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Conradt Here And Schmidt In Star Join School Runs

By petition, the name of Charles Conradt this week was added to the list of candidates for election to the Board of Trustees of the Goldthwaite Independent School District and in Star the name of Wesley Schmidt, also by petition, was added to the list of candidates for the Board of the Star Independent School District.

There also was an added starter in Priddy, where the name of W. W. Limmer was added to the ballot by petition. Mr. Limmer, accordingly, is a candidate for reelection to the Board of Trustees of the Priddy Common School District.

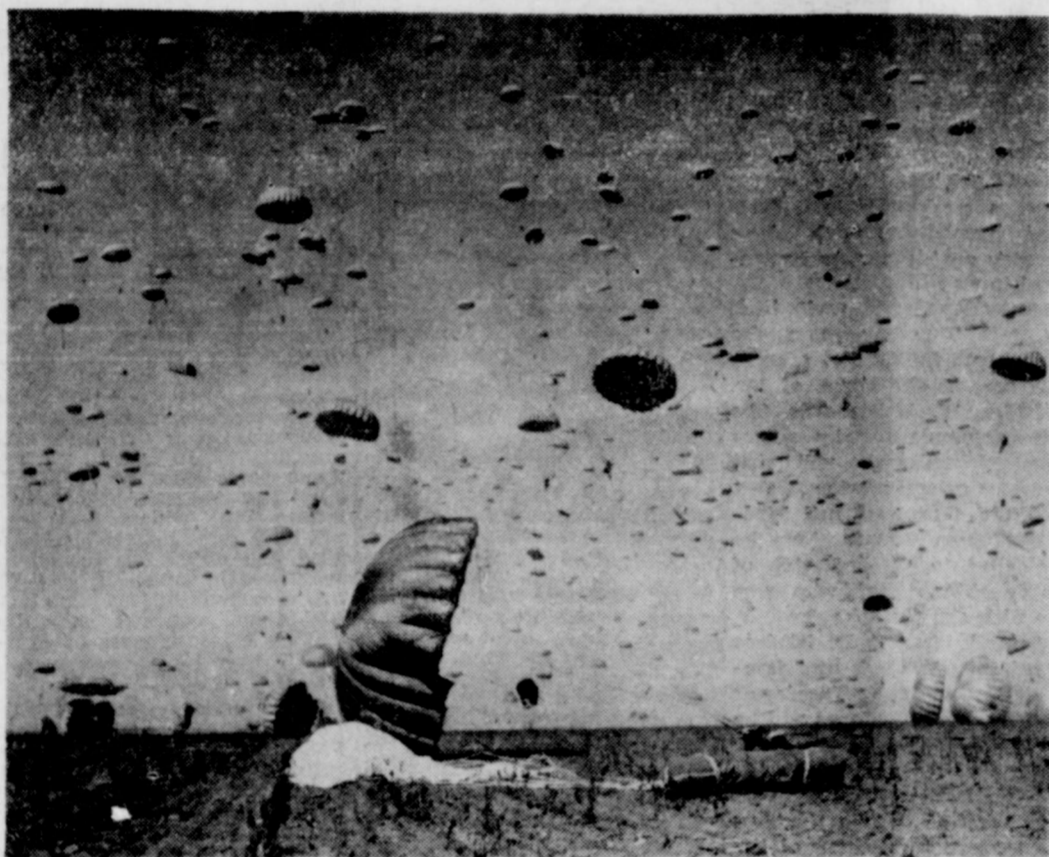
County, Independent and Common School District elections will be held in Goldthwaite Priddy, Mullin and Star on April 5. The deadline for the filing of candidacies is next Monday.

Mr. Conradt, who is manager of the Goldthwaite office of the Saba Production Credit Association, was placed on the ballot as a candidate for election to the Goldthwaite Board of Trustees of W. C. Dellis, Jr., A. Hudson, Joe Langford, Jack McKenzie and Carl Lettner.

In addition to Mr. Conradt, who, so far, are seeking election to two seats on the Board of Trustees of the Goldthwaite Independent School District are Talbot Ledbetter, Malcolm Jernigan, Vance Cockrell who is standing for reelection; and C. L. "Solly" Catherston.

In Star the name of Mr. Schmidt was added to the ballot by petition of M. E. Lucas, E. Egger, A. O. Newton, M. Lee, Mrs. A. E. Egger, and Mrs. S. M. McCasland. There now are five candidates for two seats on the Star Board. The others are Wesley Dillard and Clark Miller, both for reelection; and Jack Elms (Continued on Back Page.)

JOINT ARMY-AIR FORCE MANEUVERS SOON WILL BRING "BATTLES" TO MILLS COUNTY



The long-heralded Army-Air Force maneuvers, Exercise Longhorn, will start next week with Mills County as the focal point of the greatest military activity of the sort since World War II. Aggressor forces, as represented chiefly by the elite 82nd Airborne Division, will "invade" Mills County and then, under the eyes of 1,000 umpires, they will be opposed by defenders, who will be spear-headed by Major General Bruce C. Clarke's First Armored Division, based on Fort Hood.

Last Saturday hundreds, even thousands of Mills County Citizens saw the paratroopers of the 82nd Airborne Division make combined rehearsal and pay jumps in the area between Lometa and San Saba. W. Canham, did their stuff for the public. This week military traffic in-

creased greatly in Mills County and on Wednesday residents of Goldthwaite who happened to be looking to the south saw "aggressor" paratroopers descending in their parachutes in preparation for raising the curtain on Exercise Longhorn.

The maneuvers will test not only the training and staff work of ground forces but it will include air operations on a scale unprecedented in previous maneuvers. Some of the nation's highest ranking military authorities will witness phases of the maneuvers, which will be under the over-all command of Lieutenant General William M. Hoge, whose office as Commanding General of the Fourth Army is at Fort Sam Houston.

Baseball Fans To Meet 7:30 Friday On League Plans

Possibility, even probability, that the Goldthwaite Red Sox will play in the Central Texas League developed on Tuesday night of this week when Clyde Estep, O. H. Shaw and Bill Hightower attended a meeting in Waco with members of other Clubs.

Mr. Estep said that tentative arrangements have been made to form a League that would include Goldthwaite, Itasca, Clifton, Coryell City, Hillsboro, the Universal Atlas Cement team from Waco and Waxahachie. A final decision will be reached later, when it also will be known whether the proposed League is to include eight or ten Clubs.

Tonight, Friday, at 7:30 o'clock there will be an important meeting of all Goldthwaite baseball players and fans at the Hollis Blackwell Warehouse. Mr. Estep urged a large attendance for discussion of 1952 season plans for the Red Sox.

On Sunday afternoon there may be a practice game at the Municipal Ball Park between Goldthwaite players and baseball stars from the 82nd Airborne Division. Mr. Estep suggested that about 3:00 o'clock Sunday afternoon baseball fans drive to the Ball Park to confirm for themselves whether there will be a game.

Mr. Estep said that already a game has been scheduled for the Red Sox against Fredericksburg in Fredericksburg for April 6. Later, Fredericksburg will play here.

Participating in or witnessing the maneuvers will be Major General Roscoe B. Woodruff, 15th Corps Commander with headquarters at Camp Polk, La.; Major General Hobart R. Gay, deputy Fourth Army Commander; Major General Edward J. Timberlake, commanding the Ninth Air Force; and Brigadier General L. L. Doan, assistant commander of the First Armored Division.

Units, including the Viking Division, have come from all parts of the country by land and air to participate in the maneuvers, which will be conducted over an area of approximately 1,000,000 acres.

Citizens who saw the paratroopers jump last Saturday came away from the spectacle to say that it had provided an extraordinary thrill. One spectator, a member of the Goldthwaite Garden Club, commenting on the vari-colored parachutes that were used for both troops and equipment said that the scene looked "like a lovely huge flower bed fluttering down from the skies."

Half Way Mark Is Near In Red Cross Fund Work

Mills County's 1952 fund-raising effort in behalf of the American Red Cross has resulted in collection to date of \$1,134.63 toward a quota of \$2,940.00. It was announced this week by Campaign Director Warren P. Duren.

Serving on the Civic Development Committee with Brother Lovelace are Ray Duren, City Utilities Manager W. C. Barnett, E. B. Gilliam, Jr., A. W. Lilly and Leston F. Bain.

The Committee met last Saturday morning, when Mr. Lilly and Mr. Barnett assumed responsibility for gathering information on sites, water supply, filtering and maintenance and when Mr. Bain and Mr. Gilliam undertook to cope with the problem of obtaining cost figures.

Further reports will be made public as the project progresses. At Tuesday night's meeting President Duren reported on a current Lions Club membership drive and he welcomed as new members Dr. Victor E. Moore, John O. Carothers, V. A. Hudson, C. C. Collier and H. R. Ekins.

Program Chairman Warren P. Duren sketched briefly the accomplishments of the Goldthwaite Lions Club during the past six years and then introduced Dr. M. A. Childress, who exhibited colored motion picture films of the recent Lions Club Style Show.

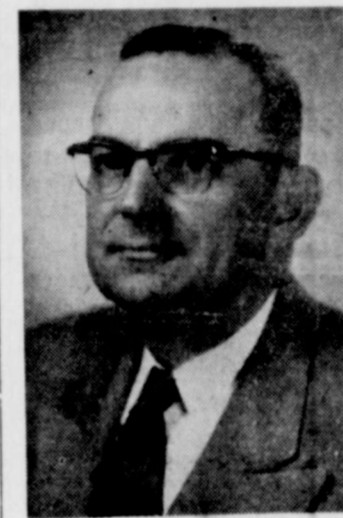
Secretary-Treasurer John A. Jackson reported the net proceeds from the Style Show as approximately \$358.00, after the payment of all expenses.

"In seeking re-election to the highest Judicial office in the Counties of Mills, Lampasas and Bell, which compose the 27th Judicial District of Texas, I do so with deep humility and sincere gratitude to the citizens of my Judicial District who have honored me with the privilege of serving as their District

Andrew Baxter Is Subject Of Story For A Good Deed

A good story about Andrew Baxter of Goldthwaite was carried throughout the United States on the wires of the Associated Press this week. As the yarn appeared in the Fort Worth Star-Telegram, it carried these words in the headline: "Andrew Is Good Scot, Not 'Scotch'." The sub-head was, "American, Too!" Here is the Associated Press story, datelined March 17, Fort Hood:

Andrew Baxter of Goldthwaite is a good American who isn't officially an American yet. He also is a Scotsman who isn't "Scotch."

When Goldthwaite (population 1,556) decided to erect a sign of welcome to its emergency recreation center for the thousands of GIs camped here for the mammoth Army-Air Force maneuver "Exercise Longhorn," the job was given to Baxter, a sign painter who arrived in this country from his native Scotland just six months ago.

When Baxter, not yet eligible for U. S. citizenship, had finished the sign, a larger and more elaborate display than had been expected, the Goldthwaite committee inquired what the cost would be.

"Cost?" asked Baxter in surprise, "why the cost is nothing... that's the least a man can do for his country."

Draft Registration

Brig. Gen. Paul L. Wakefield, director of Selective Service for Texas, this week reminded all young men in Mills County that upon reaching the age of 18 they should register with W. C. Henry at the Mills County Court House. Draft Board registration must be made within five days after attaining the age of 18, General Wakefield said.

"Before me, many honorable and distinguished Judges have occupied the position I now occupy, and I have, during my tenure, done all in my power to uphold the dignity, honor and respect the office has always maintained and enjoyed.

"As District Judge in the trial of cases, both civil and criminal, I have at all times tried to preside over the trial of each case in a fair and impartial manner and with only one motive; that being that justice would be done and that right under the law and facts of each case would prevail, to the end that each case would be correctly disposed of and affirmed by the higher courts on appeal. I know that I have been fair and impartial to the attorneys; fair to the litigants and fair and reasonable with the jury panels called for jury service, and to the juries who have so honorably and unselfishly served with me in the trial of many strenuous and tedious cases."

"A District Judge's record is measured by the number of cases he has affirmed or reversed on appeal. My record as District Judge is recorded and open to public inspection. I am proud of my record with respect to cases appealed to the higher court as to the number that have been affirmed.

"I took an oath of office as District Judge to uphold and defend the laws and constitution of Texas. This I have done. No man or group of men have influenced me, either politically or materially, in the discharge of the duties imposed upon me under my oath of office."

"Upon my record as a public official and as a private citizen, I respectfully seek the support, influence and vote of the citizens of Mills, Lampasas and Bell Counties for re-election as presiding judge of their District Court."

Judge Dice was appointed District Judge in November, 1941, by Governor Coke Stevenson when the office was vacated by the appointment of Judge Few Brewster to the Commission of the Supreme Court of Texas, and has held the office since that time without opposition.

John Carter's Javelina, Name Of Gloria, Creates Much Public Stir

Anyway, Mr. Carter, while clearing brush in south Texas, found his infant Javelina and promptly adopted it. Mr. Carter named him Gloria. Maybe that should read, "Mr. Carter named her Gloria."

Now about eight weeks old, Gloria tags along behind Mr. Carter wherever he goes—not for love, but because Mr. Carter at all times carries in his hip pocket a baby's bottle, filled

with milk and complete with rubber nipple. Gloria, Mr. Carter says, would follow anybody else who might be similarly equipped. Gloria appears to be very fond of Mr. Carter and to have no use for reporters. This reporter tried to get on friendly terms with Gloria and she or he tried to bite him. It is fairly numerous, its number being estimated by the State Game Department at about 35,000 in 1949. Its meat is edible if properly prepared and there is limited use of its hide for the manufacture of gloves and other leather articles. Hunting it with dogs is a favorite sport. A scrappy animal, it is the subject of many tall tales.

Soil Service Warns That Wind Erosion Threatens National Loss

BY CHARLES O. HAENISCH

Acres of good top soil from this and surrounding areas came with the recent high winds—and all of that real estate in the air pointed up as nothing else could the need for soil and water conservation.

The soil that was blowing around this week and last week, and that has blown over many, many miles before, is needed now to produce the food and fibers that are so much in demand for our nation today. The soil that we breathed and saw and even ate so recently is gone. But sandy land farmers still can plan, and plan now, to keep their soil from blowing next fall and spring.

One of the most effective means of reaching the goal is through the planting of vetch and rye as a winter cover crop. This method alone, however, is not the solution. With the limited amount of rainfall of the past three years, the land has been left bare, and the crops that were planted afforded little protection during the high winds.

In addition to cover crops, many farmers in the Brown-Mills Soil Conservation District are using strip cropping. The most popular combination of strips is two rows of sudan or grain sorghum between each eight rows of peanuts. Red top cane, corn, and millet also are used in strips with peanuts. This type of farming should be done

Livestock judges will be selected from among John Weaver, Bob Parker, Calle Sides, Aaron Batchelor and Bobby Letbetter.

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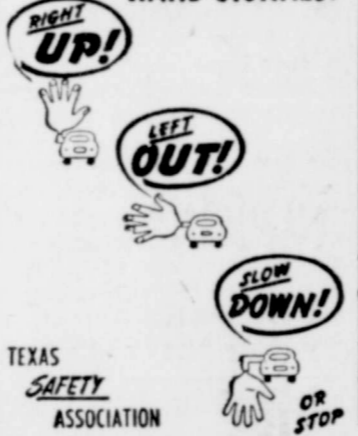

RECIPE OF THE WEEK

Chocolate Banana Cookies

1 1/4 cups sifted all-purpose flour
1 teaspoon baking powder
1/2 teaspoon baking soda
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup mashed, ripe bananas

2 1/2 tablespoons Pet Milk
1/2 teaspoon vanilla
1/2 cup soft shortening
1/2 cup sugar
1 unbeaten egg
1/4 cup semi-sweet chocolate pieces

Sift together flour, baking powder, soda and salt. Mix banana, milk and vanilla. Put shortening into bowl. Add sugar gradually, beating until light and fluffy. Add egg and beat hard. Stir in 1/2 of flour mixture. Stir in 1/2 of milk mixture. Then stir in rest of mix. Add flour mixture that is left and mix well. Fold in chocolate pieces. Drop by teaspoons 2 inches apart on greased cookie sheet. Bake in moderately hot oven (400) 10 minutes, or until light brown. Remove from pan at once. Makes 3 dozen.

*Measure 1 cup, then add 2 tablespoons.

Our first state college—Texas A. and M. is now in its seventy-fifth year



Much of the credit for taking Texas out of the mud of its horse and buggy days and developing the vast network of highways which were necessary to its industrial growth goes to the late Dean J. C. Nagle, affectionately known to generations of students at the A. and M. College of Texas as "Dean Jimmy." A Virginian, educated in Texas and Pennsylvania, he came to A. and M. as an assistant professor of Civil Engineering in 1892, two years after the first studies in road building had been pioneered at this school. As head of this department from 1894 until 1913 and again from 1917 until 1922, he developed the school's division of highway engineering which wielded great influence on the development of Texas highways. He also served as Dean of Engineering and Director of Texas Engineering Experiment Station during the 1917-22 period, when much pioneering of Texas road development was done by these agencies. On the groundwork he laid, his department developed to such a position of leadership that today two of the three members of the Texas Highway Commission, the state highway engineer, half of the state highway department's district engineers and a third of all its professional engineers are A. and M. graduates.

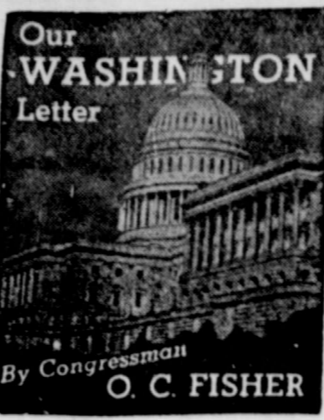

Last week the House disposed of one appropriation bill, adopted a conference report on an immigration measure, and recessed on Thursday for the weekend.

The economy coalition in the House was very much in evidence as the supplemental appropriation bill was dissected and amended in a number of respects. I offered one amendment to prohibit the employment of nearly 400 additional Federal employees, and for other purposes. It was adopted and alone will save many millions of dollars during the years to come. The initial cut provided by the one amendment amounted to \$1,390,000.

The wetback bill was cleared by the conference committee to which it had been referred to iron out differences between the House and Senate. The compromise version was promptly adopted and was sent to the President. It is a vast improvement over many of the proposals advanced by the Administration, and is considered a fairly good bill in most respects.

Meanwhile, the farm labor crisis continues and the present processing agreement with Mexico to expire in early May. A new agreement is to be negotiated in Mexico City soon, to enable Mexican workers to be recruited to work in areas on this side of the Rio Grande where there is found to be a shortage of domestic help. The trouble has been that the agreements have been so weighted down with red tape and unworkable provisions, that the program has had the effect of encouraging wetbacks to come across in numbers and has deprived many people of badly needed labor. We can only hope that the new agreement will be an improvement.

 against him when the senior said that "the senior from Texas invited the Communists to invade Korea."
 "I am afraid it is going to be seriously considered because I'm afraid it's going to happen, whether we want it or not. . . . Whenever she (Russia) takes a notion she can just overrun Korea just like she probably will overrun Formosa when she gets ready to do it. I hope not, of course."
 Q. But isn't Korea an essential part of the defense strategy?
 A. "No. . . . It has been testified before us that Japan, Okinawa and the Philippines make the chain of defense which is absolutely necessary."
 Senator Taft immediately interpreted this assertion as an invitation to the Communists to invade South Korea. He said so shortly after the interview appeared, on the floor of the Senate, on June 28, 1950.
 On that occasion he vigorously attacked errors of foreign policy which had just led to the Korean war, Secretary of State Acheson being the principal object of his attack. Mr. Taft quoted a speech Acheson made in January, 1950, writing off Korea and Formosa as part of the defense line upon which the United States would stand in the Pacific.
 In the same speech Mr. Taft quoted Senator Connally's magazine interview referred to above, and added:
 "So we have the chairman of the foreign relations committee . . . announcing to North Ko-

Judge Ira Gallaway, A Candidate For Congress, Visits Goldthwaite

County Judge Ira Gallaway of Coleman, who is running for election to Congress against Representative O. C. Fisher of the 21st Texas Congressional District, which includes Mills County, visited briefly in Goldthwaite on Thursday of last week.
 Judge Gallaway expressed confidence in the success of his campaign which, he said, "still is young." He said that he intended to "work hard" and that he planned to make service in public life a career.
 In response to questions as to where he stood on major issues, Judge Gallaway said that when his platform is issued in full at a later date it will include the following points:
 1— Elimination of waste from the defense program.
 2— Adoption of a definite policy toward ending the war in Korea—either through fighting to win victory or getting out. He emphasized the necessity of recognizing Russia "as our real enemy" and the danger of opposing Russia only through fighting the Kremlin's stooges.
 3— Drastic curbs on financial recklessness at home.
 4— A cleanout of the "rascals" who have been responsible for corruption in government. In this connection, Judge Gallaway said that no-one who has been in official life in Washington during the period that corruption has been mounting can escape responsibility for it.
 5— Enactment of a "no-strike" pledge in industries essential to war or defense production. Such legislation would be a necessary amendment to the Taft-Hartley Law, Judge Gallaway said. He added that he is NOT for repeal of the Taft-Hartley Law and that he does advocate amendments to it as conditions and experience prove the wisdom of them.
 6— Strong and staunch opposition to socialism, whether in agriculture, industry, medicine or any other area of America's national life.
 Judge Gallaway said that he is opposed to the Federal Government's grab of the tidelands, that he is for decentralization in government and a return to recognition of States' rights.
 Judge Gallaway, who is 29 and the father of three children, pledged himself to work in Washington as a "practical, hard-working, positive Congressman who will attend to business and get things done for the people of this district."
 Judge Gallaway said that he will undertake a vigorous campaign in all 27 counties of the 21st Congressional District. He promised to "hit hard" on the issues.
 Judge Gallaway pointed to the accomplishments of his administration in Coleman County, emphasizing that during his tenure the County government has been put "in the black."
 "We have balanced our budget, paid off our debts, cut down on unnecessary expenses, and we are now operating on a sound financial basis," Judge Gallaway reported. "What we have done on the County level can be done, too, on the national level, if the people's representatives are willing to work hard enough, long enough."
 Gallaway was elected County Judge in Coleman County in 1950. In that election he received 9 out of 10 votes cast by voters in his community who know him best.

means that we are not going to bother with South Korea, they can go ahead, and that we have no policy which in any way involves an effort to prevent their occupation of South Korea."
 Senator Connally did not at that time raise his voice against Senator Taft's charge. Now, in the heat of the campaign, he objects violently.
 The reader can draw his own conclusions as to whether the words of Mr. Acheson in January, 1950, and of Senator Connally only several weeks before the Korean attack was launched constituted an "invitation" to the Reds. The Chronicle believes now, as it did then, that the makers of American foreign policy gave the Russians and North Koreans to understand that South Korea was theirs for the taking. It believes that, as a result, we were catapulted into this bloody, costly, interminable war.
