Closed Friday

Executive Vice President Warren Duren announced that Friday, the Mills County Bank (formerly the Trent State Bank) would be closed in observance of the birthday anniversary of George Washington.

New Bank Name Formally Okayed; Expansion Begins

Officially it now is the Mills County State Bank instead of the Trent State Bank, Executive Vice President Warren P. Duren said this week in announcing that the change in name of the Goldthwaite financial institution had been approved formally by the State of Texas Department of Banking on February 14.

"The change of our name to Mills County State Bank will involve no inconvenience to our customers," Mr. Duren said. "We shall continue to honor checks written on the paper of what formerly was the Trent State Bank."

Mr. Duren announced also that the Mills County State Bank is about to start work on expanding its quarters.

"Our expansion into the building immediately west of our present banking headquarters will involve the addition of 1,500 square feet or more to our facilities," Mr. Duren said. He added that the work would be completed as speedily as possible.

Along with official notification that the State of Texas Department of Banking had approved the change of name to Mills County State Bank it forwarded a new certificate of charter, complete with shiny gold seal. The bank continues to retain its charter number, 369.

Decision to adopt the name, Mills County State Bank, was voted by the stockholders at a meeting on January 29, when Mr. Duren was made Executive Vice President. It was explained by E. T. Fairman, President, that the purpose in changing the name was to make clear the County-wide services of the bank and to emphasize the unity of Mills County as an economic unit.

Mullin Gives Effective Meaning To Texas Public Schools Week

Mullin School Superintendent H. Howard Homsley and members of his faculty have arranged to give real meaning to Public Schools Week, which will be observed from March 2 through March 8.

Public Schools Week has been proclaimed officially by Governor Allan Shivers, County Judge Lewis B. Porter and Mayor Loy Long in Goldthwaite.

Mr. Homsley said this week that Tuesday, March 4, will be visitation day in Mullin when all parents and other citizens of the Mullin Independent School District will be urged to visit the Mullin Schools. They will see classes in operation. In classrooms there will be exhibits of work by pupils and there will be opportunity for parents to confer with Mullin school administrators and teachers.

In preparation for Public Schools Week pupils of the Mullin Schools are preparing invitations to their parents to go to the school on visitation day. Mr. Homsley and his faculty have nearly completed a folder containing information for the Mullin Independent School District. It covers the period from last September 1 through February 7 and contains also a projection for the remainder of the year, including expected income and expense.

Business Houses Vote To Close On Six Major Holidays Annually

Ray Duren President of the Goldthwaite Lions Club, said this week that by a majority vote the business houses of Goldthwaite have agreed that holidays to be observed regularly each year are Memorial Day, Independence Day, Armistice Day, Thanksgiving Day, Christmas Day and New Year's Day.

The poll was taken by the Lion's Club for the purpose of averting confusion and to achieve uniformity in the closing of business establishments. In charge of the poll was Dr. T. C. Graves, Chairman; and John A. Jackson and Joe Bailey Karnes. Canvassing of business houses was by Mrs. Dale Reid, Miss Neta Faye Black, Mrs. Oleta Kerby, Raymond Summy, Jack Reid and Raymond Little.

Mr. Duren said that 67 ballots were marked and signed and were tabulated by him and Harold Yarborough. Of those who voted 66 agreed to close on Christmas Day, 64 on Thanksgiving Day, 56 on Armistice Day, 60 on Independence Day, 41 on New Year's Day and 34 on Memorial Day. All of those who voted agreed to abide by the decision of the majority.

There were 29 votes cast in favor of closing on Labor Day, but they were not a sufficient number of votes to bring about such a closing. One vote was cast in favor of closing for two days at Christmas and one vote called for the closing of business establishments on San Jacinto Day. Also, there was one vote in favor of closing all business establishments every Thursday afternoon after one o'clock during the months of June, July and August.

The poll, Mr. Duren said, was kept in balance by confining it to those who normally observe holidays and by not asking for votes from establishments that never close.

New Steps Taken Towards FM Road Extensions Here

Contracts for new farm-to-market roads in Mills County are expected to be awarded in the near future following fresh activity during the past week by County officials and representatives of the State Highway Department.

The roads concerned are number 1047, between Star and the Lampasas County line, and the road from Priddy to Zephyr. On Friday of last week County Judge Lewis B. Porter, Commissioner Fred V. Wall of Precinct 2, and Engineer Don L. Hook of the State Highway Department went over the proposed farm-to-market highway 1047. It will link Star with Lemeta by way of Molline. Three miles of the highway already has been completed in Lampasas County. It will run for three miles more to Molline and then an additional 7 1/2 miles to Star.

As for the link between Priddy and Zephyr, Engineer Thomas Smith of the State Highway Department recently has spent considerable time in the office of County Clerk Earl Summy obtaining field notes and descriptions of property along a line from a point south of Priddy to a location one and

UNIFORMITY IN HOLIDAY CLOSINGS

By undertaking to bring about uniformity in holiday closings the Goldthwaite Lions Club has rendered a public service. As a first page news article this week relates, a majority of the business houses in Goldthwaite will observe six holiday closings each year—Memorial Day, Independence Day, Armistice Day, Thanksgiving Day, Christmas Day and New Year's Day. All of those who voted in the poll that was conducted by the Lions Club agreed to abide by the will of the majority. Accordingly, there should be an end to the confusion of recent years. Business establishments and their patrons will know when holidays are to be observed by closing and employees will be able to make plans without danger of having them come unstuck. Lions Club President Ray Duren, who believes that the vote on holiday closings will stick, has extended his gratitude to the members of the committee who were in charge of the poll and to those who actually conducted the balloting.

ACHIEVEMENTS OF THE MULLIN SCHOOLS

The Mullin School made splendid news during the past week—first by planning to give real meaning to Public Schools Week, which will be observed from March 2 to March 8, and again when the girl basketball players from Mullin went down to San Antonio last weekend and won a Statewide basketball tournament championship. Our congratulations go to the Mullin girls and to their coach, Superintendent H. Howard Homsley. The Mullin girl basketball players had qualified for the competition at San Antonio, which was sponsored by a newspaper there, by winning the right in earlier competition at Fredericksburg to represent the northern zone of Texas in the San Antonio tournament.

As for Public Schools Week, which has been proclaimed by Governor Allan Shivers as well as by County Judge Lewis B. Porter, who is County School Superintendent ex-officio, and by Mayor Loy Long, the parents and citizens generally of the Mullin Independent School District will have full opportunity to know their school thoroughly. A brochure has been prepared by Mr. Homsley and the members of his faculty. March 4 will be Visitation Day at the Mullin School. A complete accounting of stewardship is being made to the tax payers and parents are being urged to confer with school administrators and teachers on the relationships of their children to their schools. Nobody with any questions regarding the Mullin School has to go probing for the answers to the questions. They are all down in black and white, including an accounting of finances, the stories of accomplishments, aims and purposes, and a projection of what can be done with available resources during the remainder of this school year.

What is needed now is for the parents and citizens of the Mullin Independent School District to take advantage of the opportunity that is to be afforded by Visitation Day on March 4. On that day, at the Mullin School, at least, administrative officials and teachers will be ready to confer with parents regarding the problems of individual pupils or those of the school as a whole. "Your child is not a problem child; he is a child with a problem," is the refreshing attitude that has been taken by the Mullin faculty which, on March 4, also will display with pride in classrooms the work of the pupils.

As this editorial was written the only news in Mills County that dealt with giving genuine meaning to Public Schools Week had come from Mullin. It may be that the Mullin example will be followed by other schools in the County. We shall never grow weary of pointing out to our readers that "we walk into the future on the feet of our children." Under the leadership of Superintendent Homsley, Mullin has recognized how true that is.

This year, Mr. Hoover's speech delivered shortly after the congress reconvened, angered many persons in the administration who had hoped that the elder statesman would bring out the facts and figures in his curious but conclusive manner. GUEST EDITORIAL

(Editor's Note: The fact that American domestic policy cannot be separated from American foreign policy has been illuminated repeatedly by Herbert Hoover who, except for Bernard Baruch, is about the only man who is able to qualify as an American "elder statesman." George E. Sokolsky, one of the most able of the commentators on the American scene, discusses our foreign policy in terms of the economics of this nation in the following penetrating article.)

Patiently but ruthlessly, Herbert Hoover continues to define the American foreign policy. His speech of a year ago started "the great debate," which actually served to force unwilling revisions of policy on the State Department and the senate foreign relations committee.

It is not that the administration pays too much attention to views of Herbert Hoover, but the people do and in time the President and his secretary of state respond to the pressure from the people. They understand that the voters are antagonistic to a foreign policy which is bringing our budget up to \$100,000,000,000 a year.

This year, Mr. Hoover's speech delivered shortly after the congress reconvened, angered many persons in the administration who had hoped that the elder statesman would bring out the facts and figures in his curious but conclusive manner. They had hoped that no one would further question the operations of NATO, which they were advertising as a complete success, but which is draining our economy to a point of national danger.

But Herbert Hoover restated the foreign policy in terms of the economics of this nation. In effect, he asked whether this country could pursue a policy which raised its budget to approximately \$100,000,000,000 a year. The Eagle's Aery

By The Editor

There is so much competition for news space in the columns of the Eagle that we rarely write about matters of concern strictly to our own business. However, there came to our desk this week an article on advertising by Roger W. Babson, who quite properly may be described as the best known practical economist in the United States. If the editor wrote about advertising he might be suspected of grinding his own axe. But he believes that the following article by Mr. Babson will be of interest—and of value because it has been written objectively and because it is based on research. The article by Mr. Babson follows:

This is not a defense of advertising. Probably as much money has been wasted on advertising as on drilling for oil or mining for gold; but getting only dry wells and dead veins! But without those willing to take these wild-cat risks, we would have no oil and no gold. Advertising is a risk and should be sold as such.

But advertising is a good risk. Money spent thereon is the best gamble that I know of. According to an Advertising Bureau which made a study of the 717 companies which were spending annually over \$25,000 on advertising ten years ago, 91% are still in business and doing more advertising than ever, while only 5% are now spending less on advertising. Only one company in twelve found advertising unprofitable.

It does not seem to me that even this great nation can afford to spend vast billions of dollars indiscriminately over a period of years to create a great army, a great navy, a great air force, and also provide the arms and equipment for the military forces of other nations without economic bankruptcy. A strong economy is vitally essential for this country's long term battle against Communism. Unless our economic structure is kept strong and healthy, we cannot for long maintain the military strength essential for our survival.

It is altogether impossible to separate the foreign from the domestic policy because every factor in our foreign affairs costs money which can only be raised by taxes or loans. The effect of increasing taxes and a huge national debt has been in every country, a determining element in inflation which, in turn, results in a depreciation of currency. That is why our dollar is worth about 53 cents in purchasing power.

Whoever tries to separate the foreign from the domestic policy of the United States is careless in his thinking, because it cannot be done. Productive capacity supported by stable currency alone can sustain a formidable foreign policy. It is a matter of logic.

Gen. Hugh Knerr adds this to the discussion:

"... We currently possess the capacity to destroy Russia's source of land power, and they know it. However, we are eroding away our superiority through an unwillingness to face reality. We set a deadline (Continued on Page 9.)"

Those companies which have quit advertising were trying to sell a wrong product, or had wrong sales policies, or an antiquated management. The fact that 91% has stayed in business with continuing success, despite competition from new companies and improved products, proves my point.

Most of the above 717 concerns are located in the large cities; but I believe that statistics of merchants in small cities would show an equal percentage of success. The most successful companies are not giving much advertising. The small dailies and weeklies. The tendency is sure to increase in years to come. The people of small communities read advertisements very carefully.

One of the safest investments is in newspapers, large or small, especially where there is only one newspaper which controls the field. It is true that the costs of producing all newspapers are rising; but it is easy to raise the price of a newspaper. Most newspapers now sell for five cents, while some have recently increased to seven or ten cents. People who buy newspapers, the more careful it is read (news and advertising), the more valuable is its advertising space.

I believe in Pension Plans but pensions help wages only after they are 65 years old. Advertising helps all employees all the time. Too few companies take seriously the problem of making factory workers understand the importance of advertising does to hold up production, with high employment.

Labor newspapers should not accuse businessmen of "throwing money away" by spending it on advertising. It is true that advertising expenditures were about \$6 billion in 1951, but nearly all of it is closely watched for very prompt results of greater sales, which, when achieved, lead to larger profits.

Advertising is largely responsible for the fact that wages and standard of living are so much higher than those of any other country. Without advertising, we couldn't have mass selling. Without mass selling, we could not afford mass production. Without mass production, we would not enjoy the world's highest standard of living.

"What is selling—and advertising—doing to help you?" you may ask. It is helping you to secure 52 weeks of employment and is helping to increase your "take-home" pay. It is increasing employment so that your son can also get a good job. As it helps every worker it makes more trade for every merchant. We should all have courage advertising.

Everything in this world has its advantages and disadvantages—hence so has mass advertising. It is becoming beautiful and "pulling" people by high-priced artists and psychologists, that it may get many women to buy more than they should and go needless into debt. These ads may result in unreasonable demands. On this point, you might be interested to write the U. S. Chamber of Commerce, Washington 6, D. 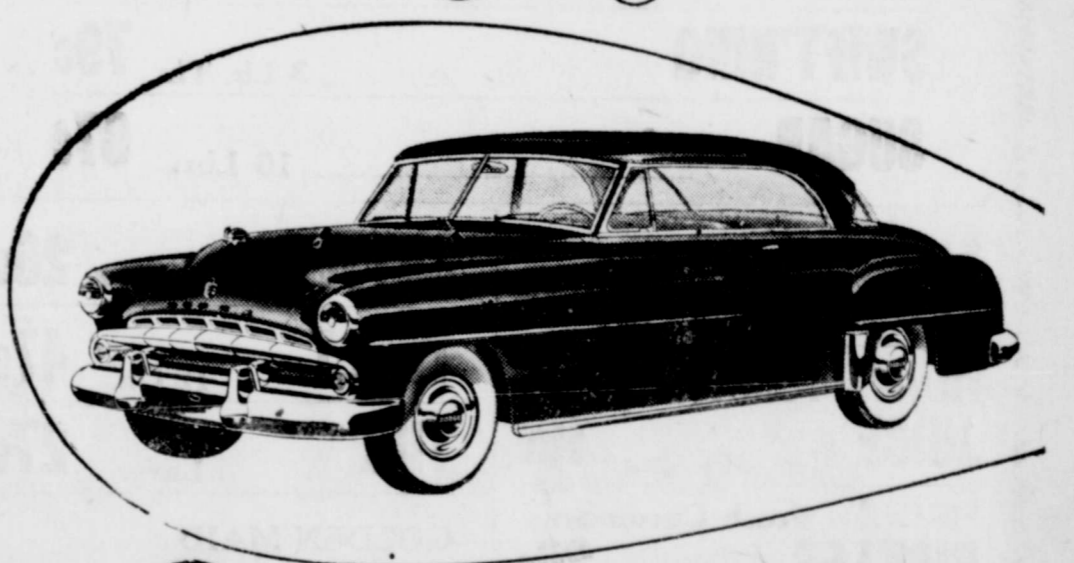

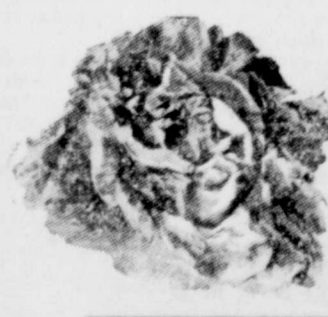

4 slices buttered toast, quartered
1/2 cup seedless raisins
2 slightly beaten eggs
1/4 cup sugar

1/2 teaspoon salt
1 cup Pet Milk
1 cup boiling water
1 teaspoon vanilla
4 teaspoons sugar
1/4 teaspoon cinnamon

Put buttered toast into a greased 1 1/2 quart baking dish. Sprinkle raisins over toast. Mix eggs, 1/4 cup sugar and salt well. Stir in milk and boiling water. Add vanilla. 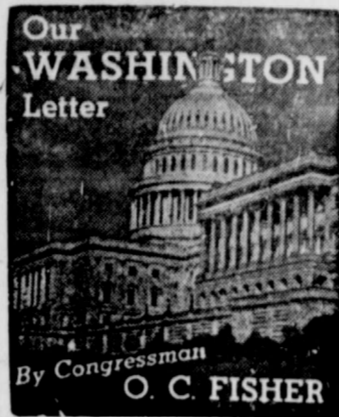

Texas, and the nation— for that matter—will be a bit worse off as a result of the decision of Rep. Tom Pickett of Palestine not to seek reelection this year.

In the tug of war that goes on year-after-year up here, the courage and sound judgment of men like Pickett are recognized and appreciated. There is a natural tendency among a few Members to court the favor of Party Leadership in order to get more patronage rights, more publicity, more petty favors. They are whipped into line.

Actually, the vast majority of southern members buck that pressure and put the welfare of the country first. That has certainly been true in the case of Mr. Pickett. And during his eight years in Congress the folks in his district never wavered in their support when attempts were made to defeat him.

The wool outlook was considered at a meeting called by Senator O'Mahoney of Wyoming last week. With all segments of the industry represented, the causes of the present stagnant domestic wool market was explored. Among others in attendance were Fred Earwood of Sonora and Ernest Williams of San Angelo. Gene Ackerman of the Wool Bureau, Byron Wilson of the Wool Council; Wm. H. Steiwer, President and Casey Jones, Secretary, of the National Wool Growers Association, were there. Many others representing growers, mills, top-makers, etc. were included, and there were a dozen Senators and a half dozen Members of the House on hand.

Recognizing a market slump of several months' duration, the causes pointed to included:

1. Abnormally high "dumping" of Argentine and Uruguay wool tops into the U. S. market in recent months.
2. Continuing imports of Australian and New Zealand wools at lower prices.
3. Reduced consumer demand in this country due to the excessive "scarce" buying of clothing following the beginning of the war in Korea, and the buyer resistance that followed.
4. Reduced procurement orders for military purposes.

Of these contributing causes to the price slump, the most damaging was believed to be the excessive imports from South America. The Argentine government in its craving for American dollars has been, in effect, subsidizing their top-makers who sold their products in the U. S. A. Wool tops, which mean raw wool after it has been initially processed, can be sold at prices lower than the raw wool can be sold for by Argentine and Uruguayan growers. Yet, in this country it costs about 48¢ per pound to manufacture wool tops.

Possible remedies that were suggested included a realistic "anti-dumping" law, whereby countervailing duties would be imposed to compensate for such subsidizing by foreign governments.

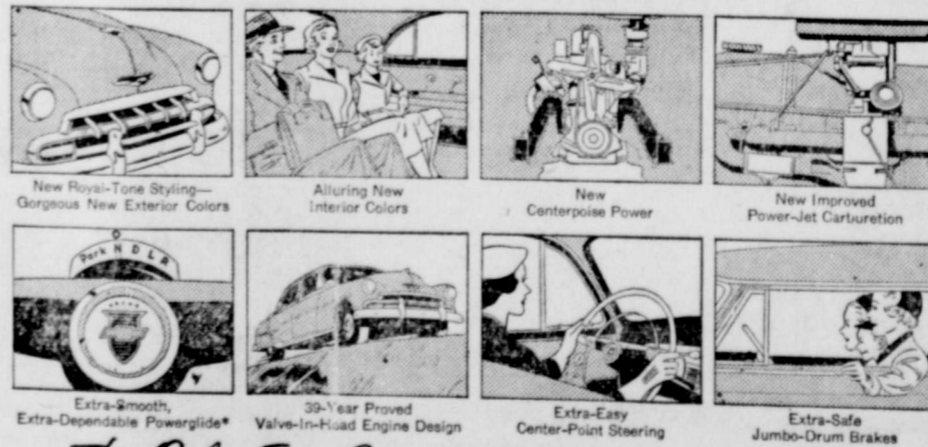

Information To Aid Farmers In Drought Fight Is Given By FHA

George M. Dorman of the Farmers Home Administration, who is available for conferences every Tuesday morning at the Mills County Court House, this week gave an indication of the spreading effects of the drought in Texas when he pointed out that 89 Counties now have been designated as disaster areas.

In a statement, Mr. Dorman said:

"No estimate is available of the actual losses sustained by farmers and ranchmen as a result of production losses, but L. J. Cappelman, State Director of the Farmers Home Administration of Dallas, said that the situation faced by farmers throughout the State is one of the most serious since the drought of 1934-35. Drought conditions reported follow closely those outlined by Pasture and Land Cover Conditions May issued by the office of Louis P. Merrill, director, Soil Conservation Service of Texas, under date of January 15, 1952.

"The map depicted conditions covering about two-thirds of the State extending from Bailey and El Paso counties on the west to Cherokee on the east and Starr on the south. Over this area, conditions are described as severe. Only in one-fifth of the counties are adequate moisture and cover conditions reported. A survey completed recently indicates credit conditions are tight, which prompted designation of the counties as disaster areas and Farmers Home Administration has made available funds for

crop production purposes.

"The record breaking drought cut crop yields drastically and because of low crop income many farmers have been unable to finance production of this year's crop. Disaster loans are available in each county designated as a disaster area. Farmers who have suffered production losses on crops and livestock may apply for funds to pay for seed, fertilizer and materials for insect control where needed, gas and oil for tractors, feed for livestock, essential farm and home operating expenses, and repairs to machinery and other expenses incident to production of a crop.

Credit is advanced under authority of Public Law 38 and is available to family-type farmers who have sustained losses, and who cannot obtain from local sources the funds requested to plant a crop this year.

"There is some concern about the lateness of the season and the lack of moisture and other favorable planting conditions. With the Department of Agriculture calling for full scale production in 1952, many areas of the State are going to be hard put to get acreage planted to the crops wanted in the production program."
