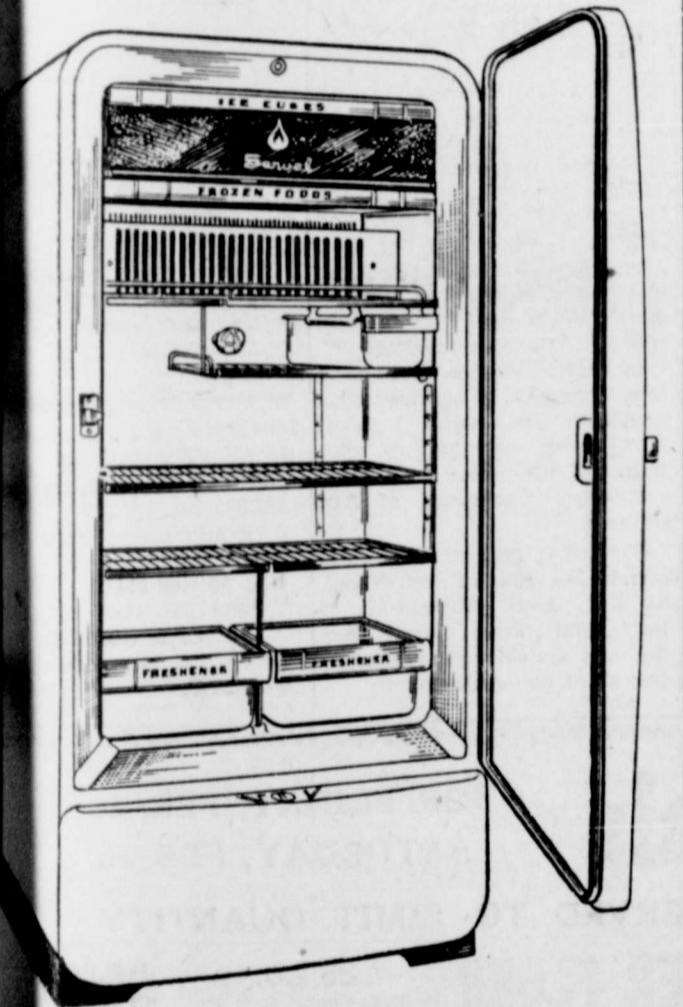

 God ..... Intoxicated with unbroken success, we have become too self-sufficient to feel the necessity of redeeming and preserving grace, and too proud to pray to the God who made us.  
 "Though one of the most outstanding emancipators of history, Lincoln was only one of the many along the way of life. Doctors, teachers, settlement workers, ministers, and many just ordinary citizens have been emancipators in that they have enabled untold thousands to be freed from evils of life, which tend to enslave

them, such as ignorance, prejudice, hatred, hunger, want and physical handicaps.  
 "Scouting is one of the many agencies which is seeking to emancipate boys and girls as they learn to free themselves from narrow bounds of living through the development of the God-given potentialities. The scout leaders and teachers in Church school and in public schools are all emancipators to the extent they enable youth to develop well rounded character and resourcefulness.  
 "As great as was Lincoln and thousands of others in the role as emancipators, we can not close this message without saying there was and is one other far superior to any others who

have lived. This is Jesus of Nazareth, who alone can emancipate the souls of men from the bondage of sin and evil.
